## Congresswoman Terri Sewell Announces \$3.7 Million in Funding to Revitalize the Powell School Building

Birmingham, AL – Congresswoman Terri A. Sewell (D-AL) announced that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has awarded a \$3.7 Million loan to the City of Birmingham to revitalize the Powell School Building.

Integral Group, a local developer, will use the funds to acquire the building which is a vacant former schoolhouse. The building will be converted into 24 units of studio, one-bedroom, and two-bedroom apartments. The property is located in a state-designated redevelopment area in northeast of downtown Birmingham.

"I am thrilled that this award will play a vital role in redeveloping downtown Birmingham. This project will create opportunities for economic development and bring much needed attention to the area. I applaud the efforts of local leaders who have joined together in ensuring that we address deteriorating and blighting structures in the Magic City." Rep. Sewell said.

## Rep. Terri Sewell's Statement on Supreme Court's ruling on Marriage Equality

Congresswoman Terri Sewell issued the following statement after the Supreme Court ruled in favor of marriage equality:

"There are moments in American history when the trajectory of our nation shifts. Today, the Supreme Court's ruling affirmed the basic principle that our Constitution affords all Americans the same equal protections under the law, while also acknowledging our First Amendment right to maintain our own religious beliefs. Marriage licenses are an instrument of the state, and every person should have the rights afforded to all unions sanctioned by the state. This decision positively upholds the equal dignity of all Americans to enter and have the same rights afforded to every union of marriage."

## **Rep. Sewell Praises Supreme Court Decision in King v. Burwell**

Congresswoman Terri Sewell released the following statement after the Supreme Court announced its decision in King v. Burwell:

"The Supreme Court has once again affirmed that the Affordable Care Act is the law of the land. Today's ruling by the Supreme Court is a victory for the 132,000 Alabamians who will be able to keep their health insurance, including 17,000 of my constituents in the 7th Congressional District.

"The costs of providing care for those without insurance would have been shifted to taxpayers and hospitals had the Supreme Court ruled in favor of the plaintiffs. Our nation would have returned to the days when insurance companies were in charge of our health care system. The Affordable Care Act prevented insurers from discriminating against people with pre-existing conditions and from charging women more than men for the same coverage.

"This lawsuit was another costly attempt to unravel the ACA, and to deny health coverage to the people who most need it. The law works, and the tax credits have helped millions of Americans in every state sign up for health insurance. It's time to put an end to these pointless lawsuits that undermine this monumental law."

#### USDA Seeks Applications for Grants to Help Socially-Disadvantaged Producers

WASHINGTON, May 26, 2015 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is now accepting applications to provide technical assistance to socially-disadvantaged groups in rural areas.

"These grants will help socially-disadvantaged business owners develop the tools and skills they need to grow their enterprises and succeed at creating jobs and expanding economic opportunities in rural areas," Vilsack said. "American agriculture is becoming increasingly diverse in many ways, with more minorities and women seeking to enter the field, as well as greater diversity in the age of farmers, the size of operations, in production methods, and in the types of crops being grown. All of these forms of diversity help strengthen U.S. agriculture for the future."

Funding will be made available through USDA's <u>Socially-Disadvantaged Groups Grant Program</u> (formerly the Small, Socially-Disadvantaged Producer Grant Program), which assists organizations that provide technical assistance to socially-disadvantaged groups in rural areas. Examples of technical assistance are conducting feasibility studies, developing business and strategic plans, and providing leadership training.

USDA plans to make up to \$3 million in grants available. The maximum award under this notice is \$175,000. More information on how to apply can be found on page 28937 of the May 20 Federal Register. Applications submitted by mail must be postmarked by July 20, 2015. Electronic applications must be submitted at <a href="http://www.grants.gov">www.grants.gov</a> no later than midnight Eastern Time July 14, 2015.

Eligible applicants include groups of cooperatives, cooperative development centers and individual cooperatives that serve socially-disadvantaged groups. The cooperatives or centers can be located in any area, but the groups assisted must be located in an <u>eligible rural area</u>. Also, the majority of the governing body of the organization must be compromised of individuals who are members of socially-disadvantaged groups.

