SUBJECT SURREPTITIOUS ENTRIES

Reference is made to memorandum of Mr. J. B. Adams to Mr. P. L. Mack dated August 19, 1975, memorandum of Mr. R. J. McCarthy to Mr. W. V. Cleveland dated August 21, 1975, and letter of Senator Frank Church to Attorney General Edward H. Levi dated September 29, 1975.

The following answers are to the specific questions set out in referenced letter from Senator Frank Church to Attorney General Edward H. Levi. All entries conducted in connection with investigations handled by the Special Investigative Division from January, 1960, to July, 1975, have been for the purpose of installing electronic devices for the interception of oral communications. Surreptitious entries from 1960 to 1965 were in connection with criminal intelligence investigations of major organized crime figures. This practice was discontinued in 1965. From 1969 to July, 1975 all surreptitious entries have been under authority of court order and in accordance with Title III of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

Reference is made to your memorandum of December 2, -1975, concerning documents received by this Bureau from former Associate Deputy Attorney General James A. Wilderotter, and files pertaining to certain surreptitious entries conducted by the FBI in connection with installation of electronic surveillances.

The matter concerning materials received from Mr. Wilderotter is being coordinated with the office of the Deputy Attorney General.

With respect to files requested in Items 2 through 19 of your December 2 letter, we are taking the necessary steps to obtain the material requested, and we anticipate having these documents available for your review at an early date.

On December 2, a representative of the Intelligence Division spoke with Mr. William Gardner of your Division regarding Departmental review of two files concerning surreptitious entry. It was agreed that representatives of your Office would initially confine their reviews to files located at FBI Headquarters. If satisfactory, files to be reviewed in your request of December 2 will be handled in the same fashion. If required, arrangements may be made to review files and documents requested by you which are located in our field offices. We believe these arrangements will expedite your review and will avoid, at the outset, transmittal of voluminous materials from our field offices, some of which may be irrelevant to your mineutry.

The purpose of this communication is to advise you of the results of the review made by representatives of the Inspection Division of surreptitious entries conducted by our New York Office in 1972 and 1973.

As a matter of background, the Department was previously advised that information had been uncovered indicating that some surreptitious entries had been conducted by Bureau personnel of our New York Office in 1972 and 1973. Departmental representatives personally reviewed the material maintained in our New York Office relative to this matter. Following this review, with approval of the Department, representatives of the Bureau's Inspection Division proceeded to New York for a similar review. As requested by the Department, no pertinent interviews were conducted in connection with the Inspection Division's inquiry.

As the Department is aware, there is maintained in the New York Cifice a four-drawer file cabinet physically located in the Personnel Files Unit. The top drawer contains twenty-seven volumes covering surreptitious entries by New York from 1954 to the last recorded entry, April 16, 1973. SAC Folder 25 contained nine memoranda disclosing nine surreptitious entries, seven in 1972 and two in 1973. Departmental representatives, while in New York, obtained Nerox copies of these memoranda.

For your information, in addition to the above nine, a review of pertinent files disclosed seven additional entries and two other possible entries. Of the additional seven, three took place in 1972 and four in 1973, with the last recorded date being April 18, 1973. The two other possible entries occurred in the latter part of 1972.

NOTE: Based on memo H. N. Bassett to Mr. Callahan captioned "Surreptitious Entries" dated 5/11/76, wherein it was recommended, and approved by the Director, that the Department be advised of the pertinent results of Inspection Division's inquiry regarding captioned matter.



In the second drawer of the above-referred-to file cabinet additional material pertaining to surreptitious entries was also located and specific reference is made to SAC Folder (C). It is the Bureau's understanding that Xerox copies of the top six serials of this folder were made available to Departmental representatives while in New York. In essence, this folder deals almost exclusively with obtaining keys from various sources, with the possible intended purpose of utilizing them for surreptitious entries. During the Inspection Division's review of this particular material it was ascertained that sometime in the latter part of 1973 an inventory was made of the Tel-Kee cabinet.

On 5/25/76 at the request of Assistant Attorney General Pottinger a meeting took place between Mr. Pottinger, Mr. Kelley, Bill Gardner, Chief of the Criminal Section of the Civil Rights Division, and me. The purpose of the meeting was to determine how to proceed with the investigation of surreptitious entries which occurred within the statute of limitations. Mr. Pottinger advised there were 15 or 20 such incidents which have been discovered to date as a result of FBI and Departmental review. This number represents the number of entries and does not represent the number of separate targets, these being fewer in number.

