They left Lodi at 9:30 a.m. on April 6, 1966 and arrived at Thornton, California, at 2:30 p.m., where they spent the night. At 10:00 a.m., April 7, 1966, the marchers left Thornton and were headed toward Hood, California, where they will stay overnight. They are scheduled to go from Hood to Freeport, California, for an overnight stay on April 8, 1966, then to West Sacramento on April 9, 1966 and then to arrive in Sacramento to see the Governor on Easter Sunday, April 10, 1966.

On April 8, 1966, Gilbert Padilla, Vice-President of the National Farm Workers Union, advised the local Palm Springs newspaper that support of the striking Delano grape workers had a route for the protest march they will hold in Palm Springs, California, on Sunday afternoon. The march will be organized at Ruth Hardy Park and will return there for disbandment.

According to Padilla the new route and the choice of the park as an organization point was made necessary when Reverend Thomas J. Flahive, Pastor of the Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church refused use of church grounds. He said marchers will gather at Hardy Park at 2:00 p. m. Sunday, April 10, 1966, and the parade will begin thirty minutes later. The route will be west on Tamarisk to Palm Canyon then south to Arenas where marchers will turn north again and retrace their steps to the park.

According to the Arril 8, 1966, issue of the Press Enterprise Newspaper the protest march was first organized by the Riverside County Committee in support of the Delano grape strikers after it was announced by Governor Edmund G. Brown he would not meet Easter Sunday in Sacramento with paraders there.

Instead his aids announced he would spend the Easter week end with his family at Frank Sinatra's Tamarisk Country Club home in Palm Springs.

Since then Governor Brown has agreed to meet the strikers in Sacramento but the Palm Springs parade will be started nevertheless as a gestere of sympathy with the strikers in Delano.

Reference is made to memorandum dated April 8, 1966.

On April 11, 1966,

advised that the parade was conducted in Palm Springs, California, by a group in sympathy with the Delano grape strikers. The parade was conducted in a peaceful and orderly manner and no incidents occurred.

The Daily Enterprise, a newspaper for Riverside County, in an article dated April 11, 1966, set forth in part that following an orderly parade of some 300 persons through downtown Palm Springs yesterday, leaders of the "Committee to Support the Delano Grape Strikers" pledged to keep their group alive to aid the farm workers in California. The march did not attract any large number of onlookers despite its wide publicity over the past week. Little girls in starched Easter dresses solemnly paraded carrying signs that read, "Away With Farm Slavery." The marchers did not meet with Governor Edmund Brown, who was spending the day in Palm Springs with his family at the Frank Sinatra residence, but they did not expect to.

Following the wind-blown parade over a mile or so along Palm Canyon Drive, the marchers returned to Hardy Park, the organizational point, whereleaders of the committee called upon participants to continue their efforts in behalf of the farm workers.

I know that inevitably questions will come up in the Bureau regarding the union and any participation that I might have had in this matter. For your personal information I had no knowledge of the agreement, nor of the negotiations. I was not consulted; I did not approve the agreement, nor was I informed of the developments. In fact I have never met Sidney Korshak who is well known to the Bureau. 100 41416

# DETAILS.

#### **EACKGROUND:**

by letter of 4-11-66, referred to radio announcements indicating that Schenley industries, inc., agreed-to recognize the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) and that this agreement had been executed with Cesar Chavez, representing NFWA, and Sidney Korshak, attorney for Schenley. The Director has requested a summary on NFWA and Korshak.

## LIBURGATION IN BUFILES:

Our files reveal that the NFWA first came to our attention in October, 1965, when contacted the Eureau to advise that the Was concerned over an amountement that the Office of Economic Opportunity (OLO) had granted this union \$267,887 to use in a self-help project to teach migrant workers in Kern, Rings and Tulare counties of California citizenship and money management. Since our files contained no record identifiable with this union, we requested our Los Angeles Office to furnish information available to them regarding NFVA.

Our Los Angeles Office advised on 10-20-65 that NFV. A was a local independent union which reportedly had only become affiliated with AFL-CIO since September, 1965. Allegedly this affiliation was only for the purpose of supporting the migrat farmers and grape pickers strike in Delanc, California. It was further reported that the NIWA was led by a Cesar L. Chavez and the purpose of this union was supposedly to improve the wages and living conditions of the migrant farm worker in this part of California. This union claims it is an independent organization with offices at 102 Albany attract, Delano, California.

