

One Year In, Trump Administration Still Hampered By Unprecedented Dysfunction

Nominations Withdrawn for Radical Views, Absence of Qualifications, and Lack of Bipartisan Support. Nominees to high-ranking executive branch positions have been forced to withdraw once their past controversies have come to light. Some of President Trump's judicial nominees have resigned due to a clear lack of qualifications. Over the last year, 22 of President Trump's nominations have been withdrawn.

Trump's First Year Clouded by Firings, Withdrawals, and Resignations. At the highest levels, the Trump administration has been derailed thanks to firings and resignations in the wake of scandals and infighting.

Even Republican Senators Have Blocked Unqualified and Radical Trump Nominees. In Trump's first year, 18 Republican senators have either placed holds on or threatened to hold up Trump nominees. This includes Republican Whip John Cornyn (R-TX), NRSC Chairman Cory Gardner (R-CO), and several Republican committee chairs.

NOMINATIONS WITHDRAWN FOR RADICAL VIEWS, ABSENCE OF QUALIFICATIONS, AND LACK OF BIPARTISAN SUPPORT

Andrew Puzder (Secretary of Labor): "The fast-food executive Andrew F. Puzder withdrew his nomination to be labor secretary on Wednesday as **<u>Republican senators turned sharply against him</u>**, the latest defeat for a White House besieged by infighting and struggling for traction even with a Republican-controlled Congress." Sam Clovis (Under Secretary of USDA): "Clovis has come under criticism recently for his <u>lack of science</u> <u>credentials and for his role supervising George Papadopoulos</u>, a Trump campaign foreign policy adviser who struck a plea deal on charges he lied to FBI investigators about his communications with Russia-linked contacts." Brett Talley (US District Judge for the Middle District of Alabama): "Talley had been rated 'unanimously unqualified' for the post by the American Bar Association this year after an evaluation that questioned his experience. <u>Talley had never argued a case, or even a motion, in federal court</u>, he testified." [NPR, <u>12/13/17</u>]

Jeff Mateer (US District Judge for the Eastern District of Texas): "Jeff Mateer, a top lawyer for the state of Texas who has <u>described transgender children as evidence of 'Satan's plan,'</u> will not become a federal judge." [Dallas Morning News, <u>12/13/17</u>]

Matthew Petersen (US District Judge for the District of Columbia) "President Donald Trump's judicial nominee Matthew Petersen has withdrawn his name from consideration after a video went viral of him **failing to answer basic questions about law** in his confirmation hearing, according to an aide to a senior member of the Senate Judiciary Committee." Mark Green (Secretary of the Army)*: "President Donald Trump's choice for Army secretary announced Friday that he is withdrawing his name from consideration." ... "The decision by Green, Trump's second pick for the post, came after his nomination ran into trouble following a backlash after **past controversial statements on LGBT issues, Islam and evolution** were revealed." Daniel Craig (Deputy Administrator of FEMA) "President Donald Trump's nominee for the No. 2 spot at the Federal Emergency Management Agency withdrew from consideration on Wednesday after NBC News raised questions about a federal investigation that found <u>he had falsified government travel and</u> <u>timekeeping records</u> when he served in the Bush administration in 2005. [NBC, <u>9/13/17</u>]

Michael Dourson (Assistant Administrator of the EPA): "His withdrawal followed the release of several hundreds of pages of his correspondence with chemical industry officials while he was being considered for the E.P.A. job." [NYT, <u>12/13/17</u>]

David Jonas (General Counsel of the Department of Energy): "A Department of Energy nominee who co-wrote a piece in 1993 objecting to gay people serving in the military withdrew from consideration on Sunday." [The Hill, <u>1/8/18</u>]

Timothy Kelly (Assistant Secretary of Education): "Last week, Michigan state lawmaker Timothy Kelly withdrew his name from consideration to be assistant secretary of Education for career, technical and adult education, after **offensive blog posts** he wrote from 2009 to 2012 came to light." TRUMP'S FIRST YEAR CLOUDED BY FIRINGS, WITHDRAWALS, AND RESIGNATIONS

Tom Price (Secretary of Health and Human Services): "Tom Price, the health and human services secretary, **resigned under pressure on Friday after racking up at least \$400,000 in travel bills** for chartered flights and undermining President Trump's promise to drain the swamp of a corrupt and entitled capital." Michael Flynn (National Security Adviser): "Michael T. Flynn, the national security adviser, resigned on Monday night after it was revealed that <u>he had misled Vice President Mike Pence and other top White</u> <u>House officials about his conversations with the Russian ambassador</u> to the United States." Reince Priebus (Chief of Staff): "Reince Priebus, the White House chief of staff who failed to impose order on a chaos-racked West Wing, <u>was pushed out on Friday after a stormy six-month tenure</u>, and President Trump replaced him with John F. Kelly, the secretary of homeland security and retired four-star Marine general." [NYT, <u>7/28/17</u>]

Stephen Bannon (White House Chief Strategist): "Stephen K. Bannon, the embattled chief strategist who helped President Trump win the 2016 election but clashed for months with other senior West Wing advisers, is leaving his post, a White House spokeswoman announced Friday." [NYT, <u>8/18/17]</u>

Anthony Scaramucci (White House Communications Director): "President Trump has decided to remove Anthony Scaramucci from his position as communications director, three people close to the decision said Monday, relieving him just days after Mr. Scaramucci **unloaded a crude verbal tirade** against other senior members of the president's senior staff." Sean Spicer (Press Secretary): "Sean Spicer, the White House press secretary, resigned on Friday morning, telling President Trump he vehemently disagreed with the appointment of New York financier Anthony Scaramucci as communications director." [NYT, 7/21/17]