Prior to submitting any recommendation to the Attorney General, Mr. Pottinger wished to propose to Mr. Kelley the following procedure. He feels that the basic investigation should be conducted by FBI Agents who would work closely with attorneys of the Civil Rights Division who would direct the lines of inquiry and on occasion participate in investigative interviews.

Mr. Pottinger felt that in order to facilitate the prompt completion of these inquiries and avoid the possibility of premature leaks, normal reporting channels should be avoided and the results of investigative activity should be furnished to the Civil Rights Division and to Mr. Kelley and me.

Mr. Kelley suggested Mr. Pottinger contact Mr. Dowd of the Department who is supervising the U. S. Recording investigation for his views as to how the Ash group is functioning. Mr. Kelley pointed out that coordination of the investigative activity was desirable and a responsible Bureau official should be placed in charge of the FBI Agents conducting the investigation. That group could in turn report to me and I could keep Mr. Kelley informed as he did not think it would be necessary for him to

see personally all of the FD-302s and other results of investigative activity. Mr. Pottinger indicated he would give consideration to that.

Other alternatives were discussed such as having the Secret Service or some other agency provide the investigative agents or have Departmental attorneys conduct the entire investigation; however, it was tentatively agreed that it would be best to have the FBI Agents conduct the investigation.

Mr. Pottinger raised several potential problem areas. One was the fact that once active inquiries begin there was the potential of news leaks and these should be avoided if at all possible. Mr. Pottinger was very pleased that thus far the news media are unaware that there are surreptitious entries which have been determined to have taken place within the statute of limitations. It was agreed that since the matter was a pending investigative matter no announcement of this fact should be made and inquiries should be responded to by the Department as long as possible by merely stating that the matter was under investigation.

A discussion was had as to whether the Church Committee should be advised that surreptitious entries took place within the statute of limitations or whether it would be more appropriate to notify the new Senate Oversight Committee and the Eastland Committee of this fact. Mr. Pottinger indicated that he wanted to give further thought to this matter before reaching a conclusion.

It was agreed that current case law indicated that the proper manner of proceeding would be to advise the affected agents of their rights as well as of the fact that their choosing to exercise their rights would not be used against them administratively. Those Agents choosing to exercise their rights against self incrimination could then be advised, after a determination is made by the Departmental attorneys involved, that they are being granted use immunity or transactional immunity and, therefore, must answer questions posed by the investigator. His failure to answer questions after having been granted immunity would subject him to a charge of insubordination which could result in his dismissal.

The question of legal representation was discussed and it was Mr. Pottinger's feeling that those Agents desiring legal representation should be provided private-counsel at Government expense. This matter would have to be resolved with the Civil Division, however, before a final determination could be made. A more troublesome area was discussed which is the situation where an indictment might be returned at which time a conflict of interest might require the Government to cease providing counsel or funds for private counsel. This answer would likewise have to be resolved should such a situation develop.

Mr. Pottinger suggested that a memorandum be sent to all offices cautioning that appropriate files and records should be maintained to insure no hindrance to the inquiry. Such a communication will be submitted for approval.

Mr. Pottinger advised that the purpose of the inquiry would also be to determine if there are any other cases of surreptitious entries taking place in the domestic field within the past five years unrelated to approved electronic surveillances, and he was advised that we had canvassed all SACs, Section Chiefs and above in this regard. Mr. Kelley advised Mr. Pottinger that he was most interested in getting this matter resolved once and for all and had been in the process of issuing instructions to have each Agent on the rolls asked as to whether he has any personal knowledge of such matters. Mr. Pottinger advised that he would prepare a proposed question in this regard and then would get together with us to review our proposed questionnaire to determine exactly the type of inquiry to be made of each Agent.

Mr. Pottinger felt that approximately ten Agents would be needed to complete these investigations. He suggested that he be furnished the names of 15 or 20 possible candidates from which group he would select the ten to be utilized. He requested that the Agents selected not ever have had service in New York, Washington Field, or Domestic Intelligence Division, nor should they ever have been engaged in surreptitious entries in the domestic field at any time other than in connection with approved electronic surveillances. He indicated that at the time of selection by him

On Friday, May 28, 1976, William J. Gardner, of your division, requested that we submit to you our views concerning the procedures to be followed in conducting investigations of surreptitious entries which occurred within the statute of limitations. This memorandum will confirm our conference on May 25, 1976, in which I advised that in conducting an investigation of this nature it would be necessary for us to advise those employees who would appear to be suspects of their constitutional rights by furnishing them the Miranda warnings and requesting of them a waiver of their rights. Further, We would advise such employees that there would be no administrative penalty applicable to them if they exercise their constitutional rights in declining to answer questions where to do so would result in selfincrimination. In the event an employee exercised the privilege against self-incrimination and it appeared to the Department in by 1/66 desirable to grant immunity from prosecution, the Department would determine the nature and scope of the immunity to be granted.

