A BILL

To assist in the conservation of the North Atlantic right whale by supporting and providing financial resources for North Atlantic right whale conservation programs and projects of persons with expertise required for the conservation of North Atlantic right whales.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the “Scientific Assistance
3 for Very Endangered North Atlantic Right Whales Act of
4 2018” or the “SAVE Right Whales Act”.

5 **SEC. 2. FINDINGS; SENSE OF CONGRESS.**

6 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

7 (1) North Atlantic right whales (*Eubalaena*
8 *glacialis*) are critically endangered, with fewer than
9 450 whales remaining;

10 (2) historically, the North Atlantic right whale
11 population was decimated by the whaling industry;

12 (3) despite protection from whaling beginning
13 in the 1930s, the North Atlantic right whale is one
14 of the most endangered whales in the world and has
15 experienced a significant decline since 2010;

16 (4) the North Atlantic right whale has been
17 listed as an endangered species under the Endan-
18 gered Species Conservation Act of 1969 (Public Law
19 89–669; 80 Stat. 926) and its successor the Endan-
20 gered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.)
21 since 1970 and is designated as depleted under the
22 Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C.
23 1361 et seq.);

24 (5) because North Atlantic right whales are
25 long-lived and highly migratory, and at present rates
26 females give birth to only a single calf once every 4

1 to 10 years, they are highly vulnerable to the im-
2 pacts of human activity and habitat degradation;

3 (6) North Atlantic right whales frequently cross
4 paths with major shipping lanes and fishing
5 grounds, leaving the whales particularly vulnerable
6 to vessel collisions and fishing gear entanglements,
7 the 2 leading causes of injury and death to the spe-
8 cies;

9 (7) even when North Atlantic right whales do
10 not die as a result of fishing gear entanglement,
11 those whales can still experience significant sub-le-
12 thal effects such as chronic stress and reproductive
13 failure;

14 (8) in August 2017, the National Marine Fish-
15 eries Service announced an Unusual Mortality Event
16 involving North Atlantic right whales in 2017, with
17 17 known whale deaths that year alone;

18 (9) an Unusual Mortality Event involves a sig-
19 nificant die-off of a population and, according to the
20 Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C.
21 1361 et seq.), demands an immediate response;

22 (10) no North Atlantic right whale calves were
23 observed during the 2017–2018 calving season off
24 the southeastern coast of the United States;

(11) based on the current rate of mortality of North Atlantic right whales, and because of the small number of breeding females in the population and low birth rates, recent analysis suggests the species will lose its ability to recover in less than 20 years if human-caused mortality is not reduced immediately;

(12) under the Marine Mammal Protection Act of 1972 (16 U.S.C. 1361 et seq.), United States fishermen in certain locations have been required to modify their fishing gear and behavior to minimize the likelihood of entanglements, including by using sinking groundlines, having weak links in buoy lines, using multiple traps per buoy, appropriately marking fishing gear, and complying with area closures during North Atlantic right whale migrations;

(14) North Atlantic right whales are migrating farther north into Canadian waters and in 2017 there were at least 12 North Atlantic right whale deaths in Canada's Gulf of St. Lawrence, in addition

1 to the 6 documented deaths in United States waters
2 in 2017 and 2018.

3 (b) SENSE OF CONGRESS.—It is the sense of Con-
4 gress that—

5 (1) the governments of the United States and
6 Canada must work together to reduce lethal and
7 sub-lethal effects of human activities on North At-
8 lantic right whales; and

9 (2) effectively addressing the threats to the
10 long-term viability of populations of North Atlantic
11 right whales will require a joint commitment and ef-
12 fort from government entities, local communities,
13 marine scientists and conservationists, fishermen,
14 owners and operators of passenger vessels and oth-
15 others in the shipping industry, and other stakeholders.

16 **SEC. 3. PURPOSES.**

17 The purposes of this Act are the following:

18 (1) To rebuild healthy populations of the North
19 Atlantic right whale.

20 (2) To assist in the conservation and protection
21 of North Atlantic right whales by supporting North
22 Atlantic right whale conservation programs that
23 minimize conflicts between North Atlantic right
24 whales and human activities.

(3) To provide financial resources for those programmes.

3 SEC. 4. NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE CONSERVATION 4 ASSISTANCE.

5 (a) ASSISTANCE.—

6 (1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to the availability of
7 funds and in consultation with other Federal offi-
8 cials, the Secretary of Commerce (in this Act re-
9 ferred to as the “Secretary”) shall provide competi-
10 tive financial assistance, including multiyear grants,
11 for projects for the conservation of North Atlantic
12 right whales for which project proposals are ap-
13 proved by the Secretary in accordance with this sec-
14 tion.

22 (b) PROJECT PROPOSALS.—

23 (1) ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS.—A project proposal
24 may be submitted to the Secretary under this section
25 by—

(A) relevant State and tribal agencies, research institutions, and nonprofit organizations with expertise required for the conservation of North Atlantic right whales; and

(B) any other individual or entity, as determined appropriate by the Secretary, with the expertise required for the conservation of North Atlantic right whales, including large whale disentanglement teams approved by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and members in good standing of the National Marine Mammal Health and Stranding Response Program, sectors of the shipping and fishing industries, fishing gear manufacturers, and rope manufacturers.

(2) FEDERAL PARTNERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES.—

A Federal agency may not be a lead entity or receive funding for a project under this section, but may be included as a partner or collaborator on a project that receives such funding.

