



Highlights



- Significant attacks against Coalition Forces have declined in recent weeks
- Äverage electrical energy production for the week of 16 22 Jul was 106,533 megawatt hours per day
- ï Oil production was over 2.5 million barrels on 21 Jul, the first time since 08 May
- Total number of telephone subscribers in Iraq is now over 1,345,000 (including 524,000 cell phone subscribers) - 61.6% above pre-war levels
- ï Over 34% of the \$18.4 billion Iraq Relief and Reconstruction Fund (IRRF) is contractually obligated



Governance - Developments



- The United Nations is assisting the Iraqi Interim Government (IIG) in preparation for Jan 05 national elections
 - ñ Options for voter and political party registration are being developed
- i USAID is supporting civil society involvement in the national elections through:
 - ñ Educating voters on broad issues of democracy, participation, and elections
 - ñ Building capacity within local civil society organizations to monitor the electoral process and field domestic election observers
- i Prime Minister Allawi has been visiting several Arab countries during the last week. Discussions included: Iraqi debt relief, border control, and security assistance
 - ñ PM Allawi attended a regional security conference in Cairo where improved security cooperation was sought



Governance - Developments (Cont)



- ï USAID continues capacity building activities for local government:
 - ñ Management training seminars for local government officials are improving the delivery of essential services
- ï USAID continues Democracy Dialogue Activities (DDA) across Iraq
 - ñ Promotes civic participation and increases Iraqisí understanding of democratic principles and the political process

Essential Services - Water and Sanitation




- A substantial increase in access to potable water should result as work on a number of treatment plants and systems is completed in the second half of 2004, including:
 - ñ Baghdadís Shark Dijlah plant will benefit 750,000 people
 - ñ Ad Diwaniyah plant will benefit more than 80,000 people
 - ñ An Najaf plant will benefit 560,000 people
 - ñ Ninawaí Governorate plants will benefit 50,000 people
 - ñ Fallujah plant will benefit more than 200,000 people
- ï Japan is funding an \$11 million UN project to help restore the marshlands of southern Iraq, which were deliberately drained by Saddam Hussein
 - ñ Will support sustainable development through environmentally sound technologies, providing drinking water, sanitation and pilot wetland restoration for the Marsh Arabs
 - ñ Part of the \$1.5 billion Tokyo has pledged for postwar Iraqi reconstruction this year



Essential Services - Telecommunications



Total number of telephone subscribers in Iraq is now over 1,345,000 (including 549,000 cell phone subscribers) - 61.6% above pre-war levels



- ï As of 18 Jul, there were 75,000 internet subscribers in Baghdad
 - ñ Pre-war, there was limited service, with 3,000 internet and 8,000 e-mail only accounts in 2002




Essential Services - Food Security

Essential Services - Food Security (Cont)



- i Security has improved on major trucking routes and trucks continue transporting grain from the Umm Qasr port to storage facilities throughout the country
- i The last two World Food Program (WFP) procured rice shipments will arrive in Iraq by the end of Jul
 - ñ WFP will stop all food shipments to Iraq in September. The pipeline will be reliant on Ministry of Trade procurement thereafter
- The WFP pipeline indicates possible shortfalls in the following commodities over the course of the next three months:
 - ñ National wheat (national harvest figures are not yet available), pulses, ghee, milk, infant formula, soap and detergent
- i For the period of Jul through Sep, WFP projects 35,632 metric tons (mt) of Oil for Food commodity arrivals, which could be augmented by 35,000 mt of Indian wheat



Essential Services - Health Care



- Supplemental funds are targeting construction of primary health care clinics in every governorate and rehabilitation of 16 pediatric/maternal hospitals
 - ñ The Ministry of Health (MOH) provided a by-governorate allocation of the 150 Primary Healthcare Clinics to be constructed
 - ñ The MOH designated 17 Maternal and Child Hospitals to be refurbished throughout the country
 - ñ 240 Iraqi hospitals and over 1,200 preventive health clinics are operating
 - ñ The Minister of Health signed the task order for the \$50 million Basrah Children's Hospital, which will be a 30-50 bed state-of-the-art children's facility
- i Over 5 million children between the ages of six and 12 have been immunized for Measles, Mumps, and Rubella
- ï Over 3 million children under five years of age have been vaccinated since Jun 03



Essential Services - Education



- i On 15 Jul, USAID awarded a \$56.4 million contract to provide technical assistance to the Iraq Ministry of Education (MOE), includes:
 - ñ Institutional capacity building of the MOE
 - ñ Creation of model schools in each of the 81 sub-districts
 - ñ Training of primary and secondary school teachers
 - ñ Procurement of supplies and equipment for schools
 - ñ Promotes community participation in early childhood education
- i With support from USAID, Iraqi government agencies are conducting various vocational training programs to help alleviate unemployment and supply appropriately skilled workers
- i Over 32,000 secondary school teachers and 3,000 supervisors have been trained as part of effort to upgrade the quality of education
- Nearly 2,500 schools have been rehabilitated to date and an additional1,200 are expected to be complete by the end of the year
 - ñ In Basrah governorate, USAID is working with the MOE to inventory the number of schools and assess immediate rehabilitation needs