Thereafter, upon notification in writing of the imminity granted, employees would be required to respond to appropriate of inquiries within the bounds of the immunity granted or face appropriate administrative action.





Special Agents of our New York Office who have been notified by the Department of Justice that they are considered to be potential subjects in this investigation have expressed concern about the apparent disclosures of the investigation to representatives of the new media. They cite a "New York Post" article which appeared in the final edition June 22, 1976, on page 20 co-authored by Robert L. Jackson and Ronald J. Ostrow which they felt was extremely detailed and accurate. They pointed out this was the first instance of widespread publicity in this matter and believed such publicity did not benefit the subjects of the investigation. They are concerned about further disclosures and the possibility that the names of specific subjects will be divulged which could expose them to civil suits by independent plaintiffs as well as criminal proceedings on a local level. These Agents asked for an immediate investigation probing the disclosures of information relating to this matter and they feel that the unauthorized disclosure concerning the investigation being conducted could be a violation of Federal regulations and statutes.

No investigation has been conducted by the FBI concerning these disclosures but I did want you to be aware of the concern of the Agents involved in this investigation. It is requested that you advise whether or not such an investigation should be undertaken.

the attorneys made extensive notes from a review of the files provided to them. A determination is presently being made regarding the national security classification, if any, of the documents furnished and you will be advised of the results of this determination. The New York Office is also concerned about notes containing classified information taken from classified documents during the above-mentioned reviews and asked that such notes constituting classified material be appropriately classified. It is, therefore, requested that any notes requiring classification be handled accordingly.

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Introduction

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FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE JUNE 30, 1976

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Within the past several days news stories have indicated that surreptitious entries were conducted by the FBI within the past five years and that I have previously stated and testified before the Congress that surreptitious entries in domestic security investigations terminated in 1966. Obviously, such news stories imply directly or indirectly that I (1) knew otherwise, and/or (2) that my advisers in the FBI knew about these entries and failed to advise me of them.

I would like to state at this time that when I spoke initially at a July, 1975, press conference and stated that there were no entries in the domestic security area after 1966, I knew of none. I have certainly nover authorized any, and frankly, I was never told of any. I was speaking with the best knowledge that was furnished me at the time. My press conference statement relied upon a July, 1966, memorandum wherein Mr. Hoover instructed that no further surreptitious entries were to be engaged in by Bureau personnel. In addition, I relied upon the recollections of current Headquarters personnel who were queried about this matter) prior to this conference.

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Subsequent to my press conference and as a result of our reviews in responding to Congressional and Departmental inquiries relating to surreptitious entries, additional entries were detected and furnished to the Department and the Senate Select Committee in September, 1975. We reported that at least 238 surreptitious entries had been conducted against at least 14 domestic subversive targets during the period 1942 to April, 1968, and there were additional entries which we were then unable to document.

on March 17, 1976, FBI Headquarters learned as a result of inquiries in connection with a pending lawsuit that folders in our New York Office contained information concerning entries subsequent to 1966 and the Department of Justice was notified the same date by us. It was through this means that I learned of the existence of a limited number of surreptitious entries conducted in 1972 and 1973 after a thorough review was subsequently made of these folders.

The FBI, under my direction, is cooperating with the Department of Justice in a full and complete investigation to determine all the facts of this matter.

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

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

EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

As consideration for employment in the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), United States Department of Justice, and as a condition for continued employment, I hereby declare that I intend to be governed by and I will comply with the following provisions:

