A BILL

To provide additional time for the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to issue achievable standards for cement manufacturing facilities, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 *This Act may be cited as the “Cement Sector Regu-*
5 *latory Relief Act of 2011”.*

6 **SEC. 2. LEGISLATIVE STAY.**

7 *(a) ESTABLISHMENT OF STANDARDS.—In place of the*
8 *rules specified in subsection (b), and notwithstanding the*
9 *date by which such rules would otherwise be required to be*
10 *promulgated, the Administrator of the Environmental Pro-*
11 *tection Agency (in this Act referred to as the “Adminis-*
12 *trator”) shall—*

13 *(1) propose regulations for the Portland cement*
14 *manufacturing industry and Portland cement plants*
15 *subject to any of the rules specified in subsection*
16 *(b)—*

17 *(A) establishing maximum achievable con-*
18 *trol technology standards, performance stand-*
19 *ards, and other requirements under sections 112*
20 *and 129, as applicable, of the Clean Air Act (42*
21 *U.S.C. 7412, 7429); and*

22 *(B) identifying non-hazardous secondary*
23 *materials that, when used as fuels or ingredients*
24 *in combustion units of such industry and plants*
25 *are solid waste under the Solid Waste Disposal*

1 *Act (42 U.S.C. 6901 et seq.; commonly referred*
2 *to as the “Resource Conservation and Recovery*
3 *Act”)* for purposes of determining the extent to
4 *which such combustion units are required to*
5 *meet the emissions standards under section 112*
6 *of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7412) or the*
7 *emission standards under section 129 of such Act*
8 *(42 U.S.C. 7429); and*

9 *(2) finalize the regulations on the date that is 15*
10 *months after the date of the enactment of this Act.*

11 ***(b) STAY OF EARLIER RULES.—***

12 *(1) The following rule is of no force or effect,*
13 *shall be treated as though such rule had never taken*
14 *effect, and shall be replaced as described in subsection*
15 *(a): “National Emission Standards for Hazardous*
16 *Air Pollutants from the Portland Cement Manufac-*
17 *turing Industry and Standards of Performance for*
18 *Portland Cement Plants”, published at 75 Fed. Reg.*
19 *54970 (September 9, 2010).*

20 *(2) The following rules are of no force or effect,*
21 *shall be treated as though such rules had never taken*
22 *effect, and shall be replaced as described in subsection*
23 *(a), insofar as such rules are applicable to the Port-*
24 *land cement manufacturing industry and Portland*
25 *cement plants:*

1 (A) “Standards of Performance for New
2 Stationary Sources and Emission Guidelines for
3 Existing Sources: Commercial and Industrial
4 Solid Waste Incineration Units”, published at
5 76 Fed. Reg. 15704 (March 21, 2011).

6 (B) “Identification of Non-Hazardous Sec-
7 ondary Materials That Are Solid Waste”, pub-
8 lished at 76 Fed. Reg. 15456 (March 21, 2011).

9 **SEC. 3. COMPLIANCE DATES.**

10 (a) *ESTABLISHMENT OF COMPLIANCE DATES.*—For
11 each regulation promulgated pursuant to section 2, the Ad-
12 ministrators—

13 (1) shall establish a date for compliance with
14 standards and requirements under such regulation
15 that is, notwithstanding any other provision of law,
16 not earlier than 5 years after the effective date of the
17 regulation; and

18 (2) in proposing a date for such compliance,
19 shall take into consideration—

20 (A) the costs of achieving emissions reduc-
21 tions;

22 (B) any non-air quality health and envi-
23 ronmental impact and energy requirements of
24 the standards and requirements;

1 (C) *the feasibility of implementing the*
2 *standards and requirements, including the time*
3 *needed to—*

4 (i) *obtain necessary permit approvals;*

5 *and*

6 (ii) *procure, install, and test control*
7 *equipment;*

8 (D) *the availability of equipment, suppliers,*
9 *and labor, given the requirements of the regula-*
10 *tion and other proposed or finalized regulations*
11 *of the Environmental Protection Agency; and*

12 (E) *potential net employment impacts.*

13 (b) *NEW SOURCES.—The date on which the Adminis-*
14 *trator proposes a regulation pursuant to section 2(a)(1) es-*
15 *tablishing an emission standard under section 112 or 129*
16 *of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7412, 7429) shall be treated*
17 *as the date on which the Administrator first proposes such*
18 *a regulation for purposes of applying the definition of a*
19 *new source under section 112(a)(4) of such Act (42 U.S.C.*
20 *7412(a)(4)) or the definition of a new solid waste inciner-*
21 *ation unit under section 129(g)(2) of such Act (42 U.S.C.*
22 *7429(g)(2)).*

23 (c) *RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this Act*
24 *shall be construed to restrict or otherwise affect the provi-*

1 sions of paragraphs (3)(B) and (4) of section 112(i) of the
2 Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7412(i)).

3 **SEC. 4. ENERGY RECOVERY AND CONSERVATION.**

4 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, and to
5 ensure the recovery and conservation of energy consistent
6 with the Solid Waste Disposal Act (42 U.S.C. 6901 et seq.;
7 commonly referred to as the “Resource Conservation and
8 Recovery Act”), in promulgating rules under section 2(a)
9 addressing the subject matter of the rules specified in section
10 2(b)(2), the Administrator—

11 (1) shall adopt the definitions of the terms “com-
12 mercial and industrial solid waste incineration
13 unit”, “commercial and industrial waste”, and “con-
14 tained gaseous material” in the rule entitled “Stand-
15 ards of Performance for New Stationary Sources and
16 Emission Guidelines for Existing Sources: Commer-
17 cial and Industrial Solid Waste Incineration Units”,
18 published at 65 Fed. Reg. 75338 (December 1, 2000);
19 and

20 (2) shall identify non-hazardous secondary mate-
21 rial to be solid waste only if—

22 (A) the material meets such definition of
23 commercial and industrial waste; or

24 (B) if the material is a gas, it meets such
25 definition of contained gaseous material.

1 **SEC. 5. OTHER PROVISIONS.**

2 (a) *ESTABLISHMENT OF STANDARDS ACHIEVABLE IN*
3 *PRACTICE.*—*In promulgating rules under section 2(a), the*
4 *Administrator shall ensure that emissions standards for ex-*
5 *isting and new sources established under section 112 or 129*
6 *of the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7412, 7429), as applicable,*
7 *can be met under actual operating conditions consistently*
8 *and concurrently with emission standards for all other air*
9 *pollutants regulated by the rule for the source category, tak-*
10 *ing into account variability in actual source performance,*
11 *source design, fuels, inputs, controls, ability to measure the*
12 *pollutant emissions, and operating conditions.*

13 (b) *REGULATORY ALTERNATIVES.*—*For each regula-*
14 *tion promulgated pursuant to section 2(a), from among the*
15 *range of regulatory alternatives authorized under the Clean*
16 *Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq.) including work practice*
17 *standards under section 112(h) of such Act (42 U.S.C.*
18 *7412(h)), the Administrator shall impose the least burden-*
19 *some, consistent with the purposes of such Act and Execu-*
20 *tive Order 13563 published at 76 Fed. Reg. 3821 (January*
21 *21, 2011).*

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
