For approximately four years HANNS EISLER has been working closely with BERT BRECHT among whose creations are 'The Mothers' and the 'Pinheads and the Roundheads', for which EISLER prepared the music. We understand that Comrade HANNS EISLER plans to write the music in Moscow for the new film of JORIS IVENS."

Under the name of HANS or LOU EISLES, subject and his wife maintained a joint commercial account at the vestwood Branch of the Bank of america, at Westwood, California. During the latter half of 1946, the bank balance remained in the four figure class and checks seemed to be small. In June of 19h6, they wrote seventy-six checks all in small amounts totaling \$1,857.21. The balance was between \$1,000 and \$2,000. In Adgust of 1946 they wrote ten checks totaling \$300.18 and made no deposits. Their balance ran between \$1,570 and \$1,870. In September, 1946, they wrote fifty-six checks totaling \$874.78 and made three small deposits of \$106.20 on September 12, 1946; \$710.70 on September 20, 1946; \$40 on September 27, 1946. Their balance stayed between \$1300 and \$1500. In November, 1946, they wrote forty-six checks totaling #630.62 and made three deposits, \$75 on November 9, \$250 on November 19 and \$100 on November 22. Their balance ran between \$700 and \$1.000.

The bank balance in recent nonths has run slightly high reflecting probably increased steadiness of work as indicated by the salary statements from RKO Radio Fictures as set out above. In Januar, of 1947, they made six deposits of \$100 on January 13, 1947; \$20 on January 16, 1947; \$50 on January 20, 1947; \$450 on January 20, 1947; \$15 on January 27, 1947 and \$1,037.40 on January 27, 1947. Their closing balance for the months of January was \$1,490.74. During the month they wrote checks in small amounts; the only one of any size was \$150, January 24, 1947, possibly the check for rent on their residence.

At the end of February, 1947, their bank balance was \$2,058.04. They made deposits in amounts of \$1,080.10 February 5, and \$690.10 on February 19. During that month they wrote checks as follows:

A telegram was sent to EISIER on June 5, 1947, by the Honorable 5 PARNELL THOMAS, Chairman, Committee on Un-American Activities, advising. Subject that his scheduled appearance before the committee on June 16, 1947, had been postponed until September, 1947, and that he would be notified in advance of the exact date. On June 5, 1947, EISLER was called collect at Plaza 3-0735, New York City, by CLIFFORD CDETS, who had also called the Subject the previous day, from Malibu 8262, Malibu, California, which is the telephone at EISLER's residence.

The Subject called Stilwell 4-2514, New York City, from his residence on May 25, 27, 30, and June 2, 1947.

Mrs. LOUISE SISLER, wife of the Subject, received a telegram from the Subject on June 9, 1947, which stated that he expected to arrive at the Los Angeles Kunicipal Airport on Thursday, June 12, 1947, at 7:45 A.M. Investigation determined that the only flight scheduled to arrive at this time was Flight 35, Trans World Airlines, which departed from New York at 10:45 P.M., June 11, 1947.

A review of EISLER's bank account at the Westwood Branch, Bank of America, disclosed that there was one check dated June 27, 1947, signed by HANNS FISLER in the sum of \$3.53. The check was cashed at the Walibu Inn, Walibu, California. Investigation at Walibu failed to disclose anyone who had seen EISLER since the first part of June, 1947, prior to his departure for New York. The bank account included a number of checks made out by LOUISE EISLER.

On June 30, 1947, two Western Union cablegrams were delivered to the RISLER residence. One was signed by an individual named DESFONTAINES and offered the Subject \$10,000.00 plus \$500.00 traveling expenses and transportation for himself and wife to come to haris in order to begin an original score and direct the music for a production in haris of REMISSICARROLL'S "Alice in Wonderland". With reference to this offer EISLER was to contact one SKADRON in Los Angeles for a contract.

The second cablegram delivered on June 30, 1947, was signed by LOU EUNIN and directed EISLER to write a letter to the French Consul at Los Angeles, giving his passport and visa numbers as well as dates, and to request a French visa number. Thereafter EISLER was to air mail a copy of this letter to BUNIN in care of UCC. This method of obtaining a French visa was at the requirement of the French Foreign Linistry.

