Quick Facts

Section 924(c) Firearms Offenses

In fiscal year 2017, there were 2,075 offenders convicted under 18 U.S.C. § 924(c) accounting for 3.1% of all offenders sentenced under the guidelines. The number of offenders convicted of multiple counts of section 924(c) has decreased from 152 offenders in fiscal year 2013 (6.7% of all section 924(c) offenders) to 124 in fiscal year 2017 (6.0% of all section 924(c) offenders).

Offender and Offense Characteristics

- In fiscal year 2017, most offenders convicted under 18 U.S.C. § 924(c) were men (97.6%).
- The majority were Black (54.2%) followed by Hispanic (25.4%), White (18.1%), and Other Races (2.4%).
- The average age of these offenders at sentencing was 32 years.
- The majority of section 924(c) offenders were United States citizens (92.6%).
- The most common Criminal History Category for these offenders was Category I (27.1%). The proportion of these offenders in other Criminal History Categories was as follows:
 - 12.8% of these offenders were in Category II;
 - 22.4% were in Category III;
 - 12.5% were in Category IV;
 - 8.1% were in Category V; and
 - 17.1% were in Category VI.
- Career offenders (§4B1.1) were 7.9% of all section 924(c) offenders.
- Districts with the highest proportion of their overall caseload comprising section 924(c) offenses were:
 - District of Puerto Rico (13.7% of the overall caseload);
 - Eastern District of Wisconsin (12.5%);
 - Eastern District of North Carolina (11.8%);
 - Southern District of New York (10.8%); and
 - Middle District of Alabama (10.3%).

- ¹ The "30-year" category includes offenders with a single conviction (33.3%) or with multiple convictions (66.7%)
- ²The "Other" category includes offenders with a single conviction (2.6%) or with multiple convictions (97.4%).
- ³ Offenses under section 924(c) carry one of several mandatory minimum penalties depending on the circumstances of the offense

Punishment

- Almost all offenders convicted under 18 U.S.C. § 924(c) were sentenced to imprisonment (99.9%).³
- The majority of offenders (86.0%) convicted under 18 U.S.C. § 924(c) were also convicted of another offense. The most common of these other offenses were drug trafficking (49.1%), robbery (30.8%), and another firearms offense (7.0%).
 - Over one-quarter (27.5%) of all section 924(c) offenders were convicted of another offense carrying a mandatory minimum penalty. In most cases, the other offense was a drug trafficking crime.



Punishment (continued)

- The number of offenders convicted of multiple counts of section 924(c) decreased from 153 in fiscal year 2016 to 124 in fiscal year 2017.
- The average length of sentence for offenders convicted under 18 U.S.C. § 924(c) was 149 months.
 - ◆ The average length of sentence for offenders convicted under only section 924(c) was 73 months;
 - ♦ The average length of sentence for offenders convicted under both section 924(c) and another offense not carrying a mandatory minimum penalty was 133 months;
 - ♦ The average length of sentence for section 924(c) offenders who were determined to be career offenders was 237 months; and
 - ♦ The average length of sentence for offenders convicted of multiple counts of section 924(c) was 356 months.

Sentences Relative to the Guideline Range

Section 924(c) Only Offenses

- In each of the past five years, most offenders convicted only of an offense under section 924(c) were sentenced to the within range guideline sentence.⁴ In fiscal year 2017, 79.9% of section 924(c) only offenders were sentenced to the guideline sentence.
 - ♦ 9.7% of section 924(c) offenders were sentenced below the guideline sentence in fiscal year 2017 pursuant to a substantial assistance departure;
 - ♦ 10.0% of section 924(c) offenders were sentenced above the guideline sentence.

Section 924(c) Cases Involving Career Offenders

- In cases where the offender was convicted under section 924(c) and was also determined to be a career offender, the within guideline range rate has decreased from 29.6% in fiscal year 2013 to 21.8% in fiscal year 2017.
- In fiscal year 2017, 40.4% of these offenders received a sentence below the applicable guideline sentence because the government sponsored the below range sentence.
 - ♦ Substantial assistance departures accounted for 12.8% of all section 924(c) career offender cases in fiscal year 2017.
 - ♦ The average reduction for these offenders was 52.4%.
- A non-government sponsored below range sentence was imposed on 37.2% of section 924(c) career offenders in fiscal year 2017.
 - ♦ The average reduction for these offenders was 30.0%.

All Section 924(c) Offenses


- Both the average guideline minimum and average sentence has decreased over the last five years.
 - ♦ The average guideline minimum decreased from 208 to 198 months;
 - ♦ The average sentence imposed decreased from 155 to 149 months.

⁴The guideline sentence for a section 924(c) offense is the minimum term of imprisonment required by that statute. USSG §2K2.4. Punishments under section 924(c) run consecutively to any other term of imprisonment. 18 U.S.C. § 924(c)(1)(D)(ii).



Distribution of Section 924(c) Offenders With and Without Additional Offenses FY 2017




Sentence Relative to the Guideline Range
