ONE NATIONAL NEWS REPORT MAY EIGHTEEN, SEVENTY, INDICATED THAT NUMEROUS NEGROES IN JACKSON HAVE PURCHASED FIREARMS SINCE DATE OF JSC SHOOTINGS; CONTACT TODAY BY BUAGENTS WITH ND PAGE THREE

THE ELEVEN MAIN GUN DEALERS IN JACKSON AREA DETERMINED THAT ONLY TWO OF THESE, BOTH DISCOUNT GUN SALES STORES, HAVE HAD ANY INCREASE IN GUN SALES IN PAST WEEK, AND THE INCREASE HAS NOT BEEN ESPECIALLY HIGH, WITH MOST PURCHASES BEING SMALL CALIBER HANDGUNS; ONE OF THESE DISCOUNT STORES IS ABOUT ONE MILE FROM THE JSC AREA AND IT IS NOTED THAT SALES HAVE BEEN TO BOTH WHITE AND BLACK PATRONS; WHERE INCREASE IN GUN SALES OCCURRED, CORRESPONDING INCREASE IN AMMUNITION SALES WAS ALSO PRESENT.





The following letter was received by the San Francisco Office of the FBI from CECIL POOLE, United States Attorney, Northern District of California, San Francisco, California, on April 28, 1969:

"Yesterday, my wife,

at the State College at nayward, was savagely assaulted by black students, or ostensible students, in Meiklejohn Hall on the campus. She was on her way to an announced open meeting featuring ROY WILKINS of the NAACP. Unknown to her, the meeting had been taken over by members of the Black Students Union, who had thrown out white students and others. She entered, stood in the rear of the auditorium-sized classroom for a moment, letting her eyes adjust from the sunlight. A groups of six or eight young blacks, pretty obviously there as a goon squad, crossed the rear of the room and told her to get out. She said that she was there for the meeting. Thereafter, and all within a few minutes, she was seized and punched, dragged stunned to the door, and thrown out bodily, leaving a trail of blood.

. "Her injuries include two black eyes, bruises and marks where she was held while being punched, four stitches to close the wound in her forehead, separation of the cartilage from the bone of her nose, small wounds where her glasses had been smashed to bits against her face, and glass particles in her right eye. She staggered to a room on the next floor, still bleeding copiously, where staff members gave her assistance and summoned the school doctor and nurse. After being worked over for fifteen or twenty minutes, she was able to make a telephone call to me, to get to the police station in Hayward, and thereafter to the Kaiser Hospital for further treatment.

"The college administration has directed Hayward police to stay off campus and has kept the campus security force, made up largely of untrained older men, small and under orders not to aid staff or faculty members attacked as my wife was. The campus is a no man's land, effectively beyond the control of civil authority.

"I should point out that both my wife and I are liberal Democrats, who have worked for minority rights for thirty years. The attack was unprovoked, without prelude, irrational, savage, nihilistic, and on a purely racist ground. The entire course of action was clearly a breach of her civil rights, contrary to both the Public Accommodations Act and the Civil Rights Act. I ask that you take action immediately, before the campus is overwhelmed. The time is Germany 1934.

ROY WILKINS, leader of the NAACP, was a paid guest speaker at CSCH on April 22, 1969, with the approval of CSCH Administration. The CSCH BSU received approval under CSCH rules to reserve a room from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. on April 22, 1969, at Alexander Meiklejohn Hall and only BSU members and their guests were permitted to attend. The purpose of this request was to permit the BSU to have a private audience with WILKINS. This audience was held as planned sometime during April 22, 1969, telephonically contacted CSCH Art Department. Who was handling some of WILKINS appointments, and/or and was advised by one

or both of these individuals that WILKINS would hold a general assembly after 3:00 p.m. at Alexander Meiklejohn Hall. Based on this, and the same of her students walked into the above room two or three minutes after 3:00 p.m. at which time she

was attacked by three or four unknown Negroes. The individuals who attacked her struck her in the face, driving her eyeglasses into her forehead and the bridge of her nose, necessitating four stitches to close the tear in the skin.

