

This year marks the first annual Congressional Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Academic Competition, the "House Student App Challenge."

Established by Members of the U.S. House of Representatives in 2013, this competition is a nationwide event that allows high school students from across the country to compete by creating and exhibiting their software application, or "app," for mobile, tablet, or computer devices on a platform of their choice. Throughout the completion period, participating students will be provided opportunities to engage with various STEM educational partners located within the community to mentor and assist them with their app development. This competition is designed to engage student's creativity and encourage their participation in STEM education fields.



The "House Student App Challenge" is open to all high school students in the 47th District. Students entering the competition must submit their app's source code online during the Competition Submission Period between 9 p.m. Pacific Standard Time on February 1, 2014, and 8:59 p.m. Pacific Standard Time on April 30, 2014, as well as provide a YouTube or VIMEO video demo explaining their app and what they learned through this competition process.

Comprehensive Immigration Reform: Call For An Immediate Vote

Last week, I signed a discharge petition on H.R. 15, a bipartisan comprehensive immigration reform bill. The bill is based on S.744, the bipartisan bill passed by the U.S. Senate in June, 2013. H.R. 15 secures our borders, creates an earned clear pathway to citizenship, and increases economic opportunities for all Americans. Furthermore, passing this bill will save our country \$900 billion over the next two decades. This is why I spoke on the House floor in support of the discharge petition, which could bring the bill to the House floor for an immediate vote if it reaches 218 signatures. As of Wednesday, there were 190 signatures.

Supreme Court Rules On Campaign Money

Regrettably, in this week's McCutcheon vs. FEC decision, the Supreme Court ruled in favor of big money in politics. The floodgates have now been opened even wider than before – giving corporations and the wealthiest few the green light to pour even greater amounts of money into political campaigns. This is a serious blow to our democracy.

Now, more than ever, Congress needs to redouble its efforts in passing campaign finance reform, including Congressman John Sarbanes' "Government by the People Act" and a constitutional amendment to overturn the Citizens United decision.

Proposed Budgets vs. Continuing Resolutions

Each year, the President releases a proposed budget, where it is then given to Congress for their review. Congress then creates several separate bills, called appropriations bills, that authorize government spending that could be similar or completely different from what was in the President's proposed budget.

If Congress cannot agree to spending levels in either the President's proposed budget or in their appropriations bills, then they vote on a Continuing Resolution (CR), which is a short-term bill to fund the government. The CR is temporary measure that keeps the current level of funding so that Congress has time to work out a longer term spending plan. To keep the federal government running in the event of a failure to pass a full budget, Congress must pass the CR, or the government risks being shut down.