We have conducted limited inquiries concerning NFV A for the purpose of determining whether it has been infiltrated or controlled by the communists. Our information indicates that it is not controlled or guided by the communists but that several individuals that are allegedly members of this

organization have extremely liberal views. It has also been determined that various known Communist Party (CP) members or sympathizers have furnished support to the NFWA in connection with its conflict with the grape growers in this part of California.

Cesar E Chavez: - Din Moky

Cesar E. Chavez has been described as the founder and Director of the NFWA. He reportedly was born on 1-31-27, possibly at Delano, California. He resided at 1221 Kensington Street, Delano, California, and has spent about 14 years in the San Jose, California, area prior to 1963 as a recruiter for the Community Service Organization (CSO) at San Jose. CSO is a "war on poverty" type organization. Chavez refuses to answer any questionnaires directed at him by Credit Bureaus or similar organizations. He has openly been called a communist at Delano City Council meetings; however, our sources do not possess any definite information in this regard even though Chavez reportedly associates with "left-wing" type individuals and allegedly has been known to distribute copies of "People's World," a west coast communist newspaper, free of charge.

Chavez publishes and sells a paper called "El Malcriado" which is described as the voice of the farm worker and the official voice of the NFWA. Chavez has reportedly stated that he desires to open general stores in the San Joaquin Valley to sell "commodities to farm workers at discount prices" and to therefore create a boycott of local businesses. He allegedly has also started a credit union for the farm workers who are members of the NFWA. One of our sources has stated the opinion that Chavez is not altogether sincere in his desire to assist migrant workers but rather is interested in making a name for himself and to gain financially. It was also reported that the \$267,887 grant approved by OEO for NFWA has aroused considerable public opinion against it.

In addition to Chavez, we have learned that Wendy Goepel, Harvey Richards, David Havens and Dolores Huerta are involved in NFWA activities.

Wendy Goepel:

Wendy Goepel is apparently identical with Wendy Pangburn Goepel who reportedly was considering attending the Eighth World Youth Festival in Helsinki, Finland, in 1962 along with other Stanford University students. There is no indication that she did attend.

# David Sard THavens:

David Ward: Expens, a white male, born 12-17-35 and who resided at Visalia, California, in October, 1965, listed his employment as being with the National Council of Churches and an active member of the California Migrant Farm Ministry, a subsidiary of the National Council of Churches. During May, 1965, liavens participated in a farm workers' strike in Delano along with Chavez. In addition to being an advisor of the MFVA, he also participated in their picketing activities.

## Dolores Clara Huerta:

Dolores there Huerts, also known as Dolores there if only a Mexican lengte, was born on 4-10-30 and resides at Delano, California. This is the Vice-President of MFV A and has no other employment listed. The Edit been active in the Delano area for several years and is reported as the criving force on the picket lines of MFWA. Huerts was the individual who traveled to Vashington, D. C., on behalf of Chaves and NFWA for the purpose of obtaining the grant from OEO.

Information coming to our attention from various confidential sources of our Los Angeles Office Indicates that various (I members or sympathizers such as

On April 22, 1966, a source advised he had received information to the effect that officials and associates of the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) in the future were planning ways to discredit law enforcement agencies in localities effected by the farm labor strike. In the past NFWA has prepared publicity in advance of marches and large picket lines, with a view toward being arrested for offenses such as not having a parade permit or trespassing on private property. This source expects that NFWA will very shortly attempt to file civil rights complaints with the U.S. Department of Justice and state authorities. Source prodicted that violations of law would be planned by NFWA, and carried through, with a view toward causing situations with law enforcement agencies which could be draished into civil rights matter at a later date.

