EDUCATION IS CRITICAL TO OUR FUTURE

As an educator for more than 30 years, I know that the pursuit of knowledge and education is our greatest hope in maintaining a healthy democracy, ensuring economic competitiveness, and spurring innovation.

As our nation continues on a path to economic recovery, we must rededicate our support of our educational system and provide our students with the best possible resources they need to succeed and to contribute to our society. Investments in higher education, with an emphasis on student financial support, innovative teaching strategies, and the research and development of new technologies, should remain a legislative priority.

Earlier this year, as federal student interest loan rates threatened to double, I supported keeping student loan rates low as a cosponsor of H.R.1595--the Student Loan Relief Act--which would have extended the 3.4 percent interest rate on Stafford loans through 2015. Unfortunately, the bill fell short of reaching the House floor for a vote by a mere 22 signatures.

However, last month Congress was able to pass a bipartisan solution to undo the July 1st student loan interest rate increase and instead tie it to the yield on the 10-year Treasury note, undoing the impacts of the sudden rise in interest rates. While this measure was not the solution I had hoped for, I believe that we reached the best compromise possible for our students at this time.

If you have a problem, click here to open survey in a new window Interest rates are only a small part of the larger problem of the everincreasing cost of higher education and the growing loans and debt that have accompanied it. This is why I also cosponsored comprehensive measures like the Student Loan Fairness Act, H.R.1330, which would make college loans more affordable for low income students, while working diligently to bring more resources to the 47th district, such introducing a legislative amendment to direct an additional \$5 million to the STARBASE Youth Program, which provides instruction for 5th grade underrepresented and lowincome students in Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) education.

HOW TO SEE MY VOTING RECORD

I believe that operating in the most transparent means possible is a duty for all elected officials. One layer of transparency is publishing my voting and legislative record, and, making those records easily searchable and understandable.

If you visit my website at <u>lowenthal.house.gov</u>, on the bottom right column, you can find the "My Voting Record" window. It lists my three most recent votes on the House floor as well as a link to take you to <u>a listing of all my</u> <u>votes</u> this session. In addition, there is a link to a page that <u>explains what</u> <u>each of the columns and terms</u> on the voting record screen mean.

Just above the "My Voting Record" window you will find a search box that will allow you to search for more information about specific legislation, or find all legislation that contains a certain word or phrase.