(3) REQUIRED ELEMENTS.—A project proposal

shall include—

(A) a statement of the purposes of the
ect;

(B) the name of the entity or individual with overall responsibility for the project;

(C) a description of the qualifications of the entity or individuals that will conduct the project;

(D) a description of—

(i) methods for project implementation and outcome assessment;

(ii) staffing and stakeholder engage-

ment for the project;

(iii) the logistics of the project;

(iv) an estimated timeline for the

project; and

(v) anticipated outcomes of the
ect;

(E) a proposed budget for the funds and time required to complete the project;

(F) information regarding the source and amount of matching funding available for the project;

(G) information that demonstrates the clear potential of the project to contribute to the conservation of North Atlantic right whales;

and

(H) any other information that the Secretary considers to be necessary for evaluating the eligibility of the project for funding under this Act.

5 (c) ANNUAL GRANT PROJECT PROPOSAL SOLICITA-
6 TION, REVIEW, AND APPROVAL.—

14 (C) review each such proposal on a time-
15 line that recognizes the urgency of the declining
16 North Atlantic right whale population to deter-
17 mine whether the proposal meets the criteria
18 specified in subsection (d).

1 (A) consult with respect to the proposal
2 with the government of each State and foreign
3 country in which the project is to be conducted;

4 (B) after taking into consideration any
5 comments resulting from the consultation and
6 any potential losses that could be incurred to
7 the fishing industry as a result of the proposal,
8 approve or disapprove the proposal; and

9 (C) provide written notification of the ap-
10 proval or disapproval to the individual or entity
11 that submitted the proposal, other Federal offi-
12 cials, and each State and foreign country de-
13 scribed in subparagraph (A).

14 (d) CRITERIA FOR APPROVAL.—The Secretary may
15 approve a project proposal under this section if the project
16 shows promise for contributing to recovering and sus-
17 taining a viable population of North Atlantic right whales
18 in the wild by assisting efforts to—

19 (1) implement conservation programs;
20 (2) address the unintentional conflicts between
21 humans and North Atlantic right whales through de-
22 velopment, testing, and use of innovative technology
23 or other methods to reduce the lethal and sub-lethal
24 effects on North Atlantic right whales from vessel
25 collisions and fishing gear entanglements;

1 (3) promote cooperative projects on such topics
2 with foreign governments; or

3 (4) promote cooperative projects on such topics
4 with affected local communities, small businesses
5 such as fishermen, others in the private sector, or
6 nongovernmental organizations.

7 (e) PRIORITY.—To the extent practicable, in deter-
8 mining whether to approve project proposals under this
9 section, the Secretary shall prioritize projects that are de-
10 signed to reduce the lethal and sub-lethal effects of human
11 activities on North Atlantic right whales. In prioritizing
12 such projects, the Secretary shall prioritize, among such
13 projects, projects that are cooperative in nature and in-
14 clude fishing or shipping sector participants.

15 (f) MATCHING REQUIREMENT.—

16 (1) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in para-
17 graph (3), the non-Federal share of the costs of an
18 activity conducted with financial assistance under
19 this section shall be 25 percent of such costs.

20 (2) IN-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS.—The Secretary
21 may apply to the non-Federal share of an activity
22 conducted with financial assistance under this sec-
23 tion the amount of funds, and the fair market value
24 of property and services, provided by non-Federal
25 sources and used for the activity.

6 (g) PROJECT REPORTING.—

22 SEC. 5. NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE INTERAGENCY
23 BUDGET

24 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the Office of
25 Management and Budget shall include, in the budget of

1 the President submitted to Congress under section
2 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code, for fiscal year
3 2020 and each fiscal year thereafter, an interagency budg-
4 et that displays for each Federal agency that engages in
5 North Atlantic right whale activities—

6 (1) the amount of appropriations and expendi-
7 tures for the preceding fiscal year for such activities
8 and a description of such activities;

9 (2) the estimated amount to be expended dur-
10 ing the current fiscal year for such activities and a
11 description of such activities; and

12 (3) the amount estimated to be necessary for
13 the next fiscal year for such activities and a descrip-
14 tion of such activities.

15 (b) NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE ACTIVITIES
16 DEFINED.—In this section, the term “North Atlantic
17 right whale activities” means any activity of a Federal
18 agency to study, observe, monitor, manage, protect, con-
19 serve, or restore the North Atlantic right whale population
20 through direct or indirect means, including through the
21 provision of competitive financial assistance to non-Fed-
22 eral entities.

23 **SEC. 6. REPORT TO CONGRESS.**

24 Not later than 2 years after the date of the enact-
25 ment of this Act, and annually thereafter, the Secretary

1 shall submit to Congress a report on the results and effec-
2 tiveness of projects receiving assistance provided under
3 this Act, including recommendations concerning how this
4 Act might be improved and whether funding for this Act
5 should be continued in the future.

6 **SEC. 7. FUNDING.**

7 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

8 (1) AUTHORIZATION.—There is authorized to
9 be appropriated to the Secretary to carry out this
10 Act \$5,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2018
11 through 2028.

12 (2) ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.—Of the
13 amounts authorized to be appropriated under this
14 subsection for a fiscal year, the Secretary may ex-
15 pend not more than 5 percent, or up to \$80,000,
16 whichever is greater, to pay the administrative ex-
17 penses necessary to carry out this Act.

18 (3) SUPPLEMENT NOT SUPPLANT.—The
19 amount authorized to be appropriated by paragraph
20 (1) shall supplement and not supplant other
21 amounts available to the Secretary.

22 (b) ACCEPTANCE AND USE OF DONATIONS.—The
23 Secretary may accept, receive, solicit, hold, administer,

- 1 and use any gift, devise, or bequest to provide assistance
- 2 under section 5.

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
