1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Shark Fin Sales Elimi-
3	nation Act of 2019".
4	SEC. 2. PROHIBITION ON SALE OF SHARK FINS.
5	(a) Prohibition.—Except as provided in sections 3
6	and 4, no person shall possess, offer for sale, sell, or pur-
7	chase any shark fin or product containing any shark fin.
8	(b) Penalty.—For purposes of section 308(a) of the
9	Magnuson-Stevens Fishery Conservation and Manage-
10	ment Act (16 U.S.C. 1858(a)), a violation of this section
11	shall be treated as an act prohibited by section 307 of
12	that Act.

3	SEC. 4. EXEMPTION FOR DOGFISH.
4	(a) In General.—It shall not be a violation of sec-
5	tion 2 for any person to possess, offer for sale, sell, or
6	purchase any fresh or frozen raw fin or tail from any stock
7	of the species Mustelus canis (smooth dogfish) or Squalus
8	acanthias (spiny dogfish).
9	(b) Report.—By not later than January 1, 2027,
10	the Secretary of Commerce should review the exemption
11	in subsection (a) and should prepare and submit to the
12	Congress a report that includes a recommendation on
13	whether the exemption should continue or be terminated.
14	In preparing such report and making such recommenda-
15	tion, the Secretary should analyze factors including—
16	(1) the economic viability of dogfish fisheries
17	with and without the continuation of the exemption;
18	(2) the impact to ocean ecosystems of con-
19	tinuing or terminating the exemption;
20	(3) the impact on enforcement of the ban con-
21	tained in section 3 caused by the exemption; and
22	(4) the impact of the exemption on shark con-
23	servation.

1 SEC. 5. INCLUSION OF RAYS AND SKATES IN SEAFOOD

- 2 TRACEABILITY PROGRAM.
- Not later than 1 year after the date of the enactment
- 4 of this Act, the Secretary of Commerce shall revise section
- 5 300.324 of title 50, Code of Federal Regulations, to in-
- 6 clude rays and skates in the species and species groups
- 7 specified in subsection (a)(2) of such section.
- 8 SEC. 6. DEFINITIONS.
- 9 In this Act:
- 10 (1) Shark.—The term "shark" means any spe-
- 11 cies of the orders Pristiophoriformes,
- 12 Squatiniformes, Squaliformes, Hexanchiformes,
- Lamniformes, Carchariniformes, Orectolobiformes,
- and Heterodontiformes.
- 15 (2) Shark fin.—The term "shark fin" means
- the raw, dried, or otherwise processed detached fin,
- or the raw, dried, or otherwise processed detached
- tail, of a shark.
- 19 SEC. 7. STATE AUTHORITY.
- Nothing in this Act affects any right of a State or
- 21 territory of the United States to adopt or enforce any reg-
- 22 ulation or standard that is more stringent than a regula-
- 23 tion or standard in effect under this Act.
- 24 SEC. 8. DETERMINATION OF BUDGET EFFECTS.
- The budgetary effects of this Act, for the purpose of
- 26 complying with the Statutory Pay-As-You-Go Act of 2010,

- 1 shall be determined by reference to the latest statement
- 2 titled "Budgetary Effects of PAYGO Legislation" for this
- 3 Act, submitted for printing in the Congressional Record
- 4 by the Chairman of the House Budget Committee, pro-
- 5 vided that such statement has been submitted prior to the
- 6 vote on passage.
