Fighting to protect Medicare, lower drug costs, and trim the deficit

With Congress at loggerheads over how to cut the debt, Rep. Welch has an approach that will save \$160 billion, according to the Congressional Budget Office, while lowering prescription drug prices for seniors and strengthening the Medicare program. Welch's bill would allow the federal government to negotiate prescription drug prices, putting the purchasing power of millions on Medicare beneficiaries to work to lower prescription drug prices for seniors and save taxpayers money. <u>Read more.</u>
