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54 -55 -56 Testimony of Roy Bunch of Fairfax, Oklahoma. (Summary).

That all testimony given by Subject Tucker at Guthrie and Oklahoma City, Chlahoma, was false in its entirety. That Subject Tucker approached him just prior to going on the witness stand at Guthrie to testify and told him that he was going to perjure himself for Hale and would do the same for him, Bunch, under like circumstances, and requested Bunch not to get mad at him. Bunch states that he was not at Cornett's for more than a year previous to the murder of Henry Roan.

Testimony of Mary Bunch of Fairfax, Oklahoma. (Jummary).

Mary Roan Bunch will testify that she had not been to Cornett's ranch for more than a year previous to the death of Henry Roan, and was not out with Bunch and Taylor as testified to by Tucker, and that she had no car at that time.

Testimony of Bill Taylor of Fuirfax, Chlahoma. (Jumpey)

That testimony given by Tucker was false with respect to his being with Bunch and Mary Roan Bunch in a car.



In accordance with telegraphic authority received from you sometime ago, Special Agent Frank S. Smith has been investigating certain Perjury cases growing out of the Osage Murder cases. The purpose of our investigation is not only to develop evidence of perjury on the part of certain witnesses in the above mentioned cases, but also to develop evidence of subornation of perjury on the part of one or more attorneys who represented Hale and Ramsey.

Mr. Smith informs me that his investigation has reached the point wherein he believes it now advisable to interview at the United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas, John Ramsey, in an effort to develop from him the part played by those who conceived the idea of introducing false testimony in behalf of Hale and Ramsey. It is the belief of the Agents who worked on the Osage cases that after Ramsey had been confined at the Penitentiary for a time he would be inclined to talk regarding his knowledge of these matters.

It may be that Ramsey has not been confined a sufficient length of time to get into the mood to talk, therefore, it occurred to me it might be advisable to communicate with Mr. White at the institution and have him sound Ramsey out before authorizing Smith to make the proposed trip; on the other hand, such action might be the means of closing the door to this information, in that between the time of White's talk with Ramsey and Smith's arrival, Ramsey would have opportunity for reflection and decide not to say anything at all.

I would thank you to advise me at your earliest convenience of your views in the matter and if you believe it advisable for Agent Smith to proceed to the Penitentiary, kindly authorise same.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

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W. K. HALR and JOHN RAMSEY. Murder of Henry Roan, an Casge Indian

At Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 29, 1926, W. K. Hale and John Ramsey were convicted of the murder of Henry Roan, an Osage Indian, and on the same day were sentenced to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for th periods of their natural lives.

The facts in the case are that on or about January 30, 1923, in the Country, John Ramsey shot and killed Henry Roan, an Osage Indian. The scene of the murder was a canyon, quite a little distance from the road. . The Indian was lured to the place by whiskey, and while he sat in his car, Ramsey shot him in the back of the head.

Ramsey made a complete confession, setting forth that the crime was actual ly committed by him, and was done at the solicitation of W. K. Hale, who paid Ramaey \$500. in cash and gave him a Ford Roadster for committing the murder. was to enable Hale to collect a \$25,000.00 life insurance policy which Hale held on the life of Roan, and which at the time of the murder, had been in force about two The confession was corroborated in all details.

The murder of Henry Roan was one of a series in which the victime were Osage Indians. Both W. K. Hale and John Ramsey are now charged with murder by the State of Oklahoma in connection with the murders of W. E. Smith, Rita Smith, his wife and Mettie Brookshire, their servant, who were killed by the explosion of fourteen xexamer quarts of nitroglycerine placed under the house while they slept. Ramsey has also made a complete confession in this case, admitting that he helped commit the crime, and that it was done at the solicitation of W. K. Hale.

Ernest Burkhart, a nephew of W. K. Hale, was also charged in the State Courts with the murder of W. E. Smith. He pleaded guilty, after making a confession corroborating Ramsey.

John Ramsey is 46 years of age, is married, and has six children, ranging from small children to adults. He has followed the vocations of farmer, cowboy and carpenter, and at the time of his arrest was farming a 160 acre farm. He was the head of a large organisation murderers, bank robbers, train bandits, mail bandits, highwaymen and together most of whom are now either dead or serving long sentences.

Former record:

Ramsey testified that several years ago he served a sentence in the Williams State Penitentiary for theft of cattle. So far as is known this is his on record. He admitted to Agents that while wirking for Henry Grammer he was engaged in selling liquor.