- (1) That I am hereby advised and I understand that Federal law such as Title 18, United States Code, Sections 793, 794, and 798; Order of the President of the United States (Executive Order 11652); and regulations issued by the Attorney General of the United States (28 Code of Federal Regulations, Sections 16.21 through 16.26) prohibit loss, misuse, or unauthorized disclosure or production of national security information, other classified information and other nonclassified information in the files of the FBI;
- (2) I understand that unauthorized disclosure of information in the files of the FBI or information I may acquire as an employee of the FBI could result in impairment of national security, place human life in jeopardy, or result in the denial of due process to a person or persons who are subjects of an FBI investigation, or prevent the FBI from effectively discharging its responsibilities. I understand the need for this secrecy agreement; therefore, as consideration for employment I agree that I will never divulge, publish, or reveal either by word or conduct, or by other means disclose to any unauthorized recipient without official written authorization by the Director of the EBI or his delegate, any information from the investigatory files of the FBI or any information relating to material contained in the files, or disclose any information or produce any material acquired as a part of the performance of my official duties or because of my official status. The burden is on me to determine, prior to disclosure, whether information may be disclosed and in this regard Lagree to request approval of the Director of the FBI in each such instance by presenting the fall text of my proposed disclosure in writing to the Director of the FBI at least thirty (30) days prior to disclosure. I understand that this agreement is not intended to apply to information which has been placed in the public domain or to prevent me from writing or speaking about the FBI but it is intended to prevent disclosure of information where disclosure would be contrary to law, regulation or public policy. I agree the Director of the FBI is in a better position than I to make that determination;
- (3) I agree that all information acquired by me in connection with my official duties with the FBI and all official material to which I have access remains the property of the United States of America, and I will surrender upon demand by the Director of the FBI or his delegate, or upon separation from the FBI, any material relating to such information or property in my possession:
- (4) That I understand unauthorized disclosure may be a violation of Federal law and prosecuted as a criminal offense and in addition to this agreement may be enforced by means of an injunction or other civil remedy.

I accept the above provisions as conditions for my employment and continued employment in the FBI. I agree to comply with these provisions both during my employment in the FBI and following termination of such employment.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. JENKINS

Re: To be discussed at Associate
Director's Conference this date

I mentioned my distress to you last week.

I mention it again and with force because of a comment reportedly made by Ed Milier over the weekend. It appears he feels that I possibly was informed of the burglaries given wide coverage in the last few days. Admittedly the account indicates the notice was oblique and that I may not have recognized its relevancy. In other words, I chose to ignore its implications or I was unable to distinguish its inferences for an unknown reason. Ed Miller has not explained what he meant, and I therefore, must believe he was correctly quoted and can only speculate what he meant.

Lest there be any question in anyone's mind about my position in this matter, I want to set out certain things.

Until March, 1976, I had never been informed of these domestic surreptitious entries which took place in recent years, have not authorized a single such act, and know of no inferential, obscure, of otherwide "back door" reference to the existence of such or, on the other hand, unsolicited and solicted comments from knowledgeable Bureau authorities to the effect there was none were made on numerous occasions.

It appears my denial of burglaries of recent vintage were made with the knowledge by some FBI employees that I spoke in error. No one stepped shrward to advise me of my error. I am inclined to believe there may be an confort to shift the responsibility for these allegations in some manner despite in the property total absence of any notification. I have never shunned responsibility approperly vested in me. I will, however, where there is a purpose of evading had been conformed by the property vested in the share it by unfair innuendoes. Such an effort is the totally unfair and I will vigorously resist it. I sincerely hope my fears are

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Some reports are current that I have not acted decisively in a time of disquiet. Pending investigations have to date seemed to me to be an adequate base from which to determine needed action, be it corrective, disciplinary, or prosecutive. This is as it should be and, under normal circumstances, would be allowed to take its proper course.

I sincerely believe normalcy has been supplanted by factors which indicate the necessity to move now if credibility is to be maintained and divisiveness stifled. By no means do I feel the movement I detect is one universally supported. Unfortunately, some adjustments may inadvertently affect a wider range of my associates than I might want.

The action I contemplate at this point is as follows:

- 1. I want anyone who has any information of matters under question to come forward and let me know of them. This does not include anyone already named by the Department as a possible subject of their investigation, nor am I insisting anyone waive his constitutional rights.
- 2. I want to be informed at once of any reports currently circulating that I supposedly was informed of these actions and I want to be informed of the source.
- 3. I want you to discuss the problem I have presented and give me your appraisal of what you think should be done. This I want by July 12, 1976. I am considering some myself.

As I have said on several occasions, the position which I wish to maintain if we are to maintain credibility is one of complete absence of any duplicity or evasiveness and it now appears that this has been made difficult by factors beyond my command. I therefore think that we must move and may existly. This action may include an effort to join the news media in exist attentions or whatever may be determined as our best course. We cannot sit second and wait for the cleaver to fall. We must do something now.