As early as the fall of 1963, autonomous Negro students' organizations were properly registered and recognized as student organization on campuses in the Northern California area. The purposes of the organizations were generally given at that time as follows: "To engage in study of Negro life and history, to foster the growth and dissemination of Negro cultural contributions and to engage in projects which the membership considers to be in the interest of the Negro community."

At the outset, the organizations appeared to be purely cultural. As militant Negroes became affiliated with the organizations, the names of the organizations were changed to Black Students Union (BSU) in about 1965.


#### LOLA GRAHAM DU BOIS

President, Black Academy of Arts and Letters (BAAL), 475 Riverside Drive, New York City, to the Attorney General, United States Department of Justice, described BAAL as a nonprofit, nonpolitical organization founded to provide recognition and encouragement and incentive for those who have made a notable contribution to the interpretation and projection of the "Black experience in America". E. Open Letter to Stokely Carmichael and Other Comments re Subject's Resignation from BPP

"The Black Panther" newspaper, issue of August 16, 1969, Page 5, contained an "Open Letter to Stokely Carmichael" from ELDRIDGE CLEAVER, Minister of Information, Black Panther Party, July, 1969. The letter indicates it is reprinted from Ramparts Magazine, and is as follows:

"Your letter of resignation as the Prime Minister of the Black Panther Party came, I think, about one year too late. As a matter of fact, since the day of your appointment to that position---February 17, 1968---events have proven that you were not cut out for the job in the first place. Even then it was clear that your position on coalition with revolutionary white organizations was in conflict with that of the Black Panther Party. But we thought that, in time, even you would be able to shake the SNCC paranoia about white control and get on with the business of building the type of revolutionary machinery that we need in the United States in order to unite all the revolutionary forces in the country to overthrow the system of Capitalism, Imperialism, and Racism.

"I know these terms are kicked around like lifeless bodies and that it is easy to allow the grisly realities behind them to become obscured by too frequent repitition. But when you see the squalor in which people live as a result of the policies of the exploiters, when you see the effects of exploitation on the emaciated bodies of little children, when you see the hunger and desperation, then these terms come alive in a new way. Since you've made this trip yourself and seen it all with your own eyes, you should know that suffering is cokr-blind, that the victims of Imperialism, Racism, Colonialism and Neo-colonialism come in all colors, and that they need a unity based on revolutionary principles rather than skin color.

"The other charges you make in your letter---about our new-found ideology, our dogmatism, our arm-twisting, etc.---seem to me to be of secondary importance, because, with the exception of the



honorable Elijah Muhammad, you are the most dogmatic cat on the scene today, and I've never known you to be opposed to twisting arms or, for that matter, necks. In many ways your letter struck me as being an echo and rehash of the charges brought against the party by the bootlickers before the McClellan Committee. And since you chose this moment to denounce the party, we--and I am sure many other people outside the party---must look upon your letter in this light. The only point in your letter that I think is really you is the one about coalition with whites, because it has been this point on which our differences have turned from the very beginning.

"You have never been able to distinguish the history of the Black Panther Party from the history of the organization of which you were once the chairman --- the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. It is understandable that you can have such fears of black organizations being controlled, or partly controlled, by whites, because most of your fears in SNCC were spent under precisely those conditions. But the Black Panther Party has never been in that situation. Because we have never had to wrest control of our organization out of the hands of the whites, we have not been shackled with the type of paranoid fear that was developed by you cats in SNCC. Therefore we are able to sit down with whites and hammer out solutions to our common problems without trembling in our boots about whether or not we might get taken over in the process. It has always seemed to me that you belittle the intelligence of your black brothers and sisters when you constantly warn them that they had better beware of white folks. After all, you are not the only black person out of Babylon who has been victimized by white racism. But you sound as though you are scared of white people, as though gou are still running away from the slave-catchers who will lay hands on your body and dump you in a bag.

