This is the young reporter's dream: that some day he will turn up the famous criminal, for whom everyone is searching, and walk him into police headquarters.

Mr Walter Winchell, well out of his jejune days but still a reporter, undoubtedly will list among his most gratifying experiences the part he played in landing "Lepke" Buchalter in the arms of the F. B. I.

Buchalter had earned the title Public Enemy No. 4. Allegedly the head of one of New York's most brutal gangs, he had evaded the nets of federal, state and metropolitan police for the past two years. A price of \$50,000 was on his headdead or alive. The manner of his contacts with the reporter and the circumstances of his surrender through Winchell in the crowded center of New York make a modern Arabian Nights tale.

Of course the chatty columnist has a notoriety the average newspaperman does not have. His interest in the Hauptmann case brought him acquaintance with figures in New York's underworld. And his frequent "collaboration" with the R. B. I. was well known. It can be understood why Buchalter, having made up his mind to give up, should have come to Winchell as the intermediary.

Still the feather is in the columnist's cip. He brought in the hunted man. He got the scoop.

And in a week made dismal by crowding rumors of war the story Reporter Winchell has turned in makes a bright splash, happily diverting public attention from jitters in chancelleries to adventure in the streets. Philosoph Windlett

Winchell's Public Service

Walter Winchell, columnist on the New York Mirror and other papers throughout the country and radio news commentator, performed an outstanding public service in bringing about the surrender of Louis (Lepke) Buchalter, fugitive racketeer, to Chief J. Edgar Hover of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

It was a melodramatic story. The contact with Winchell was made in a series of telephone calls by persons unknown to him. They sought assurance that the notorious public enemy could give himself up without being shot

Hoover promptly gave that guarantice. For over two weeks negotiations continued by telephone until finally last Thursday night after following a complicated series of arrangements Lepke stepped into the newspaper reporter's automobile at Madison Square between 23d and 24th Streets.

Two minutes later the fugitive was turned over to the chief G-man where he was waiting in his car at Fifth Avenue and 28th Street. The "lafe delivery" had been accomplished.

The community should be grateful to Winchell for his vital part in the arrest of the much-wanted racketeer.



Dear Sire

Walter Winchell called at this office of December 29, 1939, at which time he asked that I deliver message to you. Mr. Minchell stated that Louis "Lepke" Suchalter had sent word that he wanted to see him and that he, Winchell, had been to the United States Karshal's office where he had talked to Lepke. He stated that Assistant United States Attorney Jeroma Doyle was present during part of the converestion.

Buchalter indicated to Winchell that he hadbeen very definitely double-crossed and informed him that prior to surrendering he had been given definite assurementhat he would not receive a sentence of over ten years. Buchalter further claimed he was told by the intermediaries between_him and Winchell that you personally said that the sentence would not be over ten years, and stated that you had talked with the Attorney-General and the President regarding this matter.

"Winchell stated that he told Buchalter that no one had made my definite promise of any kind, and the only thing that had been said regarding the sentence was that you stated in your personal opinion the sentence based upon the facts of the case, would not be over about twelve or fifteen years, but that no one could tell what sentence the judge would mete out.

Winchell stated that he felt that Duchalter believed him and felt there had been no double-cross upon his part, but he did think that Buchelter would send word down the line to take care of the intermediaries who had double-crossed him and that he, Minchell, was really worried that something might happen o bis.

He said that the Judge asked that he maintain in confidence the fact that he had visited him, but did give permission to inform you thereof.

Mr. Winchell also stated that during his sonversation with Lepks, Lepks had said that a man by the name of Ournes had told him not to worry, that everything would be all right. Winchell pointed out that this was probably just a soothing statement.

Mr. Winchell did specifically request that I tell you that he was really worried at this time, and I told him that if anything occurred not to hesitate to call this office, and gave him both the office and my home telephone numbers.

On January 16, 1940, while talking to Mr. Walter Winchell at the Money Plaza Hetel, Miami Beach, Flerida, he divised me they some time age he went to the effice of Mr. Thomas Riv Dewey, the Special Presecutor in New York City, and that while he was waiting on Mr. Dewey, a detective on the New York City Pelice Department, whose name Mr. Winchell did not wish to disclose, approached him and told him that it was somewhat of a joke among the police that the Federal Bureau of Investigation had an Agent with a criminal record working in New York City. He stated he know this because he had arrested him personally on a charge that was not recalled by Mr. Winchell.

Mr. Winchell advised that this alleged Agent is named Elkins, and that he is assigned to some kind of a Government Project at 14th Street and 8th Avenue, in New York City.

Mr. Winchell had no other information about this matter, and desired that I communicate it to the Bureau. He likewise advised no that he would appreciate knowing whether or not this report is true or fulse, insamuch as if it is false, he intends seeing this New York City detective and admonishing him about making remarks of this nature when they are not true.

Dear John

I just left Captain Patterson of the Daily News. I told him that I thought I ought to let him know about the incident in Washington. Captain Patterson said he was already acquainted with the facts. I made it clear to him that nobody for a moment thought the Daily News knew of their representative's doings and the Captain told me that as soon as he heard of it, the man was removed from Washington.

I also made it clear to Captain Patterson that I had persuaded you to allow me to talk to him about it because I felt that he did not know about it.

Captain Patterson told me that he was among the many who thrilled about the work of the F. B. I. in ridding the nation of kidnappers. He said if anything happened to his children, the G-Men would be the first he'd contact.

He said he was just as opposed to the Mann Act and the enforcement of it as he was in 1911 when he wrote editorials in Chicago against the proposed legislation.

The Captain also said that he didn't see why any man in the public eye should be sensitive about criticism——the same criticism that is given to the President, the Mayor of New York, down to the cops. In short, John, the Daily News respects you and your men, but detests the Mann Act and the enforcement of it.

I felt better having seen Captain Patterson, even though the information was already known to him. The actions of an unscrupulous reporter or G-Man should not be blamed on his chief.



You may recall that testimony before the Dies Committee a year ag revealed that the foremest Italian Fasciat propaganda agency in the United States is the Dante Alleghiere Society of New York. T is the agency which each year send little American boys to Italy to have them trained there in fascist campas. They compleak to America in black shirt uniforms. This is also the agency which spreads literally tons of fascist propaganda throughout the Unite States, particularly among the Italian-American element. This society is openly to "further Italian ideals" in our sountry.

Sleepy editors in Chicago failed to note recently an item of imposing which they printed. This item revealed that the Dante group is now handing out "honorary memberships" to some of Chicago fore most socialites, including Potter Palmer. The editors have not y been tipped off to the big story behind the little one which they printed.

You may recall when we were in Miami in December, 1938, and at witime I told you of the growing menace of the Klan; that the counwould hear a good deal about the new Klan within a year thereaft. The terrorism incidents which I predicted at that time have come true in Florida, Carolinas, Georgia, as you have read in the papacross past months and recent weeks.

Can tell you the Klan has launched new membership drives on the Pacific Coast, particularly in Los Angeles. A drive also-has be started in Omaha. Incidently, everywhere I have talked I have defended John Edgar as you have, against the recent attacks.

You may be interested in knowing that I shall speak at the Common in Boston to offset the Communist celebration at same place and at the same time.
