#### **Fixing Our Freight System**

The movement of goods is one of the most important economic engines in our nation. The infrastructure this engine depends on is crumbling and we must fix it, make it stronger, and make it better.

To address this, I recently introduced legislation aimed at strengthening America's economic competitiveness by providing a dedicated revenue source to invest in our national freight infrastructure.

My bill, H.R.5624, Economy in Motion: The National Multimodal and Sustainable Freight Infrastructure Act, would dedicate roughly \$8 billion a year to address a growing backlog of infrastructure needs to support our economy.

According to a new report by the National Association of Manufacturers, "the United States is stuck in a decade-long period of decline in overall infrastructure capital spending that will eventually harm job creation, future productivity and global competitiveness."

This bill creates two funding mechanisms, one based on a formula that would allow all states with state freight plans to participate, and a grant program that would be open to all local, regional, and state governments.

In addition, the state freight plans will contain environmental goals and strategies developed by state freight advisory committee members; providing a path for freight projects to address and reduce the environmental and community impacts of goods movement.

#### **Capitol Dome Construction**

Each year thousands of 47th District residents visit Washington, D.C., and the U.S. Capitol is one of the top sights for many. If you are visiting Washington in the next two years, you should be aware of the Capitol Dome Restoration Project.

The Capitol Dome was constructed of cast iron more than 150 years ago and has not undergone a complete restoration since 1960. Due to age and weather, the Dome is now plagued by more than 1,000 cracks and

The Architect of the Capitol recently began the multi-year restoration project to repair these problems, with the goal of restoring the Dome to its original condition.



The project impacts the exterior view of the Capitol, as scaffolding is now being constructed that in a short time will cover the entire Dome. On the interior, some areas in the rotunda have been covered, though the main mural in the top of the Dome is still visible.

#### **Bill Numbering**

I recently introduced a bill entitled 'Economies in Motion: The National Multimodal and Sustainable Freight Infrastructure Act' that seeks to help rebuild our nation's crumbling infrastructure. In addition to a title, which is crafted by the author (in this case myself), a bill also has a letter/number designation. My 'Economies in Motion' bill is numbered H.R.5624.

In Congress, there are four types of legislation: bills, joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions and simple resolutions. Any of these may be introduced in either the House or the Senate.

Standard bills are identified with 'H.R.,' which stands for House of

Representatives.

A simple resolution is a legislative proposal that addresses matters entirely within the prerogative of the House or Senate. Simple resolutions in the House are given the label 'H.Res.,' which stands for House Resolution.

Joint Resolutions are legislative proposals nearly identical to standard bills that require the approval of both houses and the signature of the President. When originating in the House they are given the label 'H.J.Res.'

Concurrent Resolutions are legislative proposals that require the approval of both houses, do not require the signature of the President, and do not have the force of law. When they originate in the House, they are labeled with 'H.Con.Res.'

The designation is assigned by the House Clerk when the bill is introduced. The number portion of the designation is based on the chronological order in which the bill was submitted. H.R.5624 would be the 5,624th bill introduced in the current 113th Congress.
