The White House



Summary: For two hundred years, the White House has stood as a symbol of the Presidency, the United States government, and the American people. Its history, and the history of the nation's capital, began when President George Washington signed an Act of Congress in December of 1790 declaring that the federal government would reside in a district "not exceeding ten miles square...on the river Potomac." President Washington, together with city planner Pierre L'Enfant, chose the site for the new residence, which is now 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue. President John Adams, our second President was the first to live in the completed White House.

Booking Tour: The White House Tour Office requires that your security information be submitted by a Microsoft Excel file or submitted through Congressman Harper's website at http://harper.house.gov/services/tours-and-tickets. This method makes it easier to protect your group's personal information and is more secure. Please contact the office at 202-225-5031 and a spreadsheet and instructions will be emailed to you or go online and fill out the form. It is necessary to have the SSN for each guest over the age of

15. Requests cannot be submitted without your completed security information. Please allow a six month notice in requesting a tour; our office will be contacted by the White House one week before the desired tour date and you will be contacted immediately once the status of your tour is known. The White House does not allow tours to be booked for specific times; only specific dates.

The United States Capitol



Summary: The Capitol is home to the U.S. Congress and its two legislative bodies, the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate.

Booking Tour: Please log on to www.visitthecapitol.gov. From there, you can book the tour convenient to your personal schedule or please fill out the online form at http://harper.house.gov/services/tours-and-tickets and you will be assigned a tour time.

Location: To begin your tour, you will enter the Capitol Visitor's Center on the east side at the intersection of East Capitol and First Street, NE. From there, you will watch an excellent video and be led through the Capitol by a professional tour guide.

Metro Stop: Capital South (Blue or Orange Lines).

Hours of Operation: Mon - Fri Tours 8:45am - 3:45pm; Galleries 9:00am - 4:30pm (not in session)

Cost: Free

Length: 1 hour. There are also walk-up tours available. If you miss your reserved time or want to go at a different time, simply go to the line in the visitor area marked "Public Walk-Up Tours" there you will be given tickets for the next tour slot.

The Supreme Court



Summary: The Supreme Court was first called to assemble on Feb. 1, 1790, in the Merchants Exchange Building in New York City, then to the Nation's Capital. The first Supreme Court Chief Justice was John Jay of New York.

Summary: You'll see millions of dollars being printed during a tour of the BEP. The tour features the various steps of currency production, beginning with large, blank sheets of paper, and ending with wallet-ready bills!

The National Cathedral



Summary: The dream of a national cathedral dates back to the days of George Washington's presidency. That dream took an act of Congress but it soon became a reality. Construction for the cathedral started in 1907. In 1912, Bethlehem Chapel opened for services in the unfinished cathedral, construction was put on hold for a brief time then resumed after a brief time for World War I, during the time there was seize of construction both Bodley and Vaughan (original architects) had died. Near the wars end, General John J. Pershing led fundraising efforts for the church after World War I. American architect Philip Hubert Frohman took over the design of the cathedral and was thenceforth designated the principal architect. In 1990 the completion of the west tower marked the end of 83 years of construction. Funding for the National Cathedral has come entirely from private sources. Memorable moments in the life of the

Cathedral include President Theodore Roosevelt's 1907 speech, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr's last sermon, and President Ronald Reagan's State Funeral.

Metro Stop: From Tenleytown – Take the **Red** Line to the Tenleytown/AU station. Exit on the west side of Wisconsin Avenue. Take any 30 series bus (31, 32, 36, or 37) going south on Wisconsin Avenue. Ride approximately 1 1/2 miles until you reach Woodley Avenue; the Cathedral is on your left.

From Dupont Circle (Red Line) – Take the N2, N3, N4, or N6 bus until you reach the corner of Massachusetts and Wisconsin Avenues. Walk north on Wisconsin 1/2 block to the Cathedral.

From Woodley Park (Red Line) – Take a 96, 97, or X3 bus toward McLean Gardens. Get off the bus at the corner of Woodley and Wisconsin Avenues. The Cathedral is on the east side of Wisconsin Avenue.

The Kennedy Center



Summary: After President Kennedy's assassination in November 1963, Congress designated the National Cultural Center (designed by Edward Durell Stone) as a "living memorial" to Kennedy, and authorized \$23 million to help build what was now known as the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. **Booking Tour:** Please book your tour through our Congressional office by filling out the form at http://harper.house.gov/services/tours-and-tickets. The Library of Congress



Summary: The Library of Congress is the nation's oldest federal cultural institution and serves as the research arm of Congress. It is also the largest library in the world, with millions of books, recordings, photographs, maps and manuscripts in its collections.