An article appearing in the April 22, 1966 issue of the "Los Angeles Times", a daily newspaper published in Los Angeles, California, revealed that on the previous Wednesday, NFWA Director Cesar/Chavez and his aides met secretly with Vice President of the Di Giorgio Corporation Bruce W. Sanborn, Jr. in Fresno in an effort to work out differences over a company proposal to have an election to determine if the farm workers wanted to be represented by the union. This article went on to state as follows:

CALL TO ACTIONS

Since September 8, 1965, 3500 farm worker families in Delano, California, have been on strike to get for themselves those things other workers are legally guaranteed: the right to organize into a union and to bargain collectively, the right to a living wage, the right to humane working conditions and the right to dignity on the job.

DiGiorgio Corporation, which last year grossed \$231,800,000, which owns 4600 acres in the strike zone (and more than 26,000 acres all together), which has four directors on the board of the huge B ank of America, and whose wide-ranging corporate interests make it truly an economic octopus, is being challenged by its field workers, whose only power is their unity of purpose and strength of determination, and whose only weapon is their non-violent strike.

#### THEY NEED YOUR HELP!

A nation-wide boycott is being conducted against DiGiorgio products. S & W Foods warehouses are being closed down in California and New England by large groups of pickets with the support of Teamsters' unions.

The midwest distribution center for DiGiorgio products is here in Chicago. It is crucial that it be closed down temporarily to show DiGiorgio the strength of support for the strike. The Teamsters have indicated willingness to respect picket lines at the warehouse. Whether they do or not may be contingent upon the force of our picket line.

The warehouse is located at 3350 N. Kedzie, one block north of Belmont and the JFK Expressway. On Monday, May 23, 1966, at 7:00 AM, people from all parts of the city will meet at the S & W warehouse for a mass demonstration-picket. The most effective aid you can give the strikers is to be there.



Arnold secured this authority and was then permitted to distribute the leaflet with the stamp of the "SDS, UICC Chapter" thereon.

that telephone number 939-2794 is listed to the Catholic Bishop of Chicago Resettlement and/or Cardinal's Committee for Spanish Speaking People, 1300 North Wabash Avenue, Chicago, Illinois. An unidentified person answering the telephone revealed that Harry Johnson who is affiliated with the NFWA had been given space, and use of the aforementioned telephone, at the address because of the interest various members of the Catholic clergy have taken in the plight of Spanish speaking persons here in the United States. The aforementioned unidentified person answering the telephone stated that at that time Johnson was out conducting the picketing of the S & W Food Company Warehouse.

Also on May 23, 1966, it was ascertained that Paul Booth, self identified as National Secretary of the SDS, and the SDS itself had an interest in the picketing of the S & W Food Company Warehouse. According to Booth, the SDS had persons out picketing the S & W Food Company Warehouse that date and that Lee Webb, a SDS member associated with the United Packing House Food and Allied Workers of America in Chicago, was the person handling the SDS interest in this matter.

on May 23, 1966, advised that the boycott against DiGiorgio Corporation products at the 8 & W Food Company Warehouse, Chicago, began at 7:00 AM on May 23, 1966, and ended at 4:00 PM, that date when the warehouse closed for the evening. The peak of the demonstration was shortly before 9:00 AM when an estimated 60 pickets were participating. Most of the pickets left before 9:00 AM and a skeleton force ranging from four to six pickets remained until the warehouse closed for the evening, at which time the remaining pickets disbursed. The picketing was peaceful, there were no incidents and no arrests ware starts.

on May 23, 1966, it was learned through Harry Johnson representing the NFWA that he had conducted the Chicago phase of the national boycott against the DiGiorgio Corporation, and Schenley Products at the S & W Food Company Warehouse, 3350 North Kedzie Avenue, Chicago, that date from 7:00 AM until 4:00 PM. The purpose of this boycott was to close down the Chicago Nidwest, California and New England distribution centers of DiGiorgio products. At the peak of the demonstration some 60

pickets are present, made up of persons from the SDS, Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), American Friends Service Committee (Quakers), striking Chicago welfare employees and some Catholic and Protestent groups and/or representatives. A good number of the pickets were students who left before 9:00 AM and a token force of four to six pickets remained at the scene until the warehouse closed in the evening. Johnson stated that Lee Webb of the SDS was active in co-ordinating the actions of the SDS pickets during the demonstration.

