Getting to Know the District: Highlighting the Franklinton Neighborhood

Franklinton is located on the banks of the Scioto River and immediately west of downtown Columbus. Franklinton was founded by Lucas Sullivant in 1797 as the first American settlement in Franklin County, Ohio. As the City of Columbus grew, the city annexed and incorporated the existing Franklinton neighborhood.

Approximately 36,000 people call Franklinton home, and under former Columbus Mayor Michael B. Coleman, a concerted effort was made to revitalize and reinvest in the neighborhood. These efforts are still ongoing, and the City of Columbus is squarely focused on further modernization and strengthening of the area economy.

As the Member of Congress for Ohio's Third Congressional District, Congresswoman Beatty has the privilege of representing residents of Franklinton in the U.S. House of Representatives. In Congress, she is working with state and local officials to attract new business opportunities and housing development projects to the community and is committed to helping constituents resolve problems with their Social Security, Medicare, VA, and many other federal issues.

Congresswoman Beatty recently lead a press call with national and local media, highlighting her commitment to better jobs, better healthcare, and a better future for all Americans. Coinciding with the call, Democrats released a new report on the economic struggles facing hardworking families and middle-class Americans. Highlights from "For the People: Report on Impacts of GOP Agenda on Health and Economic Security of Ohioans" include:

- 78 percent of full-time workers are living paycheck-to-paycheck.
- Real wages have fallen in Ohio since 2017.
- One million Ohio taxpayers will see no tax benefit by 2019.
- Health coverage for more than 4.8 million Ohioans with pre-existing conditions is in jeopardy if the Affordable Care Act is repealed.

Reacting to the new report, Beatty said, "Americans want a government for the people. This report shows that many of my constituents, their families, and our seniors are struggling to simply make ends meet. That is why I will continue to do everything in my power to ensure all their voices are heard, and that we work to close the wage gap and growing wealth inequality."

Working to Improve Central **Ohio's Mail Delivery**

Following several complaints about mail being delivered to incorrect addresses, unacceptable delays, and-even worse—lost mail, Congresswoman Beatty sprung into action.

Since first becoming aware of potential problems in March 2018, she and her District staff have held weekly phone calls with local and regional officials regarding service, hiring efforts, and individual cases. Staff has traveled across the state on multiple occasions for one-on-one meetings with United States Postal Service (USPS) leadership and secured a commitment from the agency to hire more than 800 carriers throughout the area. Also, the USPS created a new Consumer Advisory Council to provide feedback and suggestions on how to improve quality of services. This is the third such council ever created and came about after communication between Deputy U.S. Postmaster General Ronald Stroman and staff.
