In discretionary funding, targeting key conservative priorities like bolstering biodefense, fighting the opioid crisis, boosting school safety, and supporting job training programs that spur economic growth

INVESTING IN PUBLIC HEALTH AND MEDICAL RESEARCH

- Invests an additional \$3B in programs that help states, tribes, local governments, nonprofits, and faith-based groups prevent, treat, and stop the opioid abuse epidemic, which the President has declared a national public health emergency
- Boosts funding for the National Institutes of Health by \$3B, totaling \$37B, which will continue progress toward finding cures for cancer, Alzheimer's disease, and other life-threatening conditions
- Protects Americans from man-made and naturally occurring health threats by significantly increasing funding for biodefense activities: \$537M for BARDA; \$710M for Project BioShield; \$610M for the Strategic National Stockpile; \$250M for pandemic flu preparedness; \$480M for the construction of a new biosafety level 4 lab at CDC; and \$100M to continue NIH research to develop a universal flu vaccine
- Includes flexible funding for mental health programs designed by local governments and schools that will enable them to find creative solutions to improve school safety
- Provides additional funding for adoption incentives, Meals on Wheels, and family caregiver support

PREPARING STUDENTS AND A 21ST CENTURY WORKFORCE

- Increases funding for training in high-growth job fields, including nursing, dentistry, primary health care, and mental health targeting programs toward veterans, young adults, and displaced workers struggling to enter new career fields, including a \$50M increase for apprenticeship programs
- Boosts funding for child care and early head start programs to enable job seekers to find high-quality care for their children that will allow them to enter or return to the workforce
- Increases public school options for all families by providing a \$58M increase for charter schools
- Enables local school districts to provide free, appropriate public education for all children regardless of their disabilities by **increasing special education funding by \$300M**
- Provides a \$75M increase for career and technical education programs that help young people enter careers in fields that do not require a four-year college degree
- Includes an \$85M increase for Impact Aid education programs

PROTECTING CONSERVATIVE PRIORITIES

- **Continues all existing pro-life provisions**, including the Hyde amendment, the Dickey-Wicker amendment, and the Weldon amendment
- Holds down funding for controversial labor enforcement agencies at the Department of Labor
- Freezes funding for family planning and teen pregnancy prevention grants, while increasing sexual risk avoidance programs by 67% (a \$25M increase above FY17)
- Rejects language pushed by Democrats that would have tied the hands of the Trump Administration and forced continued funding for certain Planned Parenthood entities and other controversial family planning grantees