It has been brought to the Bureau's attention that Hans Eisler made application at the State Department on June 19 for an exit permit to proceed to Paris, France. You will recall that a short time ago Hans Eisler appeared before the House Un-American Activities Committee in Los Angeles and due to his uncooperative attitude was requested to appear before the full Committee in Washington on June 12. This hearing however was cancelled. It is apparent that the Un-American Activities Committee investigators have been attempting today to locate Hans Eisler in order to subpoena him to appear before the Committee in Washington.

an investigator for the Un-American Activities Committee, has been in conference with the State Department today and has requested that no exit permit be issued to Eisler to leave the United States. The State Department has advised thru liaison channels of the Bureau that no action will be taken on Eisler's application and that officially it is in a "pending status". It further appears that the Un-American Activities Committee and the State Department have requested that INS not issue a re-entry permit to Eisler in the event he is successful in leaving the U.S.

of the State Department has confidentially advised that Eisler is being sought in California, Washington and New York without success and that possibly he has succeeded in leaving the U.S. at one of the Mexican border stations. He stated that the I&N Service has apparently attempted to place stops but that they are ineffectual upon a short notice.

ACTION: None. The above is for your information in vew of the possibility the Bureau may be requested to aid in the search for Eisler if he is not located in the immediate future by the Un-American Activities Committee.

Congressman J. Parnell Thomas called to advise that Eisler was under subpoena to appear before the Committee on June 16th, that the hearing had to be postponed because he was tied up on the court cases, that he has now learned that Eisler has made application for an exit permit and upon receiving this information he tried to serve an additional subpoena in Los Angeles but the U.S. Marshal could not locate him. They have been checking in Tashington with the thought that he might be attending his brother's trial but have not been able to find him.

He thought we might have some line on Eisler or possibly might be able to locate Eisler and then notify him so he could have a subpoena served on Eisler. I told him we would check to see if we had a line and in addition I felt certain the Director would want to put out a line to see if he could be located. He saidhe would be deeply appreciative if this could be done and would consider it a special favor as he does not want to see Eisler get out of the country without appearing before the Committee.

At approximately 6:05 p.m. today Mr. William Ryan, Supervisor, Washington Field Office, called the Bureau and spoke with Supervisor R. A. Collier and the writer. He advised that office had been requested by the New York Field Division to conduct an extensive investigation, including checks of all hotels, in an effort to locate Hans Eisler for the Un-American Activities Committee.

You will recall that Hans Eisler is wanted by the Committee in order that a subpoena may be served upon him for his appearance on September 23rd before the Committee. It has previously been reported that Hans Eisler may have fled the country to Mexico. Newspaper stories concerning this have been current for the past two days.

Mr. Ryan was advised that the Bureau is desirous of locating Hans Eisler, but that he is not to be questioned or picked up, and that the Bureau should be immediately advised as to his location in the event he is found. Mr. Ryan was further informed that the Bureau files do not indicate any particular place in Washington, D. C., where Hans Eisler has previously stayed and it was suggested that a check of the leading hotels in Washington be made, and that this matter be discussed with the appropriate Bureau officials tomorrow to determine what additional investigation is desired.

Mr. Ryan stated the New York Office had advised that Hans Eisler was last known to them to be in New York on June 11th.



There has been no information developed through any available sources to indicate that HANNS ETSLER was in attendance at any time during the trial of his brother, GERHART ETSLER for contempt of Congress. SA ROBERT LAMPHERE of the New York Office was in attendance at this trial as a witness and advises there was no indication that HANNS ETSLER had been in attendance at any time. It was also determined through inquiry of Mr. Investigator for the House Un-American Activities Committee, that HANNS ETSLER did not appear as a witness on June 16, 1947, as had been previously scheduled; that the particular hearing was not held in view of which no subpoena had been issued for him.

On the evening of July 10, 1947, Supervisor GRANVILLE of the New York Office telephonically advised that the New York Office had received instructions from the Bureau to attempt to locate HANNS HISLER; that the Bureau was interested in his location inasmuch as Representative J. PARNELL THOMAS of the House Committee on Un-American Activities is desirous of having him served with a subpoena and that the U. S. Marshal at Los Angeles had been unable to locate him. SA GRANVILLE advised that there is no indication HANNS HISLER was in New York City at the present time; that he had been there on June 11, 1947, when he made a speech but that he had left via plane for the West Coast on that date. SA GRANVILLE suggested that a further check be made at Washington, D. C., through inquiry of some of the leading hotels to determine whether HANNS HISLER might be in the City of Washington.

Inquiry of the Mayflower, Washington, Willard, Raleigh, Ambassador, Statler and Hamilton Hotels failed to reflect that HAINS EISLER had been registered at any of these places. Mr. of the Lee Sheraton Hotel, advised that GERHART EISLER and his wire, together with Attorney CAROL KING and the ISSERMANS, had checked cut of that hotel on the morning of July 10, 1947, and returned to New York. He stated that HANNS EISLER had not been a guest at the hotel nor was there any indication he had been in contact with the above-named individuals.