Continuing it was learned from Johnson that there was no outright support of the picketing by the Teamsters Union itself but that the picketers received some individual support from a number of the teamster workers who refused to cross the picket line. It was also learned through Johnson that Cesar Chavez, active in organizing the grape workers in California, had been in Chicago that date confering in reference to the strike with various people in the Chicago area. He left at 1:45 PM and returned to California. Johnson said that in the past the NFWA had received the support of some Teamster Union locals in carrying out their strike against the DiGiorgio Corporation products. They had been most successful with the Teamster Union on the West Coast. Johnson remarked that the NFWA with the aid of CORE and other civil rights groups had been quite successful in getting DiGiorgio and Schenley products removed from shelves located in stores in Harlem and Brooklyn, New York. According to Johnson the picket line would resume at 7:00 AM on May 24, 1966, however, it was not expected that more than ten or 12 pickets would participate on that date.

on May 24 and 20, 1900, advised that picketing resumed at S & W Food Company Warehouse at 7:00 AM May 24, 1966,

## W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source has advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party (CP), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates to this meeting were cautioned against the germ of anti-Soviet and anti-CP ideologies. These delegates were also told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second conference of over 20 persons met in Chicago on December 28-29, 1963, for the purpose of initiating a "call" to the new youth organization and planning for a founding convention to be held in June, 1964.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention. The aims of this organization, as set forth in the preamble to the constitution, are,"It is our belief that this nation can best solve its problems in an atmosphere of peaceful coexistence, complete disarmament and true freedom for all peoples of the world, and that these solutions will be reached mainly through the united efforts of all democratic elements in our country, composed essentially of the working people allied in the unity of Negroes and other minorities with whites. We further fully recognize that the greatest threat to American democracy comes from the racist and right wing forces in coalition with the most reactionary sections of the economic power structure, using the tool of anti-Communism to divide and destroy the unified struggle of the working people. As young people in the forces struggling for democracy, we shall actively strive to defeat these reactionary and neo-fascist elements and to achieve complete freedom and democracy for all Americans, thus enabling each individual to freely choose and build the society he would wish to live in. Through these struggles we feel the American people will realize the viability of the socialist alternative."

organization shall be a membership organization open to individual, or if five or more people so desire, a chapter can be forged which shall in turn be guided by the policies and principles of the parent organization.

As of October, 1965, the headquarters of the DCA was located at 954 McAllister Street, San Francisco, California.

Over the Labor Day weekend, 1965, the DCA held a conference in Chicago, Illinois. According to a third source, a new plate of national officers was elected at this conference, which included Chairman HUGH STERLING FOWLER, II (who seconding to the third source, attended a CP cadre encampment held at Camp Midvale, New Jersey, in June, 1965, and following his election as Chairman of the DCA, attended another national CP cadre youth conference held on September 9-12, 1965, on a farm located in Northern Indiana, according to a fourth source); Director of Publicity CARL ELLENGER BLOICE (who was elected to the San Francisco County Committee CP in April, 1964, according to a fifth source); Educational Director MATTHEW "DYNAMITE" HALLINAN (who in June, 1964, was stated to be the Youth Representative on the Northern California CP District Board, according to a sixth source); Organizational Secretary TERENCE "KAYO" HALLINAN (who, according to a seventh source, met in June. 1965, with the District Staff of the Illinois CP to discuss the proposed DCA Midwest Summer Project), and Treasurer SUSAN PHYLLIS BORENSTEIN (who, according to an eighth source, has attended meetings of the Youth Club of the CP of Illinois during 1965 in connection with the DCA Summer Project).

### W.E.B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF CHICAGO (DCC)

On May 3, 1965, a source advised that on June 30, 1964, a group of young people who attended the founding convention of the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America (DCA), met in Chicago and adopted a statement of purpose and constitution forming the DCC as an affiliate of the national DCA.

This source further advised that at a meeting of the Chicago Area of the Midwest Region of the DCA held April 3, 1965, the boundary of the Chicago Area was established to include all of Illinois north of Springfield, Illinois, and all of Indiana. At this meeting, TED PEARSON, Chairman of the Youth Club of the Communist Party of Illinois, was elected Area Coordinator.

