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The purpose of this directive is to extend the review procedures for acquisition instruments that are set forth in CIB 01-19. The Office of Procurement Contract Review Board (CRB) will continue to be responsible for reviewing all new overseas acquisition actions exceeding \$10 million.

The pilot program was successfully concluded at the end of the fiscal year. We will be issuing a new AAPD to implement lessons learned during the pilot and name the new members of the CRB.

During the past year, we feel the CRB has done some fantastic work. General Counsel feels that we caught a number of major problems that could have resulted in protests that would have been difficult, if not impossible, to defend. We are working towards not only a reduction in potential problems, but in a more standardized, and hopefully simplified, Request for Proposal format.

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
