

Rep. Sean Patrick Maloney's Hurricane Preparedness Guide

The beginning of June marks the start of another active hurricane season in our region, which will last through the month of November. The last few years we have seen the disastrous effects of superstorms and natural disasters like Irene, Lee, and Sandy – flooding our shores, downing power lines, and severely damaging our homes and businesses.

We must take precautions early, and determine a recovery plan as to minimize damage done during these severe storms. Compiling local, state, and federal resources, I have put together an extensive guide to help you, your family, and your neighbors prepare for this hurricane season.

While these storms may be short-lived, often the damage is substantial and long-lasting. I want to continue to be your partner to ensure our communities rebuild stronger, safer and more resilient to future disasters. The first action I took in Congress was to help pass long-overdue Sandy disaster aid to help small businesses, families and communities hit hardest by these storms. I believe the safety and livelihood of Hudson Valley businesses and families should not be a partisan issue, and I have continued to fight to make sure my neighbors impacted by these disasters continue to receive the assistance they need.

Be Prepared

- · Create an emergency supply kit.
- Assess your risks and know your home's vulnerability to storm surge, flooding and wind
- Create and discuss an evacuation plan with your family.
 Include routes to local shelters, and plans for pets and family members with special medical needs.
- Fill up your car's gas tank.
- Review any insurance policies.
- Take detailed photos of home property and contents and store in a safe place
- Store all important documents in a waterproof container and in a secure location
- Fill the bathtub and other large containers with water for sanitary purposes
- Check your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they are functioning properly
- Maintain portable battery operated AM radio

Check local listings for news stations, and local radio stations

During a Hurricane

- Listen to the radio for critical information from the National Weather Service, or sign up for NY-ALERT.
- Check emergency supply kit.
- Bring inside anything that could be picked up by the wind.
- Close all windows and doors. Close and board up all windows and doors with plywood, if you do not have hurricane shutters.
- Turn your refrigerator and freezer to the coldest setting and keep closed as much as possible, in case of power outages.
- Turn off propane tank.
- Unplug small appliances.
- Listen to and follow evacuation orders, or any other emergency notifications.