A second source advised on November 26, 1965, that as of November, 1965, TED PEARSON continues to be the Chicago Area Coordinator of the DCA and the official headquarters is located at the PEARSON apartment, 1808 North Cleveland Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

The second source advised that there is currently only one club operating in the Chicago Area and that is on the west side. This club operates a Freedom Center at 2829 West Lake Street, which is open seven days a week to the teenagers on the west side.

latest laue of "Scope," a publication of the United States National Student Association (USNSA), 2115 "S" Street, Northwest Washington, D. C., contained an article revealing that USNSA planned to send a group of 200-300 students to Delano during the summer of 1966. This group is to be headed by Gene-Boutelier, a Fresno, California, minister, and students in the group will be from colleges all over the United States.

According to the above article the purpose of the project would be to teach the students farm laborer organizing, demonstrating and boycott techniques, so that they would be able to return to their respective areas to apply their know-ledge to assist in the cause of the farm workers and civil rights matters.

On June 6, 1966,

advised as follows:

Ceasar Chavez, President of the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) has been sending letters and pamphlets to universities all over the United States in an attempt to recruit students and professors to come to Delano during the summer of 1966 to assist in organizing the farm workers. Chavez has mentioned that he would like to have 2000 students come to the San Joaquin Valley this summer to serve the NFWA cause. Delieves that possibly several hundred students may arrillate themselves with NFWA this summer, but certainly not as many as one or two thousand.

During the past two months, NFWA has directed most of its picket action toward the DiGiorgio Corporation farms in Tulare County, California. There has been little activity in Delano.

As set forth in referenced LHMs, EUGENE NELSON has been organizing farm workers in Rio Grande City, Texas, for the past several weeks.

NELSON resided in Houston, Texas, for a short time and, prior to that, was reportedly instrumental in the organizing of the grape-pickers in Delano, California. now resides in Rio Grande City.

aring the first few days of NELSON's organizing activities in Rio Grande City, CHARLES McKINLEY SMITH was reportedly assisting him; however, SMITH has not been identified as being in that area in recent weeks.

DOLORES MUERTA, also active in organizing the grapepickers in Delano, California, has been assisting NELSON in the Pio Grande City area; however, it is not known if she is still in that area.

The 6/28/66, edition of the San Antonio News, a daily newspaper published in San Antonio, contained an article reflecting that two top leaders of striking Rio Grande Valley farm hands disclosed on 6/27/66, they are at odds over affiliation with a California-based union. EUGENE NELSON, president, and MARGIL PANCHEZ, vice president, acknowledged that a major basis for their dissent is a pamphlet the founder of the John Birch Society is credited with editing.

The article further reflected that SANCHEZ would oppose affiliation of Independent Workers Association (IWA) with the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) "until those guys in California clear their names of this communism." It should be noted he was apparently referring to the NFWA.

This article also reflected that NELSON told a reporter, "I'm not a communist and don't know of any communists here... if there are communists in the Rio Grande Valley it is because there are conditions here that are conducive to their activity.

"I don't like communists any more than the Birchers do. That's why I'm here -- to set conditions right before the communists get here."

For the information of the Bureau and recipient offices, the Catholic Church has become involved in this situation. The Valley Evening Monitor, a McAllen, Texas, daily newspaper, issue of \$\foralle{v}/20\seta b\$, contained an article which reflected that Msgr. DAN LANNING, of Mission (Texas), and Archishop ROBERT/LUCEY, of the San Antonio Archdiocese, were at odds on \$\foralle{v}/20\seta b\$, over the Catholic Church's position in the Starr County strike for higher wages for farm hands.

Msgr. LANNING, in a sermon at St. Paule Catholic Church in Mission, Sunday morning, charged clergymen from San Antonio who have taken part in the strike are "imposters and intruders" and that they "do not speak for the church."

The article also stated that Father CHARLES GRAHMANN, secretary to Archbishop LUCEY, said on behalf of the Bishop on 6/20/66, that "Monsignor LANNING is of the old school that believes priests should sit in their rectory and watch the world go by and not get involved in the social evils of the world."

Father GRAHMANN agreed that the two priests who participated in a so-called "civil rights" march in Rio Grande City do not officially represent the Church, although he said they went to Rio Grande City with the "permission" of Archbishop LUCEY.