He stated that it had been ascertained that HANNS EISLER had made application for an exit visa on June 19, 1947, stating that he desired to sail for Paris, France, on July 24 or as soon as possible. According to Mr. EISLER indicated he would work for a motion picture firm in Paris. It was further indicated by Mr. that the State Department would deny the application for exit visa. and that no other investigation would be conducted unless advised to the contrary.

A check of the records of the Hotel Edison by SA failed to reflect any record of HANNS EISLER having stopped there. The hotel files did show that on May 23, 1947 a letter dated the preceding day was received from one SAMUEL SILLEN, Editor of MAINS TREAM, a literary quarterly. Therein, Mr. SILLEN requested that a reservation be made for a double room for Mr. and Mrs. HANNE EISLER for one week beginning June 5, 1947. He added that there was a possibility that the EISLERS would remain for two or three additional days, and he further requested that no bills be rendered the EISLERS but rather, they should be sent to him at the office of MAINS TREAM which was given as 832 Broadway, New York City.



The Los Angeles Office by teletype of July 9, 1947 reported that information was received to the effect that HANNS RISLER had been scheduled to depart from New York City on TWA Flight #35 on June 11, 1947 at 10:35 P.N. A check of the TWA records by Special Agent revealed that the only record now available in New York City on this flight was a passenger list prepared from the plane's manifest. According to this list, one "H. SEISLER" checked in at LaGuardia Field on the night of June 11, 1947 for this flight to Los Angeles. However, it was also determined that it is the usual policy on these flights that the passenger list obtained in New York is wired to Kansas City and verified from the manifest there. This verification, when returned to the New York Office of TWA, bore the name of the aforementioned traveller as H. EISLER. There was no record of the subject's wife being on this plane.

It was further ascertained that the manifest for this flight is presently filed at the Transcontinental Service Office, 112 West Ninth Street, Kansas City, Missouri. This manifest would contain any additional information concerning EISLER, such as his New York contact point (if any supplied), number of bags, etc.

By teletype of July 10, 1947, the Kansas City Office was requested to obtain this information and so advise the office of origin.



Additional information was obtained relative to the subject of instant investigation as the result of a number of interviews held with various individuals in the New York Office. This information and the name of the person furnishing same is being set forth below.

HEDWIG MASSING

This individual is known to have been a former Soviet Agent and was at one time the wife of subject's brother, GERHART EISLER. She reported that she naturally knew HANNS EISLER and said that he used to visit her and her husband, PAUL MASSING, at their farm in Quakerstown, Pennsylvania. During these visits, she continued, HANNS would become anti-Soviet in his opinions. However, as soon

as he was again in contact with his Communists friends, he would switch back to pro-Soviet views. HEDWIG MASSING considered HANNS to be very weak politically, being a person who has always been strongly dominated by his brother. These views of HEDWIG MASSING were furnished to the Bureau and Los Angeles Office by letter of April 10, 1947.

PAUL MASSING

This individual was interviewed by SA

He advised that he knew HANNS EISLER as the brother of GERHART, and recalled that he had first met the former around 1923 in Berlin. At that time, he continued, HANNS was well known for his composing, and he was writing music for left-wing plays. Further, HANNS was quite friendly with an individual who directed, what MASSING called radical but not necessarily Communist plays. MASSING specifically remembered that HANNS EISLER had worked on a play entitled, "The Merchant of Berlin". Another person whom MASSING recalled as being an associate of EISLER in Germany and later in Hollywood, was one BERTHOLD PRECHT. He described ERECHT as being left-wing and possibly a Communist. With further reference to HANNS' activities in Germany, MASSING said he thought he remembered that EISLER had a son by a wife in Germany. This woman, he believed, had gone to Russia and MASSING never heard of her again.

PAUL MASSING continued to advise that he again met HANNS EISLER around 1939 after EISLER came to the United States and at this time got to know him well. Later on, beginning in around 1940, MASSING said that HANNS EISLER and his wife IOU spent two summers in Quakerstown, Pennsylvania at the MASSING farm. MASSING thought that also about this time HANNS had an apartment on the West side of New York but he was unable to recall just where.

The EISLERS, HANS and LOV. drove to the West Coast in the car of CLIFFORD ODETS after the summer of 1940. They stayed in los Angeles and the following spring drove to Mexico in order to reenter the United States as quota immigrants. They again came to the MASSING farm in the summer of 1941.

In Hollywood, HANNS EISLER first wrote music for pictures. MASSING thought that his first was possibly a Steinbeck story and he suggested the Grapes of Wrath" or a somewhat similar story. This first attempt by EISLER was a success and consequently HANNS EISLER remained in California. There, MASSING related, HANNS EISLER associated principally with BERTHOLD BRECHT, CLIFFORD ODETS, CHARLES CHAPLIN and others of the German left-wing colony.