"As a matter of fact, it has been precisely your nebulous enunciation of Black Power that has provided the power structure with its new weapon against our people. The Black Panther Party tried to give you a chance to rescue Black Power from the pigs who have seized upon it and turned it into the rationale for Black Capitalism. With James Farmer of the Nixon Administration to preside over the implementation of Black Capitalism under the slogan

of Black Power, what value does that slogan now have to our people's struggle for liberation? Is denouncing the Black Panther Party the best you can do to combat this evil? I would think that your responsibility goes a little further than that. Even though you were right when you said that LBJ would never stand up and call for Black Power, Nixon has done so and he's bankrolling it with millions of dollars. So now your old Black Power buddies are cashing in on your slogan, in effect, your cry for Black Power has become the grease to ease the black bourgeoisie into the power structure.

"By giving you the position of Prime Minister of the Black Panther Party, we were trying to rescue you from the black bourgeoisie that had latched on to your coattails and was riding you like a mule. Now they have stolen your football and run away for a touchdown: six points for Richard Milhouse Nixon.

"In February, 1968, at the Free Huey Birthday Rally in Oakland, California, where you made your first public speech after returning to the United States from your triumphant tour of the revolutionary countries of the Third World, you took the occasion to denounce the coalition that the Black Panther Party had made with the white Peace and Freedom Party. What you called for instead was a Black United Front and would unite all the forces in the black community from left to right, close ranks against the whites, and all go skipping off to freedom. Within the ranks of your Black United Front you wanted to include the Cultural Nationalists, the Black Capitalists, and the Professional Uncle Toms, even though it was precisely these three groups who were working to murder your (obscene) even before it broke wind. (Remember what Ron Karenga did to your meeting in Los Angeles?)

"You had great dreams in those days, Stokely, and your visions, on the top side, were heroic. On the bottom side, when it came to the details of reality, your vision was blind. You were unable to distinguish your friends from your enemies because all you could see was the color of the cat's skin. It was this blindness that led you to the defense of Adam Clayton Powell, that Jackal from Harlem, when he came under attack by his brother jackals in Congress! And it was this blindness that

led you to the defense of that black cop in Washington, D. C., who was being (obscene) over by the whites above him in the Police Department for whom he carried his gun as he patrolled the black community. In short, your habit of looking at the world through black-colored glasses would lead you on the domestic level, to close ranks with such enemies of black people as James Farmer, Whitney Young, Roy Wilkins and Row Karenga; and on the international level you would end up in the same bag with Papa Doc Davalier, Joseph Mobutu, and Haile Selassie. Yes, we opposed that (obscene) then and we oppose it now even more strongly, especially since the Nixon Administration has stolen your program from you and, I think, included you out.

"And now your going to liberate Africa! Where are you going to start, Ghana? The Congo? Biafra? Angola? Mozambique? South Africa? If you are not aware of it, I think you should know that the brothers in Africa who are involved in armed struggle against the colonialists would like nothing better than for you to pick up your suitcase full of African souvenirs and split back for Babylon. They have never forgiven the fat-mouthing you did in Dar-es-Salaam when you presumed to tell them how to conduct their business. It seems to me that you are now trapped between the extremes of your own rhetoric. On the one hand, you have cut yourself off from the struggle in Babylon, and on the other hand, you are not about to become the Redeemer of Mother Africa.

"The enemies of black people have learned something from history even if you haven't, and they are discovering new ways to unite. One thing they know, and we know, that seems to escape you, is that there is not going to be any revolution or black liberation in the United States as long as revolutionary blacks, whites, and Mexicans, Puerto Ricans, Indians, Chinese, and Eskimos are unwilling to, or unable to unite into some functional machinery that can cope with the situation. Your talk and your fears about premature coalition are absurd, because no coalition against oppression by forces possessing revolutionary integrity can ever be premature. If anything, it is too late, because the forces of counterrevolution are sweeping

the world, and this is happening precisely because in the past people have been united on a basis that perpetuates disunity among races and ignores basic revolutionary principles and analyses.

