# A BILL

For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, including overtime, hazardous duty pay differential, and Government contributions for health, retirement, social security, professional liability insurance, and other applicable employee benefits, \$277,289,000, to be disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police or his designee.