Mr. MASSING also remembered that HANNS EISLER had formerly had a job teaching at the New School of Social Research in 1940 or 1941. In addition, he got a Rockefeller grant to write music for the motion picture. Sometime around





1940 MASSING said he met OTTO KATZ at HANNS EISLER's apartment. This KATZ, MASSING described as a Czechoslovakian who has written under the name of ANDREASIMON. He also said that he had met EGON KISCH at the EISLER place.

According to MASSING, HANNS EISLER knew that the MASSINGS were at one time pro-Communist and were now anti-Communist. However, MASSING said that HANNS was under the influence of his wife who seemed to be definitely anti-Stalinist and was probably a Trotskyite. HANNS was outraged at the Hitler-Stalin pact. Continuing, MASSING stated that HANNS is not a strong Communist, is easily swayed and does not have strong convictions. Further, MASSING thought that the best the Communists could expect HANNS to do would be to have him set the stage for a meeting or the like because of his artistic standings, as he does not have the personality or the conviction to be a leader. HANNS was also described as a heavy drinker, with a fine personality and a good sense of humour.

Contiming, Mr. MASSING said that up to 1925 or 1926 HANNS EISIER had kept aloof from politics, leaving such work to GERHART and RUTH. After 1926, probably through the influence of GERHART, MASSING thought, HANNS became a Communist. In 1930 or 1931 HANNS was in Moscow where he played his new German revolutionary songs. MASSING recalled that these were on records and one time he played them for the MASSINGS. HANNS was never a leader of the Communist Party in Germany and MASSING did not believe he was ever a member of the GPU or the Soviet Military Intelligence.

During the time HANNS was in the United States, MASSING did not know if he ever saw GERHART as he never mentioned doing so CASSING did remember that when his wife, MEDI, saw HANS in Hollywood in January of 1947 HANNS was very critical of STALIN. On the other hand, MASSING continued, such expressions on the part of HANNS did not mean too much as the latter would usually agree with anyone's viewpoint in order not to disturb or ruin a good friendship because of politics. In short, MASSING said, HANNS usually agrees with the persons in whose company he finds himself. However, MASSING said that HANNS would probably help his brother and engage in activities that he would not normally be connected with in order to indicate that he is a decent individual.

In conclusion, MASSING said that HANNS could get a position of importance in the event he would return to the Soviet occupied area of Germany. However, MASSING remarked he felt that the fact that HANNS EISLER was remaining in the United States was a good indication that he was not interested in returning to Germany. MASSING said that after he, MASSING, broke with the Russians, many of his Communist friends dropped him. However, HANNS EISLER continued to remain friendly.

RUTH FISCHER

As is known, RUTH FISCHER is a sister of GERHART and HANNS EISLER and has been a political enemy of GERHART's for a number of years. During the course of being interviewed, RUTH FISCHER's attention was drawn to certain information she had given in an article in the "New York Journal American" relative to GERHART's having been in China. In reply, she stated that her information relative to GERHART's activities in China had been obtained primarily from HANNS. This would seem to definitely indicate knowledge of GERHART's activities on HANNS' part.

Continuing, RUTH FISCHER related that in the Spring of 1933 she had been living in Paris in the same apartment house with HANNS and was, in fact, being supported by him inasmuch as they were more or less on friendly terms at that time because they were both refugees from Germany. She recalled that one night in June of 1933 she returned to her home with a friend, and HANNS came to the apartment and asked that she get rid of the friend as he had a great surprise for her. Accordingly, she continued, after a period of time, the woman friend left and thereupon, HANNS pulled aside a curtain at one end of the room and said, "Here is GERHART". RUTH stated that she was at first greatly surprised to see GERHART and did not immediately want to renew her longstanding feud with him. Consequently, in the period of the next eight days to two weeks they were more or less on friendly terms, talking together for long periods of time. She said that during these conversations, GERHART told her of his Chinese experiences and bragged concerning his new assignment as a Comintern Agent to the United States.

RUTH FISCHER also advised the interviewing agents that from HANNS EISLER and from other sources still active in Russia, she had learned that while in Moscow, GERHART EISLER was kept in seclusion at the Hotel Lux and was not even allowed to read German papers. She also stated that HANNS EISLER's trip to the United States in 1935, at the request of the School for Social Research in New York City, had been arranged by GERHART who was them in the United States.

RUTH FISCHER also concurred in the aforementioned opinion of HEDWIG MASSING as to HANNS EISLER's political views, namely, that he was easily swayed and was definitely not strong in his political convictions.