The National Archives



Summary: From its founding, our federal government has documented its policies and decisions, but for almost 150 years it had virtually no method or place to safeguard historically important records. During those years, fires destroyed important documents, reinforcing the need for an archives. By the early 20th century an organized effort aimed at creating the National Archives began, but it was not until 1926 that Congress finally approved the National Archives Building.

The State Department



Summary: The Diplomatic Reception Rooms tour includes the Entrance Hall, Transition Room, Gallery, Thomas Jefferson State Reception Room and the Benjamin Franklin State Dining Room. A little history about the seal of the United States: the revolutionaries needed an emblem and national coat of arms to give visible evidence of a sovereign nation and a free people with high aspirations and grand hopes for the future; thus creating the "Great Seal".

Washington himself designed the landscape which includes 13 trees that stand today as the last living witnesses of Washington's

Arlington National Cemetery



Summary: Arlington Mansion and 200 acres of ground immediately surrounding it were designated officially as a military cemetery June 15, 1864, by Secretary of War Edwin M. Stanton. More than 300,000 people are buried at Arlington Cemetery. Veterans from all the nation's wars the American Revolution through the Irag and Afghanistan War are buried on the grass covered grounds. The Tomb of the Unknowns (also known as the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier) is guarded 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, in any weather by Tomb Guard sentinels, Sentinels, all volunteers, are considered to be the best of the elite 3rd U.S. Infantry (The Old Guard), and headquartered at Fort Myer, VA. The Changing of the **Guard** can be observed every hour (Oct 1st – March 14th) and every half hour (March 15th – Sept 30th).

Union Station



Summary: Opened on October 27, 1907 and completed in 1908, Union Station is considered to be one of the finest examples of the Beaux-Arts style of architecture. The Station brought to the nation's capital a new grandeur that echoed the Chicago World's Fair and began Washington's monumental transformation. The beauty and eloquence of the masterpiece is undeniable with seventy pounds of 22-karat gold leaf adorned the 96-foot barrel-vaulted, coffered ceilings. Today, Union Station continues to make history as the most visited destination in the nation's Capitol with over 32 million visitors a year.

Washington Monument



Summary: The Washington Monument is the most prominent structure in Washington, D.C. and one of the city's earliest built attractions. It was built in honor of George Washington, who led the country to independence and then became its first President. The Monument is shaped like an Egyptian obelisk, stands 555' 5 1/8" tall, and offers views in excess of thirty miles. It was finished on December 6. 1884.

Booking Tour: Free, timed-entry tickets are required and can be reserved for a transaction fee by calling 1-877-444-6777 for individuals or 1-877-559-6777 for large groups or by going online at Recreation.gov. Free tickets for same-day visits also can be obtained on a first-come first-served basis from Washington Monument Lodge along 15th St., beginning at 8:30am. One person can obtain up to six tickets.

Jefferson Memorial



Summary: The Thomas Jefferson Memorial, modeled after the Pantheon of Rome, is America's foremost memorial to our third president. As an original adaptation of Neoclassical architecture, it is a key landmark in the monumental core of Washington, DC. The circular, colonnaded structure in the classic style was introduced to this country by Thomas Jefferson himself. The Memorial was dedicated in 1943, but the bronze statue spectators view today is not the original, rather the replacement of the plaster model. After World War II the restrictions on the use of metals were finally lifted and the "intended" metal could be used.

Booking Tour: There is no fee or reservations associated with the Thomas Jefferson Memorial.

Korean War Memorial



Summary: The Korean War Veterans Memorial was authorized by Public Law 99-572 on Oct. 28, 1986 "...to honor members of the United States Armed Forces who served in the Korean War, particularly those who were killed in action, are still missing inaction, or were held as prisoners of war." The law established an advisory board of 12 veterans appointed by the President to coordinate all aspects of the memorial's construction. There are 19 statues sculpted by Frank Gaylord of Barre, Vt., and cast by Tallix Foundries of Beacon, N.Y. They are approximately 7'3" tall, heroic scale and consist of 14 Army, 3 Marines, 1 Navy, 1 Air Force. They represent an ethnic cross section of America with 12 Caucasian, 3 African American, 2 Hispanic, 1 Oriental and 1 Indian.