Both the Political Association of Spanish-Speaking Organizations (PASO) and the Teamsters Union have expressed interest in helping the strikers. It should be noted that PASO is an organization formed in about 1960 which has chapters throughout the State of Texas. Its primary purpose is political education of individuals of Latin American descent and is not tied to either the Republican or Democratic Party.

The Los Angeles Divison made available a copy of a leaflet distributed by the DuBois Clubs at Los Angeles which was an appeal to raise money, food, and clothes for the strikers.

Although CHARLES McKINLEY SMITH (supra) has reportedly helped NELSON in this matter, based on data available to the San Antonia Division, it is believed a COMINFIL investigation should not be instituted by San Antonio at this time.

connection with the CP and has said he is not a communist.

The Los Angeles Division should furnish any available information to San Antonio reflecting subversive activity on the part of EUGENE NELSON or DOLORES HUERTA or any information reflecting communist influence in the IWA or NFWA.

Houston should furnish San Antonio any information available reflecting communist influence or infiltration in this matter by any persons from the Houston Division area inasmuch as NELSON headquartered in Houston prior to moving to the San Antonio Division area.

Unless further information is received reflecting communist infiltration in this strike, San Antonio is conducting no COMINFIL investigation.

The Bureau will be kept advised of any further developments concerning the proposed march.

The June 28, 1966, edition of The Valley Morning Star, a daily newspaper published at Harlingen, Texas, contained an article captioned, "Melon Pickers Talk of March on Austin." This article was datelined Rio Grande City. This article reads as follows:

Union support for Eugene Nelson's National //
Farm Workers Association Local No. 2 of Starr County
grew Monday after receiving backing at a meat cutters
convention in Harlingen Sunday. Plans for a Farm
Workers march from Rio Grande City to Austin were also
in the talking stage.

Nelson said that Roy Evans of Austin, Secretary-Treasurer of the Texas AFL-CIO, had agreed to provide \$250 needed as a deposit for a telephone at NFWA Headquarters in Rio Grande City.

Evans was one of several labor chiefs from around the nation who met with Valley Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butchers Workers Union of North America when it pledged support for the Starr County farm picketers. At the meeting in Harlingen, the union voted to donate \$300 to the NFWA local. Announcement of the additional \$250 came Monday.

Another development hatched over the week end and announced Monday by Nelson was the proposed Rio Grande City-to-Austin march. The march is similar in concept to one which called attention to the California grape pickers strike early this year, Nelson saids

"The march would pass by President Johnson's range and be timed to end in Austin on Labor Day," Nelson said.

Although plans for the march are not definite, the strike leader figures it would take about a month to cover the distance to Austin. The one in California covered 325 miles and took 25 days.

Support for the idea of such a march came last week from the Rev. Sherrill Smith and the Rev. K. William Killian of the San Antonio Diocese, and the Rev. Jack Grst and the Rev. Paul Like of the Amarillo Diocese, Nelson said.

Evans added his support and suggested that the march should terminate in Austin on Labor Day.





The only additional information in the Los Angeles files concerning EUGENE NELSON not in possession of the San Antonio Office is the following:

EUGENE NELSON is an ex-police reporter and a graduate of Marshall, Jil, "Handy Institute." (no source)

An advertisement appeared on page 14 of Edition #26, 1966, of the "El Malcriado" (which means "Rebel"), the National Farm Workers Press paper, of a book for sale entitled "Huelga" by EUGENE NELSON.

The files of the Los Angeles Office contain no pertinent subversive information concerning DOLORES HUERTA, Vice President of the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA), other than the fact that SAM KUSHNER, editor of "The Peoples World" (PW), has been in touch with her on several occasions.

The PW is a weekly West Coast Communist newspaper.

On 11/9/65, advised that some of those participating in the Delano Grape Strike felt that the PW was the only newspaper reporting the true facts.

It would appear that contacts between HUERTA and the PW had been made to obtain coverage of the Delano Grape Strike, and too, that receipt of the PW at the office of the Farm Workers Association was to determine actual coverage being given.

Files of the Los Angeles Office indicate little, if any, effort to actually infiltrate the NFWA. Discussions at various CP meetings have been numerous concerning the Delano Grape Strikers and all members have been urged to help the strikers on the picket lines, and if not there, to help by giving them food and clothing.