With reference to the aforementioned article which appeared in the "New York Journal American" RUTH FISCHER wrote for this paper a series of six articles on her brother GERHART which appeared in the issues of November 18 to November 23, 1946 inclusive. Copies of these articles have already been furnished the Bureau. However, a perusal of same reflects the following references to HANNS EISLER:





Article #1 dated November 18. 1946

Therein, RUTH advised as to the arrival of GERHART in New York in the summer of 1941. She continues, "The closely knit German-Communist group, brother HANNS EISLER among them, awaited their new chief respectfully. HANNS, a well known musician and film composer, was a valuable link to the world of swarming literati, professors, actors, and other American intelligencia who, have found in STALIN's Russia their spiritual fatherland.

Article #3 dated November 20, 1946

Therein, Mrs. FISCHER advises as to the arrival of GERHART EISLER, alias HANS BERGER, in New York City in 1933. She then continues, "HANNS EISLER followed GERHART to America two years later and they met in New York. After the sterile wrath against his Russian boss had past, HANNS was again conditioned for Party assignments on the cultural front. During the 30's, he travelled back and forth between the States and Europe, making several pilgrimages to Russia. A Party member active in the propagation of Soviet culture is required to demonstrate his continual loyalty by regular visits to Moscow.

Later on, in the same article, Mrs. FISCHER tells of her activities in the show trials of 1936 and states that the GPU Chief (ISHINSKY gave the third degree to a friend of hers who finally confessed that on TROTSKY's orders I, RUTH FISCHER, had sent him to Russia in March 1933 to assassinate STALIN. She continues, "During this, period, both EISLERS became very frightened. They feared that the mere fact of our family relationship would endanger their Party careers and involve them in the purge. Their faces paled, when by chance, on one of their frequent trips to Paris, we happened to brush by each other in the street. They were much more afraid than I of any personal contact".

Article #4 dated November 21, 1946

Therein, Mrs. FISCHER writes of how she ascertained the degree of HANNS EISLER's service to the Party and how she was disgusted with this service She further remarks that HANNS had contacted her "in a voice bordering on hysteris and demanded of her again and again why the defendants confessed in Moscow". She continues to state that the long-winded self-accusations usually involve new people and remarks that the thought that he and GERHART might feature in one of them "had reduced HANNS to a state of political palsy". She says that he begged her to let it be known that for years they had had no connections and adds that she herself made no attempts to hide her contempt for him. She then states that "I asked him what had happened to GERHART, and at the mention of his brother's name he was seized with a paralytic shock, unable to utter another word.





Later on, Mrs. FISCHER comments on the arrival of GERHART in New York City in June of 1941 and adds, "In response to liberal pressure, in which HANNS had a hand, he was released after three months against a \$500 bond". (from Ellis Island).

Article #5 dated November 22, 1946

Therein, RUTH FISCHER comments on the work of GERHART EISLER in the United States and compares this work with that of PAUL MERKER, a Communist trade union organizer, and Reichstag Deputy in Mexico. She adds, "Compared with MERKER's job in Mexico, TRHART's counsel for a democratic Germany made a poor showing indeed. But with the help of his brother HANNS, the composer, he was able to compensate for the failure by making a showing among the actors and writers of Hollywood".


Article #6 dated November 23, 1946

In this article RUTH FISCHER deals almost entirely with HANNS EISLER. In effect she states as follows:

HANNS EISLER was brought into the Communist Party in 1926 by GERHART and arrived in Berlin at the time when GERHART was maneuvering to become a leader of the German Communists. GERHART hoped to profit from his family relation with the composer and frilled him with stories of the mysteries and adventure hidden among the secrets of conspiratorial technique. HANNS was happy in the jobs he was given and in the Party had a chance to build up workers choruses and amateur orchestras and to develop them along his own lines.

HANNS went to the United States in 1935 and his stay in that country has been interrupted periodically by trips to Europe. He became a member of an international cultural clique, and French, Hungarian, Czechoslovakian Russian, and German Agents took advantage of his liberality and drank whiskey with literati at parties he threw in London, Prague, Paris, and Barcelona. In HANNS' household the occasional arrival of GERHART was an event and the preparation for his coming marked him as an important person. In 1942 he went to Hollywood where he composed incidental music for pictures, and while there, the Russian Consul in Los Angeles invited him to his intimate parties and honored him by appearing at the parties HANNS gave in return. People who visited in his home were curious companions for NKVD terrorists.

HANNS EISLER's good friend BERT BRECHT has long been a minstrel of the NKVD, as a poet of the nkvD, as a poet of the nkvD, when GERHART went to China, he he wrote letters to HANNS and BRECHT describing his exploits in bloody detail.





"Die Massnahme" (inadequately translated as "The Leasure") with music by HANNS was played in one of Berlin's largest theaters and is a tribute to GERHART and his GPU fraternity brothers.