Project and Contracting Office (PCO)



- i Both the number of projects underway and number of Iraqis employed will jump significantly over the next few months
- ï The PCO has issued 183 task orders, out of a total of 250 (76%)
 - $ilde{\mathrm{n}}$ These task orders cover 1,587 projects nationwide, out of a total 2,300 (69%)
 - $\tilde{\rm n}$ Over 33% of the \$18.4 billion supplemental is contractually obligated
 - $\tilde{\mathrm{n}}$ Over 56% of apportioned funds is contractually obligated
- The Accelerated Iraq Reconstruction Program (AIRP) is meeting urgent local needs across Iraq:
 - ñ Projects cover: water and sanitation, health, education, construction, roads, power, and telecommunications
 - $\tilde{\mathrm{n}}$ Over 14,500 Iraqis have been directly employed on AIRP projects
 - ñ Approximately 2,500 Iraqis employed on Sadr City landfill & sewer projects
 - \tilde{n} Stimulates local economy and provides opportunities for local businesses $$_{12}$$

Economy



- Ön 21 Jul, estimated crude oil export revenue was approximately \$9.2 billion for 2004
- The New Iraqi Dinar was at 1,460 dinars per dollar on 22 Jul, and has been stable for five months
- i Iraq's Finance Ministry auctioned 150 billion dinars (\$103 million) of treasury bills on 18 Jul
 - ñ This is the first step in re-establishing a local bond market and allows free-market forces to set interest rates
 - ñ Future auctions are expected to take place every few weeks
 - ñ A result of the capacity building efforts at the Central Bank of Iraq by Coalition advisors
- ï Nearly 3,000 micro-credit loans totaling over \$6 million have been made to Iraqi businesses
 - ñ Provides credit to financially viable micro and small businesses



Economy (Cont)




- Since the Iraq Stock Exchange opened on 24 Jun, trading volume has grown significantly
 - ñ The exchange is open two days a week for two hours per day
 - ñ There are now 27 listed companies traded and officials are hoping this number will grow to 120 in the next 45 days
- i USAID is assisting the Iraqi Ministry of Labor and Social Affairs (MOLSA) to develop a vocational training program that will help the Iraqi government address Iraqís high unemployment rate
- i USAID is currently supporting the development of business skills among Iraqís small and medium sized businesses
 - ñ By Fall 04, USAID will expand outreach and the number of existing Iraqi Business Centers, which provide training, consulting, and business entrepreneurship services

Mega Watt Hour Production




- ï Due to unforeseen problems, achievement of the Jun goal has slipped until at least Jul

Power Production








ï Record Production: 13 Jul reached Peak Generation of 5,063 MW or 109,177 MWH

ï Pre-War Peak: 2.5 MBPD in Mar 03



Revenue (\$B) — Iraqi Export (MBPD)





Diesel Production & Imports





Kerosene Production & Imports





Gasoline / Benzene Production & Imports










Ministry of Defense Man, Train & Equip Status



Security - Developments



- Ä Al Kasik Military Base in Mosul is complete and was handed over to the New Iraqi Army on 21 Jul
 - ñ The military base houses 3,500 Iraqi Armed Service soldiers and will have a capacity in excess of 7,000 in months to come
- The Iraq Intervention Force (IIF) is being established, trained and equipped for urban counterinsurgency operations
 - ñ The initial IIF battalion deployed into Baghdad at the end of Jun
 - ñ All three battalions of the first IIF brigade will be ready by end of Jul
- ï On 08 Jul, 39 of 45 battalions of the Iraqi National Guard (ING) were manned above 75% strength
 - ñ Conducting joint patrols throughout Iraq with Coalition and Iraqi
 Police forces
 - ñ Focus on equipping, training, and reconstituting the force



Security - Developments (Cont)



- TA total of 5,891 new IPS recruits completed academy training
 - ñ Five classes (over 3,898 students) graduated from the Jordan Academy
 - ñ Four classes (1,993 students) graduated from the Baghdad Public Safety Academy
- ï Coalition advisors are providing professional development training for IPS officers. The number of IPS graduates from these courses:

ñ Basic Criminal Investigation 165 (target 1,200)

ñ Criminal Intelligence Course
91 (target 120)

ñ Emergency Response 40

ñ Dignitary Protection 169

ñ Mid-level Management 63 (target 300)


ñ Executive Leadership Course

Security - Developments (Cont)



- ï Chart below shows significant insurgent activities in Iraq to 10 Jul
 - ñ Includes attacks using improvised explosive devices (IEDs), vehicleborne IEDs, mortars, rocket propelled grenades (RPG), and improvised rockets
 - ñ There appears to be a trend of decreasing acts against the Coalition that has become more pronounced since the transition to the Iraqi Interim Government
