The President's Proposed Budget

Most importantly, the President lays out a way to pay for these plans by closing tax loopholes enjoyed by only the wealthy and well-connected.

Climate Change: Case Closed

On Wednesday, the House voted on the Electricity Security and Affordability Act, which, if signed into law, would unfortunately prohibit the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) from creating or enforcing any rule establishing greenhouse gas (GHG) emission standards under the Clean Air Act for new fossil fuel-fired power plants unless separate GHG emission standards were also established for coal and natural gas plants. It would also reverse decades of precedent and practice, barring the EPA from requiring pollution standards on coal plants, some of the dirtiest and most polluting in the nation.

I believe this bill missed a critical opportunity to provide much-needed protections for our climate, especially as we learn more and more about the potentially devastating effects of climate change. That is why I introduced, along with Congresswoman Jan Schakowsky, an amendment that would accept the scientific finding of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) that greenhouse gas pollution is "contributing to long-lasting changes in our climate that can have a range of negative



Two million and counting...

On December 28 of last year, Congress failed to renew emergency unemployment benefits for the millions of Americans who have been struggling to find work. These are Americans who have exhausted all of their options, and who must rely on this temporary safety net in order to put food on the table and a roof over their head while they spend their days searching for work. It was irresponsible and heartless for Congress to let these benefits expire.

From December 28 to March 8, it is estimated that 339,101 Californians lost their unemployment benefits as a result of the Emergency Unemployment Compensation program's expiration. We must renew the program for these Californians, and for the 1.6 million more Americans who are suffering due to Congress' inaction.



"Mark-up"

When a bill is introduced by a Member of Congress, it is then referred to the relevant House Committee. For example, a bill that relates to veterans' benefits would be referred to the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs. Once the bill is received, the Committee convenes and its members offer and vote on proposed changes to the bill's language, known as amendments. Most mark-ups end with a vote to send the new or "marked-up" version of the bill to the floor for the full House to consider.