TREEMAN stated that to the best of his recollection he met GERHART EISLER through HANNS in approximately 1935 and the former was introduced to him as the brother of HANNS. At the time, he said he knew that EISLER was regarded as a "C.I. Rep." and was known as EDWARDS but that in all of his contacts with him, which were purely social in nature, nothing was ever said to this effect.

GERHART EISLER

GERHART EISLER was interviewed on July 19, 1946 by Special Agent and the reporting agent, but during the course of this interview he submitted little information pertaining to the subject of instant investigation.

GERHART did advise that he himself had been born in Leipzig, Germany on February 20, 1897. He supplied his father as RUDOIPHIEISLER, an Austrian Jew who was a Professor of Philosophy. His mother MA was of German descent. He reported that he had one brother, HANNS EISLER, and a sister, RUTH FISCHER, both of whom were presently in the United States. When advising as to his own sources of income, GERHART claimed that in 1942 he and his wife were supported by his brother HANNS and by friends.

Since the advent of GERHART EISLER into the newspapers, considerable information has been supplied relative to his activities and those of the subject of instant investigation in the daily newspapers. The majority of this information has already been supplied to the Bureau. However, there's being set forth herewith certain pertinent parts of articles which appeared in the New York newspapers relative to HANNS EISLER aniwhich did not appear to be from a press service.

In an article dated October 15, 1946 in the "New York World Telegram", it was stated that GERHART EISLER was the brother of HANNS "noted exiled German composer who writes music for the movies in Hollywood. In 1940 the composer received a \$20,000 experimental grant from the Rockefeller Foundation to score sound tracks in his own style of music. One of them was the BONALD DUCK short His Better Self!. Mr. EISLER's latest screen grant was for the CARY GRANT—ETHEL BARRYMORE film None But the Lonely Heart!". According to the article, this information emanated from RUTH FISCHER.



In an article dated October 17, 1946 in the "New York Journal American", it was stated "EISLER's brother is HANNS EISLER, Hollywood composer, who was under investigation by Immigration Authorities on charges that he came here from Germany to preach revolution through his songs".

The "New York Journal American" for October 18, 1946 states that GERHART EISLER "is a brother of a Hollywood composer, HANNS EISLER, whose best known work is a song called Momintern - short for Communist International.".

The "Daily Worker" for October 18, 1946 set forth the results of an interview with GERHART EISLER wherein he states that "I have a brother Hanns who is amusician and who is interested only in music, and I have a sister, RUTH FISCHER, a Trotskyist who runs a gutter sheet which has denounced every anti-Fascist as a Stalinist from ROOSEVELT on down".

The "New York World Telegram" for October 21, 1946 drew attention to the fact that HANNS EISLER was a brother of GERHART and was the foremost composer of revolutionary songs in the world Communist movement. It was further stated that he is now a successful music writer in Hollywood. It was stated also that HANNS has come to the defense of his brother, stating that GERHART was only in the United States as a German refugee.

The article continues to state that it had been learned that HANNS EISLER composed the revolutionary march "Comintern" and also other stirring revolutionary songs, such as "Med Front". Reference is then made to the fact that the aforementioned "Comintern" was published in the 30's by the Workers Book Shop which is owned by the Communist Party. The article then states that in recent years HANNS EISLER has confined his compositions strictly to capitalist enterprises and then names a number of the films for which he has composed the music. It is then stated that HANNS came to the United States in the early 30's, an exile from Nazi Germany and wrote his revolutionary songs for the Communist Workers Music League and was active in the Pierre Degeyter's Music Club, named after the Frenchman who wrote "The Internationale" in 1888.

The article then goes on to describe certain remarks made relative to HANNS EISLER in the Workers Book Shop's Red Song Book". Attention is then drawn to the fact that the words to the aforementioned "Comintern" were written by V. J. JEROME, a top official in the Communist Party today and an assistant editor of Political Affairs", the party's theoretical magazine formerly called "The Communist".

In the October 21, 1946 issued of the "New York Post", the columnist DOROTHY THOMPSON comments, "If GERHART EISLER is investigated, so should



be his brother HANNS, whom I once felt for but who is tightly connected with Communist circles now.

"The Career of GERHART EISLER as a Comintern Agent". Therein, they comment, "Of late EISLER has concentrated on winning support for these aims among United States artists, writers, and intellectuals. His brother HANNS, who wrote the music for the battle song Momintern' and other Marxist music and is now a prosperous Hollywood composer, was in a position to help him meet the right people when GERHART and BEUNHILDA motored to the Coast last summer".

