On 10/2/65, LENNIE BRUCE, the nightclub and stage performer widely known for his obscenity, who gave his current residence address as 534 Broadway, San Francisco, California, appeared at the San Francisco Field Office headquarters.

BRUCE, who advised that he is scheduled to begin confinement, 10/13/65, in New York State as a result of a conviction for a lewd show, alleged that there is a conspiracy between the courts of the states of New York and California to violate his rights. Allegedly this violation of his rights takes place by these lower courts failing to abide by decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court with regard to obscenity.

BRUCE admitted that he has failed to exhaust his rights of appeal from the courts of either state, explaining that he has dismissed his attorney and is now a pauper. Further, he admitted that the Legal Aid Society locally refused to furnish him assistance and that several attorneys, whom he did not name, had refused to give any support to his contention that such a conspiracy as he described did, in effect, exist.

BRUCE advised that he had made no other attempt to make a similar complaint at any other FBI field office.

On October 14, 1965, the following article appeared on page 13 of the "San Francisco Examiner" newspaper, captioned "Comedian Bruce A Pauper":

"Comic Lenny Bruce, center of a long series of legal battles over his alleged obscene night club act, yesterday celebrated his 40th birthday by getting himself declared a pauper and asking the Federal court here to keep him out of jail in New York.

"In his self-composed suit, he also asked the U.S. District Court to protect him from 'harassment' by police in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco. He claimed that because of persecutions and prosecutions in these cities he can no longer get bookings for his act.

"In addition, he wants the court to determine how much money he has lost since his 1964 obscenity conviction in New York City and to order the police department there to pay him damages in that amount.

"In his financial statement, Bruce said that since his first arrest for obscenity in San Francisco in 1961, his gross earnings have plummeted from \$108,000 a year to \$10,963 in the first six months of this year. He said his liabilities exceed his assets by \$14,494.

"Bruce, now living with friends in a North Beach hotel, was acquitted of the first obscenity charges in 1962 by a San Francisco jury.

LENNY

Lenny Bruce was many things to many people. Following his recent death, there was a spate of editorializing about his life and career, some of which must be giving Lenny some graven chuckles.

Nobody captured the Lenny Bruce I knew quite as well as Stan Cohen did, the editor of the West Side News and Morningsider, and this column is reprinted with his permission.—Ed.

He had been found guilty of obscenity that morning and now, late in the afternoon, in the Hotel Marlton in Greenwich Village, Lenny Bruce was talking about it to a reporter from the old World-Telegram and Sun.

Now let me tell you, first hand, that newspaper reporters are trained to seek out facts, and so they almost never catch the sense of the event they are covering; therefore they conclude interviews by asking questions like, "How do you think all this will end for you, Lenny?"

"What, the trial," he asked, "the appeal?"

"No, the whole thing, all the trials, the arrests, do you think they'll stop?"

Lenny was leaning against the wall, his hands jammed into the pockets of his denims, the tails of his green-striped dress shirt hanging loose. His eyes, puffed with the profit of lost sleep, were fixed on the debris of legal documents, tapes, trial transcripts, precedent cases, which covered his bed and spilled over onto the floor of the small room. Then he smiled and looked up and he told it in the only way he knew, his private route to truth, he told a story:

"Okay," he said, "here's how it ends. One day I'm going to get an order to appear in court. Oh, shit, what is it this time? But when I get there the courtroom will be all decorated, dig, with balloons, and streamers, and confetti, and when I walk in they'll all jump up and yell 'Surprise.' And there'll be all the cops that busted me, and the judges and DA's who tried me, and they'll say: 'Lenny, this is a surprise party for you, we're giving you a party because even after everything that happened you never lost respect for the law.'"

Well, Lenny Bruce never lost his respect for the law, but he won't get his party, because he's dead now. The cops said it was an over-

dose of drugs, and a friend of his said it was an overdose of cops, but probably it was an overdose of respect for the law.

You see, the trouble with Lenny Bruce was that he really believed he would get his party. Somehow, he never learned that freedom of speech in America meant the right to speak everything but the truth. He never quite understood that he was living in a place whose standards of morality were set by Frank Hogan and Cardinal Spellman and J. Edgar Hoover. How could you tell him that this was their America, and in their America justice means the preservation of power and religion means you don't pay taxes.

But you couldn't really tell that to Lenny, because despite the brutality of his satire, despite the language and the insight and the wit, Lenny Bruce lived with a child's innocence and a naivete which allowed him to believe that he would find justice in Judge Murtagh's court. It was a pretty trial, the kind of a trial in which 15 eyewitnesses testified that Bruce did not make an obscene

gesture during his act but the court found that he did on the lone testimony of the arresting officer. That's how the trial went, and if you were there you knew that the Christians stood a better chance in the Colosseum. Still, Lenny thought he would be acquitted because according to the interpretations of the Supreme Court he was clearly not guilty of obscenity. And that was the Law.