The Lincoln Memorial



Summary: "In this temple, as in the hearts of the people for whom he saved the Union, the memory of Abraham Lincoln is enshrined forever." Beneath these words, the 16th President of the United States—the Great Emancipator and preserver of the nation during the Civil War—sits immortalized in marble. As an enduring symbol of freedom, the Lincoln Memorial attracts anyone who seeks inspiration and hope. The statue of Lincoln is 19 feet high and weighs 175 tons. The original plan was for the statue to be only ten feet high, but this was changed so that the figure of Lincoln would not be dwarfed by the size of the chamber. The north and south side chambers contain carved inscriptions of Lincoln's Second Inaugural Address and his Gettysburg Address. Congress approved the bill to construct this memorial in 1910. Construction began in 1914, and the memorial was opened to the

public in 1922.

U.S.M.C. War Memorial (Iwo Jima Memorial)



Summary: This famous and patriotic scene in history lives on through this memorial. The 32ft tall figures, raising a 60ft high flagpole are placed on a 10ft high base inscribed with all the major Marine Corps engagements since its founding in 1775. Also engraved on the foundation, a phrase describing the Marines Courage and Character: "Uncommon Valor was a Common Virtue."

Vietnam Veterans Memorial



Summary: The two black triangular granite walls of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial are sunk into the ground at an angle of 125 degrees. Each wall is 250ft long. Both walls start at a height of 8 inches and meet at their highest point, 10ft high. Inscribed in the wall are the names of more than 58,000 men and women who gave their life in the Vietnam War or who are still missing in action. The names are in chronological order, rather than alphabetized to help individualize the names. If the names were in alphabetical order, then a loved one would be lost in a sea common last names, and it would depersonalize that individual. Although it may take longer to locate and find the name in chronological order, the process is worth it to a family member or a friend. Heroes are identified by a diamond beside the

name which indicates those who died, while a cross indicates those missing in action and a body is identified, when the cross is

World War II Memorial



Summary: The memorial honors and commemorates the sacrifice and celebrates the victory of "the greatest generation," the 16 million who served in the armed forces of the U.S. during World War II, the more than 400,000 who died, and the millions who supported the war effort from home. Symbolic of the defining event of the 20th Century, the memorial is a monument to the spirit, sacrifice, and commitment of the American people to the common defense of the nation and to the broader causes of peace and

freedom from tyranny throughout the world. It stands as an important symbol of American national unity, a timeless reminder of the moral strength and awesome power that can flow when a free people are at once united and bonded together in a common and just

Location: The memorial rests at the eastern end of the Reflecting Pool along 17th Street, NW/SW.

FDR Memorial



Summary: This is a memorial not only to FDR, but also to the era he represents. The memorial traces twelve years of American History through a sequence of four outdoor rooms-each room is devoted to one of FDR's terms of office. Sculptures inspired by photographs depict the 32nd President: A 10-foot statue shows him in a wheeled chair; a bas-relief depicts him riding in a car during his first inaugural. During the depths of the Great Depression, Roosevelt spoke directly to the people. "I pledge you, I pledge myself," he said in his 1932 acceptance speech, "to a new deal for the American people." Four years later, he proclaimed that "this generation of Americans has a rendezvous with destiny."

Throughout his Presidency, 1933 - 1945, he addressed America by radio in what came to be known as fireside chats. Each idea, each phrase was underscored by courage and optimism that inspired no less in the people he served.

Smithsonian Institute: The Man Who Started It All...

In 1826, James Smithson, a British scientist, drew up his last will and testament, naming his nephew as beneficiary. Smithson stipulated that, should the nephew die without heirs (as he would in 1835), the estate should go "to the United States of America, to found at Washington, under the name of the Smithsonian Institution, an establishment for the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men." The motives behind Smithson's bequest remain mysterious. He never traveled to the United States and seems to have had no correspondence with anyone here. Some have suggested that his bequest was motivated in part by revenge against the rigidities of British society, which had denied Smithson, who was illegitimate, the right to use his father's name. Others have suggested it reflected his interest in the Enlightenment ideals of democracy and universal education.

Smithson died in 1829, and six years later, President Andrew Jackson announced the bequest to Congress. On July 1, 1836, Congress accepted the legacy bequeathed to the nation and pledged the faith of the United States to the charitable trust. In September 1838, Smithson's legacy, which amounted to more than 100,000 gold sovereigns, was delivered to the mint at Philadelphia. Recoined in U.S. currency, the gift amounted to more than \$500,000

After eight years of sometimes heated debate, an Act of Congress signed by President James K. Polk on Aug. 10, 1846, established the Smithsonian Institution as a trust to be administered by a Board of Regents and a Secretary of the Smithsonian.