The "New York Sun" of February 19, 1947 reflected that in an article by the columnist GEORGE E SOKOLSKY the latter writes. "I would suggest attention, for instance, to the case of JOHANNES (HANS) EISLER, the brother of GERHARDIAEISLER, the alien Communist, himself an alien and presumably a Communist as he wrote their great international hymn".

The "Daily Worker" for February 8, 1947 carried an article reflecting that "HANNS EISLER, the noted composer now working in Hollywood, yesterday declared his support for his brother GFRHART and denounced their sister for her help to the THOMAS-RANKIN Committee". The article continued to reflect that RUTH FISCHER, at a hearing in Washington, had attacked not only GERHART but another "HANNS".

The "New York World Telegram" of February 27, 1947 reflects an article giving information obtained from Mrs. ELLY EISLER, mee TUNE, who is known to have been a former wife of GERHART EISLER. In this information it was stated that Mrs. ELLA EISLER reported that she had endeavored to locate her husbar through his brother HANNS EISLER, Hollywood cinema composer, but he failed to reply to her letters.

The "Daily Worker" of March 2, 1947 sets forth the contents of three letters sent by GERHART EISLES from the Federal Detention House in NewYork to his wife HIDA. In one of these letters, which was dated February 12, 1947, GERHART writes, "Please write to my brother HANNS in California and tell him I have my great joy that he keeps his head high and that he was very much pleased with his statement about his former sister".

The New York Journal American for April 8, 1947 reflected that a sub-committee of the House Committee on Un-American Activities planned to go to Hollywood the first week in May. The article continues to state that among witnesses to be questioned on the West Coast would be HANNS EISLER, brother of GERHART.





The "New York Journal American" for May 11, 1947 carried an article entitled. HANNS EISLER Gave Red Line". Therein, it was reported that HANNS EISLER, who was scheduled to appear before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in Los Angeles, was for years one of the leaders of the Communist Party's National Cultural Commission. This information, according to the article, was learned from a former Communist who had attended many meetings of the "Cultural Commission" at the Communist Party National Headquarters, 35 East 12th Street, New York City and heard EISLER "give the line" on Red Fascist strategy in Hollywood. Continuing, the article stated that this former Communist said that EISLER was "more than just a member of the Communist Party — he was one of the real top policy makers in the field of music, movies, and the art".

The article goes on, "He ranked with V. J. JEROME, the Chairman of the Reds' Cultural Commission. HANNS would outline plans to be followed in Hollywood to recruit movie stars, to place Communist propaganda in screen scripts, and in general was the commissar of the West Coast Party activities on the movie front".

The "New York Daily Worker" for May 11, 1947 carried a photograph of HANNS EISLER and referred to the fact that he had been ordered to appear before a sub-committee of the House Un-American Committee on the following day. The article attached thereto quotes HANNS EISLER to the following effect: "I love and admire my brother — — I think the campaign against him is the beginning of a campaign against the liberal and progressive forces in this country — —I have seen such campaigns before, in Germany before 1933. I know that when my brother came to the United States, he came as an agent for nobody. He came as a sick man from a concentration camp. I know he wanted to go to Mexico and was held here against his wishes — — It would perhaps be better to ask the anti-Nazi underground in Europe for information about my brother. They would have more and better information about his activities". It was then stated that HANNS EISLER had been served with two subpoence, one for his appearance before the Un-American Committee on the following day and one to appear again on July 16 before the full committee.

The "New York Post" for June 7, 1947 reflected a column by VICTOR RIESEL. Therein, he comments to the effect that HANNS EISLER and others, on the night of June 11, would be at a pro-Communist rally in Manhattan, the tickets for which were being sold at the official Communist Party book stores.

The "New York Daily Worker" of June 11, 1947 reflects an article which states to the effect that HANNS EISLER was scheduled to speak on his experiences as an artist before the House Un-American Committee at the Artists Fight Back" rally in Manhattan Center.





The article continues to state that EISLER read a statement he had made to the Committee in Hollywood a few weeks ago, which statement had been ignored by every newspaper in the country. Continuing, the article draws attention to the fact that EISLER would be joined at this meeting by other prominent figures in the arts from Hollywood and New York and reports that the meeting is being sponsored by Main Stream.

areview of the New York indices reflects that the Bureau is already in possession of all information contained in the New York files relative to HANNS IDLER with the following exceptions:

1. The April 1936 issue of "The New Pioneer" reflects an advertisement which is entitled, Three Records of Workers Songs" published by the Timely Recording Company, Department C, 235 Fifth Avenue, New York City. The addescribes one of these records in this manner. "'In Praise of Learning' was written by HANNS EISLER and BERTHOLD ERECHT for Mother, a musical play based on MAXINGERYS novel of the same name". It was then stated that the recorded version had been rearranged for the composer who supervised the recording. The adcontinues, "The fresh note this song strikes, coupled with its splendid vigor, makes this recording of particular interest. Other side — Lights Up" (EISLER)".