In view of the above, it is not felt that continued investigation concerning the cominfil of the NFWA is warranted at this time, and accordingly, Los Angeles is closing this case.

Upon receipt of information indicating CP efforts to actually infiltrate the NFWA, Los Angeles will reopen its case.



NOVARRO, Baptist Minister, both of Houston, Texas. These two clergymen were to leave for Corpus Christi, Texas, before the rally began to help plan the marchers' arrival at Corpus Christi. . A big rally at Corpus Christi was reported to be in planning stages for 7/30/66.

C C On 7/22/66, EUGENE NELSON, leader of the striking Rio Grande Valley farm laborers and organizer for NFWA, Local No. 2, was reported to have returned suddenly to California, and it was assumed leadership of the march would be taken over by one of the clergymen mentioned above.

We have conducted limited inquiries in the past concerning the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) and our information indicates it is not controlled or guided by communists but that several alleged members in the west coast area have extremely liberal views and that CP members or sympathizers have furnished support to NFWA in its conflict with the grape growers in California. The NFWA was a local independent union which became affiliated with the AFL-CIO in 1965. It was reportedly organized for the purpose of supporting migrant farmers and grape pickers in their strike in Delano, California.

The Valley Morning Star, daily newspaper published at Harlingen, Texas, carried an article on July 4, 1966, which article stated that farm workers from Rio Grande City, Texas, planned to begin a march on that date from Rio Grande City to Pharr, Texas, to call attention to the Starr County farm workers strike.

On July 4, 1966, the Valley Evening Monitor, a daily newspaper published at McAllen, Texas, printed an article stating that approximately 100 marchers had marched from Rio Grande City, Texas, to Sullivan City, Texas, and that they planned to resume the march on Tuesday, July 5, 1966, and continue to Friday when the marchers expect to arrive at San Juan Catholic Church, San Juan, Texas.

On July 4, 1966;

that the marchers had finished the first day of their march raveling from Rio Grande City, Texas, to Sullivan City, Texas, and that no incidents of violence or disturbances of any kind had occurred.

On July 5, 1966,

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

All sources utilized herein have furnished reliable information in the past.

Source No. 1 furnished the following information in October, 1965 and in January, 1966:

On September 3, 1965, the Agricultural Workers Organizing Committee (AWOC), AFL-CIO, with headquarters in Washington, D. C., declared a strike against the grape growers in Tulare and Kern Counties, California with 72 Filipino grape pickers participating. On September 19, 1965, the National Farm Workers Association (NFWA) also joined this strike, which then brought the Mexican and Puerto Ricans into this matter. The purpose of the strike was supposedly to increase the wages of the grape pickers.

MFWA is a local independent union, which has only reportedly been affiliated with the AFL-CIO since September, 1965. This affiliation is allegedly only for the purpose of supporting the present Delano-Tulare County strike. NFWA was formed about five years ago.

Cosar E. Chavez, a male Mexican, born January 31, 1927, possibly at Delano, California, 513", 135 pounds, straight black hair, brown eyes, dark complexion, is the Younder and Director of NFWA, with headquarters at 102 Albany Street, Delano, telephone number 3661.

Chaves spent about 14 years in San Jose, California, prior to 1963, as a recruiter for the Community Service Organization (CSO) at San Jose. CSO is a "war on poverty" type organization. Prior to his 14 years with CCO, Chaves was

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with the same organization in Los Angèles and San Diego, California. Since January, 1963, Chavez has resided in Delano.

Chavez refuses to answer any questionnaires directed to him by-credit bureaus or similar organizations. He has openly been called a communist at Delano City Council meetings; however, source does not possess any definite information in this regard. Source does believe that Chavez associates with "left wing" type individuals and is known to distribute the "People's World" from his office at Delano, free of charge. Chavez publishes and sells a paper called "El Maleriado", inscribed as the "soice of the farm worker", and the official voice of the MFWA. This paper sells for 10 cents a copy. Subscriptions to this paper can be mailed to Post Office Box 394, Delano.

The "People's World" is a weekly West Coast communist newspaper.