"The law is a beautiful thing," he told me once. "The people who attack the law don't really understand it. You know what it's like?" he said. "It's like the Supreme Court, that's the daddy and it runs the store because it knows how. All the state courts and the civil courts, they're the clerks, and the daddy says, 'Now you just sweep the floor and unpack the stock and that's it. I don't want you to place any orders or change the displays, and keep your hands out of the register.' But the minute he turns his back all the clerks think they know how to run it better, and they start changing everything and ordering the wrong things and it's a mess. The Supreme Court's the big daddy, it knows what is, but the little guys keep trying to run the store."

America is like a giant supermarket whose many departments are independently operated. They are run by such as Johnson and Hoover and Hogan and Spellman.

We have become a nation of clerks.

A Reversal on Lenny Bruce

Well, Lenny Bruce wasn't being obscene after all, or so the Illinois Supreme Court decided in reversing itself because of a U. S. Supreme Court ruling in another case that struck the rule that obscenity and affirmative values must be weighed to determine which predominates. And so the Illinois court held: "Our original opinion recognized the defendant's right to satirize society's attitudes... however, bizarre, as long as the method used in so doing was not so objectionable as to render the entire performance obscene. (But) ... the 'balancing test' rule is no longer a Constitutionally acceptable method of determining whether material is obscene. It is there made clear (by the highest court) that material having any social importance is Constitutionally protected."

A Shrug From Mark Lane

Mark Lane, the attorney who holds differing views about the Presidential assassination, shrugged off the Warren Commission's just-published harsh words about himself. "It is true the Chief Justice said he had every reason to doubt my sincerity," the lawyer said. Earl Warren's newly published statement to Lane during hearings "is a matter of great concern to the commission. If you are unwilling to tell us about those things you consider bear upon the guilt or innocence of Lee Harvey Oswald, and it hands caps us greatly in what we are to do because of the things that you do say, we will be very disappointed, and then when you come fully before us as to those things, we will be disappointed in public." (The attorney claims to have an interview with a woman who saw Patrolman J. D. Tippit murdered, and information about a meeting between Tippit, a state trooper, and a man who placed the anti-racism sign in the Dallas Morning News.)

Cops Put Tape On Bruce... Next Date Courtroom

Perennially "sick" comedian Lenny Bruce has the miseries again today.

Lenny, the iconoclastic expert who specializes in dissecting the ailments of the world around him, was arrested last night for the second time in two weeks. He was charged with giving an obscene performance at the Cafe Au Go Go, 152 Bleecker st.

Police grabbed the 35-year-old entertainer just before he took the floor for his 10 p.m. show. They brought him to the Charles st. station along with Howard Solomon, 38, of 60 E. 9th st., manager of the cafe.

Both were booked on the indecency charge, resulting from a police taping of Mr. Bruce's performance, last Sunday. They will be arraigned later today in Criminal Court.

The gaunt young man has a long record of previous arrests for using off-color material, narcotics possession and assorted complaints in Philadelphia, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Chicago.

He currently is awaiting a hearing on his most previous offense—another indecent performance charge brought in his hometown of Los Angeles last March 28.

DENIED LICENSE

Mr. Bruce only arrived in New York last Friday and gave his initial performance before a sell-out crowd at the Village Theatre on Saturday.

He is not allowed to work in a licensed cabaret or night club here because of his past record. But the Cafe Au Go Go, which commands as much as \$6 for admission for the better tables on weekends, is an expensive basement coffee shop.

Mrs. Ella Solomon, wife of the proprietor, today told the Journal-American:

"I think it's terribly unfair that the police had to take him last night. Why didn't they touch him all week long? They waited for our busiest night."

"There were several policemen, in uniform and off-duty, here all week. I was at the desk and I know. Many were my guests and they were all laughing and having a good time."

"When we got to the precinct there were newspapermen waiting... as if it was all planned in advance."

According to Mrs. Solomon, the entertainer was picked up in his dressing room by police who had a bench warrant.

Mr. Bruce answered routine questions and then left with the officers and Mr. Solomon.

Asked if the wise-cracking Bruce hadn't some words of wisdom for the officers, Mrs. Solomon replied:

"No, actually Mr. Bruce is a very quiet, withdrawn man. A very brilliant man, though—a genius, literally."

"He doesn't talk at all to people he doesn't know..."