2. A pamphlet entitled Workers Theater", October 1931. A perusal of this reflects that it was published monthly by the United Workers Theater of New York: Workers Laboratory Theater of the W.I.R. On page 33 of this pamphlet there was an article entitled, "Alworker's Musical Publication". Therein, it is stated that the Workers Music League is a section of the Workers Cultural Federation and was publishing a series entitled Music for the Masses". The article continues to the effect that the first publication would be a song "Comintern" composed by "HANNS EISLER, the foremost German revolutionist composer. This song had a circulation of 300,000 copies along in the Soviet Union".

For the past five months I have found myself attacked and publicized to a very unusual degree. The reason for this campaign against me is clear. I am accused of being the brother of Gerhart Eisler. And I have stood by him. I shall continue to do so.

What are the facts? I arrived in Hollywood in 1942. My activities have been artistic activities. In addition to the charber music, piano and orchestral works I composed in Hollywood, I wrote the musical score for nine motion pictures, including "Hangmen Also Die", "Spanish Main" and "None But the Lonely Heart".

never dabbled in it. That does not mean that I am not interested in world affairs, or that I advocate the old theory that an artist, should remain isolated in his ivory tower, for which it is becoming increasingly difficult to pay the rent anyway.

It is not surprising to me that due to the accident of my geographical situation - I am living in Hollywood - and the co-incidence of my family ties, the House Un-American Activities Committee should find me a most convenient target for attack. But what does infuriate me, and what is most unfair in the announced investigation of my "Hollywood activities", is the attempt to intimidate and smear my friends and the artists with whom I have had brofessional contacts.

In Germany it had been necessary for an artist who wished to remain a living and an eating one, (though not a corrupted one); to participate in the fight against reaction and fascism. I had participated in this struggle as a musician, and my contribution was a modest one. My contact with politics and political parties has always been casual. But on all my concert tours, professional trips which took me whether to Amsterdam, Prussels, Copenhagen, Zurich, London, Madrid, Paris, New York, Prague or Moscow, I was received not only as a composer, but also as a co-fighter against the Nazis and their collaborators.

In my travels I met anti-fascists of every description: communists, social democrats, liberals, monarchists and confusion, sionists - of all social stratas. I saw mistakes and confusion, set-backs and defeats. It was a bitter time. What could I contribute? I was a musician, so I contributed music: songs, stage music, contatas and oratorios. I did my best to inspire all those who fought against the Nazi criminals. Among these were communists, reliable fighters with good discipline, who fought heroically under the most complicated conditions, where mercy was not expected and mercy was not given. Neither the syndicated hysteria of a



certain press with its smear campaigns, nor a House Committee on Un-American Activities will be able to intimidate me or prevent me from saying this.

And nobody can prevent me from stating my sympathy for labor. In my earliest childhood already I had heard my father speak with respect of labor. He was a distinguished philosopher, whose book, "The Encyclopedia of Philosophical Terminology" (Woerterbuch der Philosophischen Begriffe) is still considered a classic. My mother was the daughter of a worker. My father's philosophic attachment to labor was based on the works of Kant and Hegel, which he masterfully interpreted.

I was raised in the tradition of German characteri music:
Bach, Mozart, Beethoven. I realized how susceptible the greatest.
musicians have been to the spiritual trends of their times. Johann Sebastian Bach, in his B Minor Mass, in the Passion According to St. John, and in the Passion According to St. Matthew, gave voice to the incredible sufferings of the German people after the Thirty Years War. His musical style was a great progress from the cold, empty musical routine of his contemporaries. Mozart, for one of his most beautiful operas, chose a play by the radical playwright, Beaumarchais. In his husic and symphonies he developed a new sensitivity and differentiation of musical language which was clearly a response to the ideas of his age, the "Age of Reason and Enlightenment". The fig two Carefus of Coertarus Nuccie is Will Kursin.

In my student days, Modern music had to fight hard battles against reaction, both cultural and political. When the Nazis came to power, they outlawed modern music, and if the great master, Arnold Schoenberg, my teacher, had not succeeded in leaving Germany, he would have ended in the gas chambers of Ausschwitz. Of course I wrote many compositions of concert character: symphonies, chamber music, orchestral suites, cantatas, oratorios and piano pieces. But I am proud of those of my works that have been used in the great struggle against the threat of barbarism and destruction. And I am very grateful to my many friends in heliqued who have stood by me in the present day continuation of this same struggle.

The Destruction of the land of