Chavez was arrested by the Tulare County, California Chariff's defice during Movember, 1965 for illegal use of a loud speaker, has pleaded innocent, and is presently out on \$110 bail. Chaves's arrest resulted in his use of a loud speaker from an airplane.

A notice appeared in issue No. 22 of the "El Malcriado" (this publication was not dated) which stated:

"\$1,000 Reward. El Maleriado will pay a cach reward of \$1,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons referring to the National Farm Workers Association, its leaders and officers, or El Maleriado and its representatives as 'communists' or 'communist-led', 'inspired' or any similar statements. Such references are false and illegal, and we intend to punish anyone saying these things to the full extent of the law."

CENTRAL LOS ANGELES DU BOIS CLUB formerly known as the Youth Action Union and Los Angeles Youth for Peace and Socialism

source advised on March 25, 1965, that during the period January through March, 1962, a series of formation meetings to establish a "Socialist Youth Organization", was held in the Los Angeles area. LEONARD POTASH was acting chairman in charge of the group and PAUL ROSENSTEIN and FRANKLIN ALEXANDER were named to a provisional committee to help organize the new group. On April 3, 1962, the group officially selected the name of Los Angeles Youth for Peace and Socialism (LAYPS), and elected officers.

A second source advised that POTASH, ROSENSTEIN, and ALEXANDER as of 1963 were all members of the Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP).

A third source advised on May 12, 1954, that the LAYPS was organized with the full knowledge and assistance of DOROTHY HEALEY, chairman of the SCDCP and that several Communist Party (CP) members had been approved by HEALEY to teach Marxist theory to members of the LAYPS. This source further advised that the LAYPS was to be a Marxist study and action group and that the teachings of KARL MARX were to be followed. Source also advised that although the alleged purpose of the group was to promote "Socialism" in the United States, the group considered themselves to be "Communist Party Orientated" and were anxious to study the brand of Marxism associated with the CPUSA.

The first source above further advised that in June, 1963, LAYPS changed the name of the organization to Youth Action Union (YAU) for two reasons: The first being that it was felt that LAYPS had gained a bad reputation because of its association with CP groups, the second because it was felt the word "Socialism" in the title was driving away possible recruits.

CENTRAL LOS ANGELES DU BOIS CLUB formerly known as the Youth Action Union and Los Angeles Youth for Peace and Socialism

The first source above advised that in August, 1964, the YAU affiliated with the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America and adopted the name of Central Los Angeles W.E.B. Du Bois Club.

The first source further advised on April 28, 1966, that in February, 1966, all of the Los Angeles area Du Bois Clubs consolidated inot one large city-wide club known as the Los Angeles Du Bois Club. As a result the Central Los Angeles Du Bois Club no longer exists as a separate club.





At 5:15 a.m. yesterday Eugene Nelson, organizer of the National Farm Workers Association and a group of union members proceeded to the center of International Bridge spanning the Rio Grande River between Roma, Texas, and Ciudad Alguel Aleman, Mexico. They stopped vehicles bearing farm laborers coming to the United States from Mexico to work thereby partially blocking traffic on the bridge. When a Texas Deputy Sheriff attempted to arrest Nelson, he stepped across the boundary into Mexico. Mexican authorities put Nelson back in the United States and he was promptly arrested. Following this ten to 15 members of the organization then lay down on the bridge blocking all traffic. The bridge is owned by the County of Starr, Texas. No United States facility is involved. San Antonio ended the teletype with the code word SUCOP meaning no letterhead memorandum being submitted, They are being instructed as set out above. . INT KI





The Valley Morning Star newspaper on October 26, 1986, indicated that State District Judge Woodrow Laughlin granted a temporary restraining order on October 25, 1966, to keep picketing farm workers from obstructing traffic at the Roma International Bridge.

This article indicated that orderly picketing was resumed at several large farms and packing sheds in Rio Grande City, Texas, but there were no disturbances.

On October 24, 1966, Assistant U. S. Attorney Mort Russman, Southern District of Texas, Houston, Texas, advised in his opinion there is no indication of a Federal violation in connection with this matter; and no investigation by the Federal Government was warranted inasmuch as the matter is being handled by State authorities who have the situation under control.
