

Re's Loyal to God And His Country

By GEORGE E. SOKOLSKY

PERNARD EARUCH has reached the age of 87 and has written a book about himself which has been amply reviewed, particularly by those who are excited over the fact that he was a millionaire by 35 and that he had a formula for purchasing securities and speculating in them which one might use to advantage.

This part of Baruch's biography interested me least. Quite a few men speculated in the stock market and some won and some lost. Also, I know many millionaires and some of them I would not invite to my home to meet my family. The mere possession of money does not always represent ability or is at all representative of character. After all, surely Al Capone was a millionaire and so is Lucky Luciano.

A Constructive Citizen

Baruch's worth is not that he made a fortune but that he is a constructive citizen; that he is generous in his benefactions to charities; that he has helped a number of younger persons get started; that he is loyal to his country and faithful to his God and the traditions of his ancestors.

I do not even get excited over the fact that Presidents have sought his advice. Presidents should seek the advice of wise and experienced men, but some of the advisers whom the current and prior Presidents chose were neither wise nor experienced.

What is notable about Baruch, as it is about Herbert Hoover, is that when he has been asked to serve, he has never refused to give time and effort, no matter what his age or the momentary state of his health. There has been no old man's complaint about aching bones and tired muscles,

Those who thank God for being alive have no time to complain. They know what to expect and are grateful that it is so long delayed. Baruch, who is a Jew, is a profoundly religious man. His mother came of an old Sephardic family that had settled first in New York and then in South Carolina in the Colonial days, arriving in the United States before 1700. His father, Simon, was born in Posen, Germany, now Poznan, Poland. Simon Baruch came to the United States in 1855. He studied medicine at the South Carolina Medical College and at the Medical College of Virginia. He became a surgeon, serving in the War Between the States on the Confederate side.

Baruch has been unusually devoted to the memory of his father and has spent much of his accumulation to perpetuate his father's name, particularly in the field of physiotherapy in which Dr. Simon Baruch was a pioneer.

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To me it is most interesting that this man-who has known all the great men of his generation, who has been the friend of such men as Woodrow Wilson, Jan Smuts, Herbert Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, finds greenest his memory of his father. That is old tradition, sacred among the people from which Baruch came.

It might be said that all this could have been written without reading "Barach — My Own Story," and weil it could, for what boots it that a man made money in business or achieved great position in politics? What does matter is what is the character of this man. Bernard Barach is of a prophetic race who has served the country of his birth valiantly and devotedly as he has served the God of his fathers in their own tradition.

Tells Father of Wealth

,

Perhaps nothing characterizes this more than the tale Baruch tells of the day he told his father that he was worth a million dollars. Baruch says:

"... His kindly face assumed a quizzical expression, as if he experienced some difficulty in grasping the fact of a million dollars. Thinking that he might be questioning the accuracy of my accounting, I offered to show him the actual securities.

 $^{\prime\prime}$ 'No,' he said, 'I will take your word for it,' and began to talk of something else."

To a Jewish intellectual such as his father was, coming of a line of rabbis, what did it matter that a man was worth a million dollars? After all, none of the great figures in Jewish history were worth a million dollars or for that matter, a million cents. Baruch seems in these lines to be proud of his father's attitude as well he may be. For the kingdom of God is to the good and charitable.

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

Dear Mr. Hoover:

With reference to the request of Mr. Bernard Baruch to be contacted by an Agent, I wanted you to know that I talked with him at his office on September twenty-fourth. Mr. Baruch stated that he is very much concerned about the "wide gyrations" in the price of copper that have been occurring on the London exchange. He said these exaggerated fluctuations could have an unsettling effect on the world economy and he felt they could be occurring through sinister manipulations, possibly by persons under Communist direction or affiliation.

Mr. Baruch said that prior to World War II, exact time not recalled, he had met a member of the British Parliament who was in the metal business, and who had been described to him as a person of Communist sympathy. Further, that this individual could possibly be involved in such stock manipulations, although he had no basis for this suspicion and could not remember the name. To said he would advise me if he were able to recall the identity of this individual. Mr. Baruch thought the Euresu or some other government agency might desire to check into these price gyrations to determine the cause inasmuch as he was very concerned with the disturbing effect these were having on the markets of the world.

Mr. Baruch understands that his information is vague and that little action could be taken on that basis at this time. He also understands that there is no violation here over which the Eureau has jurisdiction.

Mr. Baruch was most cordial and friendly. He said that he had the highest admiration for you and the achievements made by the FBI under your direction. He related that coincidentally he had been to his barber just prior to my visit, that the parber had mentioned your speech before the American Legion, and had made the remark that you were one government official that all the American people believed in and respected. He seemed to be very pleased that this barber would spontaneously speak of you in this manner and that this was just an example of what persons from all walks of life thought of you and your administration of the FBI.

I was delighted to have had this opportunity to meet Mr. Baruch, and I shall keep you advised of any additional information he may furnish in the future.



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

Baruch Says Apathy Saps Security of U.S.

By Peter D. Franklin

Bernard M. Baruch last night lashed out against Americans who, by their apathy and scifishness, are "undermining our security and our spiritual strength."

In his address before the B'nai B'rith dinner saluting American youth at the Waldorf-Astoria, Mr. Baruch denounced special interests, the use of nuclear weapons, the public's attitude toward inflation and the general "iudifference to the crucial issues confronting us." He said:

"We are engaged in a great struggle—political, economic and psychological—with a powerful and dedicated opponent. Yet the American public seems almost torpid in its concern for our security."

Despite its shortcomings, the eighty-nine-year-old statesman said, America still offers the best system of government ever devised, but the nation must rouse itself from its lethargic slate before "some terrible tragedy everwhelms us," Concrning the nation's defense program, Mr Baruch said:

"The quarrels within the government over questions of defense have done much to confuse us. But nowhere does there seem to be a determination to place national security over the demands of the special interest groups. There are too many special interest groups in America today and not enough groups interested in America..."

Mr. Baruch also touched on the Geneva talks which, he said, are "a step forward." But he warned against agreements which might reduce our attempt. As for nuclear weap-tens, the advisor to Presidents, alongly urged that they be talked to insure a free and peaceful world.