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I am attaching hereto a copy of a parole report submitted by Agent Grimes, at Oklahoma City, concerning W. X. HALE. There is also attached the parole report submitted by Agent Grimes concerning JOHE RAMSEY. Both of these persons have been convicted of purder and have been sentenced to life imprisonment in the United States Penitentlary at Leavemorth, Tansas. W. K. HALE and JOHN RAMSEY, Murder of Henry Roan, an Osage Indian

At Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on October 29, 1926, W. K. Hale and John Ramsey were convicted of the murder of Henry Roan, an Osage Indian, and on the same day were sentenced to the United States Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, for the periods of their natural lives.

The facts of the case are that W. K. Hale aided, abetted, assisted, counselled, solicited, and precured John Ramsey to kill Henry Roan. The actual king was done by Ramsey, in a canyon, quite a little distance from the road. The Indian was lured to the place by whiskey, and while he sat in his car, Ramsey shot him in the back of the head.

Ramsey made a complete confession, setting forth that the crime was actually committed by him, and was done at the solicitation of W. K. Hale, who paid Ramsey \$500. in cash and gave him a Ford Roadster for committing the murder. The motive was to enable Hale to collect a \$25,000.00 life insurance policy which Hale held on the life of Roan, and which, at the time of the murder, had been in force about two years. The confession of Ramsey was corroborated in all details.

Onage Indians. Both W. K. Hale and John Ramsey are now charged with murder by the State of Oklahoma in connection with the murders of W. E. Smith, Rita Smith, his wife and Nettie Brookshire, their servant, who were killed by the explosion of fourteen warms quarts of nitroglycerine placed under the house while they slept. Ramsey also made a complete confession in this case, admitting that he had helped commit the orime, and that it was done at the solicitation of W. K. Hale.

Ernest Burkhart, a nephew of W. K. Hale, was also charged in the State Court with the murder of W. E. Smith. He pleaded guilty, after making a confession corroborating Ramsey, and is now serving a life sentence in the Oklahoma Penitentiary

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Burkhart also made a complete statement of his knowledge of the Henry Roan murder, his knowledge consisting of statements made to him by Hale and Ramser

In another Osage Burder, Byron Burkhart and Kelsie Morrison are berg by the State with the murder of Anna Brown. Byron Burkhart is a nephew of Bale. At the preliminary hearing of Byron Burkhart, Kelsie Morrison test I to that Byron Burkhart had held Anna Brown while he, Morrison, shot her in the pact of the head with a gun provided for the purpose by W. K. Hale.

y. K. Hale is 52 years old, is married, and has one child, a married daughter. All his life, he has followed the vocation of a ranchman and cattleman, at the time of his arrest he owned about five thousand acres of land, and leased about thirty thousand acres, which was used in his cattle business. Hale was close friend and associate of Henry Grammer, sho was the head of a large arganization of murderers, bank robbers, train bandits mail bandits, highwaymen and loggers, most of whom are now either dead or serving long sentences.

Dear Sir: -

Some time ago you wrote me requesting my advice as to the advisability of an interview with John Ram sey, our Register No. 26519, committed here for life with Wm. K. Hale, No. 26518, for the murder of the Osage Indian, Henry Roan, to get from him information concerning the subordination of perjury by the attorneys for the defense in this case.

Will state that I do not think the time is proper to get anything from Ramsey, at present. I have talked to him 2 or 3 different times since he has been here but have the never gone into the cases with him as I did not think it the proper time to do so. The reason I don't think it is the right time is that the lawyers for Hale are preparing an appeal on the ground that they have new evidence due to the eleventh hour statement that Ramsey made before he left Oklahoma City absolving Hale of all guilt and charging Ernest Burkhart, Hale's nephew, Curley Johnson, now dead, and Roy Bunch, who married Henry Roan's widow, with the killing, stating that he was an eye-witness to the same.

Of course, I don't think they will get any where with their appeal. It is very evident that Ramsey is getting some consideration out of Hale, in order to make this statement, and is passing the same on to his wife and family, who are in a pitiful financial condition.

Ramsey has told me that he has discharged his attorney, Jim Springer, whom I have learned since I have been here, got \$10,000 from Hale to defend Ramsey, and has sought the employment of Hale's other attorneys, Hamilton, Howard and Freeling of Oklahoma City and these attorneys have visited him since he has been here, upon his request, for the purpose, as they claim, of taking his case on appeal.

In further conversations I have had with Ramsey he practically admitted his guilt but told me that I couldn't blame him for doing everything he could to get out of it.

I think that the proper time to see Ramsey will be after the case is finally settled and it is seen that there is no more hope for either Hale or Ramsey. I think, at that time, I will be able to get the truth out of Ramsey as he seems to be friendly disposed to me and always has.

I am as anxious as anyone to see that these crocked attorneys get their just deserts and will keep this matter in mind and do all I possibly can to get such information

I don't think, as I have stated, that now is the proper time to get it from Ramsey, however, if you want me to make the endeavor I will do so.

I think, in getting this statement from Ramsey, I should have Agent Frank Smith to assist with the interview