USDA Rural Development is encouraging applications for projects in census tracts with poverty rates of 20 percent or higher. All grants are awarded through a national competition.

The program is making a difference in many rural areas. For example, in 2013, the Southern California Focus on Cooperation (SCFC) received a \$200,000 Small, Socially-Disadvantaged Producer Grant to provide technical assistance to help 95 refugee immigrant and minority farmers improve their productive capacity, increase revenue, and strengthen their ability to govern and manage their cooperative businesses.

Many of the farmers benefiting from the project had little or no access to formal schooling and had been persecuted and oppressed for years in their native land. The International Rescue Committee (IRC), in concert with SCFC, developed marketing channels including various farmers markets and restaurants where the refugee farmers could sell their produce. Farmers have learned how to manage these marketing channels themselves, without assistance from IRC, and have gained new clients. They have also increased the level of cooperation among Hispanic, Korean and African farmer groups. These groups are working toward merging their efforts to form a single cooperative. The technical assistance provided by SCFC has enabled these farmers to build skills that have truly been life changing.

President Obama's historic investments in rural America have made our rural communities stronger. Under his leadership, these investments in housing, community facilities, businesses and infrastructure have empowered rural America to continue leading the way - strengthening America's economy, small towns and rural communities.

## USDA Seeks Applications to Expand Economic Development in Rural Communities

Washington, District of Columbia, May 15, 2015 -

Agriculture Under Secretary Lisa Mensah today announced that USDA is seeking applications for grants to support rural community economic development.

"This funding from USDA will ensure that technical and financial assistance is available for those who wish to improve the quality of life in rural communities," Mensah said. "Very often, great visions for better rural communities exist, but the next steps toward positive change are unclear. These grants will help rural communities build a path to community economic development so rural America can share in the nation's economic recovery."

Approximately \$10.4 million is being made available under the <u>Rural Community Development</u> <u>Initiative (RCDI) program</u>. Eligible applicants include public, private, and non-profit intermediaries, and federally recognized tribes.

RCDI grants can be used to provide training or technical assistance. Training may be focus on homeownership education, minority business entrepreneurship, strategic community planning or accessing alternative funding sources. Intermediary organizations must provide matching funds at least equal to the RCDI grant. Grants range from \$50,000 to \$250,000.

USDA has invested more than \$33 million through the RCDI program since 2009. In 2013, the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma received a \$150,000 grant to provide home buying and home maintenance education to 50 Native American women in the community of Broken Bow.

Description:	The <u>Council on Foreign Relations</u> is accepting applications for its CFR Fellowship Program, which offers unique opportunities for mid-career professionals focused on international relations.
	The annual program provides fellows with the opportunity to broaden their perspective of foreign affairs and to pursue proposed research, with a placement at either CFR or another institution in New York City or Washington, D.C. The duration of each fellowship is generally twelve months. The program awards a stipend, which varies with each fellowship.

Currently, the program is offering two fellowship tracks, including International Affairs Fellowships and the International Affairs Fellowship in Japan.

1) International Affairs Fellowships: Launched in 1967, this fellowship assists assist mid-career scholars and professionals who want to improve their analytic capabilities and broaden their foreign policy experience. The IAF Program is only open to U.S. citizens and permanent residents between the ages of 27 and 35 who are eligible to work in the United States.

2) International Affairs Fellowship in Japan: Founded in 1997, the IAF-J fellowship seeks to strengthen mutual understanding and cooperation between the rising generations of leaders in the United States and Japan. The program provides a selected group of mid-career U.S. citizens the opportunity to expand their professional horizons by spending a period of research or other professional activity in Japan. The fellowship is only open to U.S. citizens between the ages of 27 and 45 and is intended primarily for those without substantial prior experience in Japan (although the selection committee has made exceptions in cases where the fellowship would allow an individual to add a significant new dimension to his or her career). Knowledge of the Japanese language is not a requirement.

Deadline is July 1, 2015 and October 31, 2015 on an annual basis.





job opportunities. The site is built using an open application programming interface (API) to attract private sector innovation.