"You are peeved because the Black Panther Party informs itself with the revolutionary principles of Marxism-Leninism, but if you look around the world you will see that the only countries which have liberated themselves and managed to withstand the tide of the counterrevolution are precisely those countries that have strong Marxist-Leninist parties. All those countries that have fought for their liberation solely on the basis of nationalism have fallen victims to capitalism and neo-colonialism, and in many cases now find themselves under tyrannies equally as oppressive as the former colonial regimes.

"That you know nothing about the revolutionary process is clear; that you know even less about the United States and its people is clearer; and that you know still less about humanity than you do about the rest is even clearer. You speak about an 'undying love for black people.' An undying love for black people that denies the humanity of other people is doomed. It was an undying love of white people for each other which red them to deny the humanity of colored people and which has stripped white people of humanity itself. It would seem to me that an undying love for our people would, at the very least, lead you to a strategy that would aid our struggle for liberation instead of leading you into a coalition of purpose with the McCleljan Committee in its attempt to destroy the Black Panther Party.

"Well, so long, Stokely, and take care. And beware of some white folks and of some black folks, because I assure you that some of both of them have teeth that will bite. Remember what Brother Malcolm said in his Autobiography: 'We had the best organization that the black man has ever had in the United States--and niggers ruined it!' POWER TO THE PEOPLE! ELDRIDGE CLEAVER, Minister of Information Black Panther Party, July, 1969."

Over thirty black seamen faced variety of charges resulting from clashes aboard two US Navy ships-the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk and the fleet oiler Hassayampa, no whites were charged in either incident.

One account in the straight press claims that the situation on the Kitty Hawk stemmed out of an argument in an enlisted men's club in Subic Bay. On the night of October 11th supposedly there was a fight in a washroom of the club and it spread to the rest of the club involving about 25 black and white sailors, mainly from the Kitty Hawk. The fight was broken up and several blacks were streated.

Those who were arrested were sent back to the ship and the ship sailed. One of the ship's higher ranking officers called in two of the black sailors who were arrested on shore for wellmen went along in an expression of soliderity. The two sailors who had been the called in and their comrades left the interrogation session upset about being singled out. Later the same officer went outside to talk to the men the Kitty Hawk or Hassayampa giving and tried to calm the men down

The group of about a dozen then left the mess deck and went to the hangar deck. The black sailors were just standing around talking in groups of threes and twos, however, the Marines guarding the planes on the hangar deck became uptight. The Marines tried to break up the group, which wasn't doing anything, with their guns.

That same night (Oct. 12) through # the early morning hours the next day, fights broke out between a little over 100 black and white sailors, among the 4,935 man crew. The brass claimed that the fights which spread to various parts of the ship grew out of an initial fight in a dining hall. The flight left 46 crewmen injured - 40 whites and six blacks. Only 5 men were seriously injured. A large group of both black and white sailors were credited with breaking up the fights.

At least 25 black sailors have al- 1 3 3344 ready been charged and two more might be. Twenty-one of the men were charged with both rioting and assault, and four were charged with just one of the two counts,

- Some trials are already under way at sea for those sailors who decided to go whead with them. In brothers could all face special court-martials.

In another incident eleven black sailors were detained and 6 were formally charged for being i volved in a clash aboard the flee oiler Hassayampa while it was in Subic Bay. In the incident four white crewmen were slightly injut five orewmembers were charged wit assault and will receive special court-martials. After these two incidents and others Navy race relations specie ists were forced to admit that sh board tensions have been greatly aggravated on board WestPac ships by the unbearable working and liv ing conditions that crewmen, particularly black orewmen encounter

The "Stanford Daily", a daily newspaper published by the Associated Students of Stanford University on November 14, 1972, page 3, carried a story entitled, "Black Activist to Speak at Roble Lounge Tonight". The article reported that MUHAMMED AHMED, Chairman of the African Peoples Party, would speak on November 14, 1972, at Roble Hall on the Stanford University campus under the sponsorship of the Black Students Union (BSU).

The article noted that AHMED, 31, studied at Central State University in Ohio, where he formed the Revolutionary Action Movement (RAM), that he thereafter joined the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), and subsequently worked with STOKELEY CARMICHAEL in forming the New York Black Panther Party (BPP). AHMED reportedly was arrested and jailed on charges of advocating criminal anarchy in 1967 in the State of New York, at which time the authorities also brought charges against members of RAM for master-minding a plot to blow up the Statue of Liberty and to assassinate civil rights leaders ROY WILKINS and WHITNEY YOUNG. AHMED reportedly forfeited bail following his arrest and went underground, during which time he continued to write for "Black Scholar", "Vibration" and "Contrast" Magazines. On September 1, 1972, AHMED reportedly was arrested in San Diego during the Congress of African People's (CAP) Conference and he currently faces extradition to New York.

The African Peoples Party (APP) officially announced its existence in July 1971. The APP's 10-point program seeks independence, self-determination, black state power and independent nationhood for "African captives in America." It demands the States of Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, Alabama and Louisiana "as partial re-payment for injustices done to us for over 400 years."

### BLACK PANTHER PARTY (BPP) RACIAL MATTERS

Relations, Boston College, Newton, Massachusetts, advised that the Cultural Committee of the Boston College Student Council would present a program at Roberts Center, Boston College Campus at 7:30 p.m. on December 8, 1969 on the subject "Who Speaks for the Black Community". A panel of four speakers have been engaged consisting of Ralph Abernathy of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCIC), Roy Innis of Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), Roy Wilkins of the National Association for Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and David Hilliard of the Black Panther Party (BPP). Mr. Lamer stated this program is one of a series arranged by the Cultural Committee with the approval of the Boston College administration.

The Boston Herald Traveler, a daily newspaper published in Boston, Massachusetts in its edition of December 9, 1969, carried an article concerning the panel discussion captioned "Black Leaders See New Racial Strife".

The article points out that for the first time the leaders of four nationally prominent black organizations spoke from the same platform before an audience of 2,500 and predicted the intensification of America's racial struggle.

Dr. Abernathy stated SCLC is now organizing a counseling service for boys drafted into the Armed Forces saying "it will be a department of peace, to counsel them to say no when they are asked to go-10,000 miles away to fight in that senseless, godless war".

He said the SCLC is still committed to the philosophy of non-violence on which it was based thirteen years ago. It will work with other black organizations toward their common goal—a better life for all black citizens. He pledged his support to the BPP and plans to fly to Chicago this week to "say in person that the United States is seeking to suppress the Panthers and we don't like it. If the nation can get by with suppressing one group, it won't be long before they suppress another".

Roy Innis of CORE charged that there is a national conspiracy against the Panthers and stated this is "the first phase of what might become a genocidal campaign against blacks".

Raymond "Masai" Hewitt, who represented the BPP in place of David Hilliard, equated the black problem in America with genocide. He claimed that black people understand what's happening to them. He claimed that rioting in Los Angeles, Detroit, and other cities was "the most eloquent statement" of the black position.

When the audience applauded Hewitt he said "Don't clap for me unless you'd clap for Husy Newton and Bobby Seale."

"I clap for Weathermen because the Weathermen shot pigs and pigs shoot niggers".

Roy Wilkins of NAACP said that two speakers referred to the United States as "your country", but "I consider it my country and I'm not giving up on it". He feels blacks have struggled too many years for racial equality to turn their backs now or go the way of violence or separatism.

On December 9, 1969,






