Edward Byrne Discretionary Grants/Demonstration Program on the Relationship of Alcohol and Crime.....	\$1,500

This funding, plus \$3,000,000 from existing base funds, will be used to award grants to communities to develop comprehensive community-level enforcement and prevention programs aimed at combating underage drinking, drinking and driving, and alcohol-related crimes so that the link between alcohol abuse and crime can be broken. Furthermore, additional research will be conducted and statistics developed to explain the relationship between alcohol and crime and to disseminate effective practices dealing with alcohol abuse.

Edward Byrne Discretionary Grants/Tribal Criminal and Civil Legal Assistance.....	6,000

Of this amount, \$4,500,000 will be used to provide Indian tribes, tribal consortia, and private/non-profit legal service organizations serving a reservation-based constituency the resources to develop or enhance their capacity to provide criminal and civil legal assistance. Another \$1,000,000 will be used to provide discretionary grants to the existing 31 Tribal Colleges to create, develop, and enhance a two-year curriculum of paralegal studies, law advocate studies, indigenous justice systems or other areas directly related to criminal and civil legal assistance. The remaining funding will be used for training, technical assistance, research, evaluation, and data collection efforts.

The 2001 budget proposes eliminating funding for this program.			
State Criminal Alien Assistance Program.....	180,000
This increase will provide a total of \$600,000,000 for this program in 2001. In 2000, a total of \$585,000,000 was appropriated for this program, including \$165,000,000 as part of the Prison Grant Program, so the actual increase proposed is \$15,000,000. The additional funding will be used to reimburse state and local governments for the cost of incarcerating illegal aliens.			
Prison Grant Program.....	(611,500)
The 2001 budget proposes eliminating the Violent offender/Truth-in-Sentencing Grant Program, although \$34,000,000 will remain for detention facilities in Indian Country, \$35,000,000 will be provided for the Cooperative Agreement Program, and \$6,000,000 will be provided for a new Mental Health of Offenders Program, which will address the problems related to the growing number of serious adult and juvenile mentally ill in the criminal justice system. This program will fund discretionary grants to state adult and juvenile correctional agencies and local jails for the assessment, diversion, and treatment of mentally ill inmates. Funds will also be used to develop a mental health court program that will provide a single point of contact for mentally ill defendants charged with misdemeanor offenses.			
Tribal Courts Program.....	10,000
This increase will be used to fund many new initiatives, including: grants for the enhancement and continued operation of existing tribal courts; grants for the implementation of tribal courts for tribes awarded planning grants in 2000; and tribal court planning grants.			
Indian Country Grant Program.....	21,000
This new program includes three separate initiatives: \$8,000,000 for an Indian Alcohol and Substance Abuse Diversion Program; \$5,000,000 to fund sexual assault nurse examiner (SANE) units in Indian Country; and \$8,000,000 to address tribal youth mental health and behavioral problems.

<p>Violence Against Women Act Programs/ Civil Legal Assistance</p> <p>This increase will provide a total of \$35,250,000 for the Civil Legal Assistance Program, which encourages collaborative efforts involving the legal community (including legal services providers, law school clinics, and pro bono programs) and the domestic violence victims advocacy community.</p>	\$7,250
<p>Violence Against Women Act Programs/ Family Violence Research Program.....</p> <p>NIJ will use this funding to conduct a family violence research and evaluation program. With this funding, NIJ would: (1) evaluate current practices and systems of service delivery responding to family violence; (2) establish a basic research program concentrating on the understudied areas of child abuse and neglect and elder abuse; and (3) design and test a demonstration program guided by family violence research and evaluation.</p>	\$5,000
<p>Violence Against Women Act Programs/Statistics: Processing of Domestic Violence Cases.....</p> <p>BJS will use this funding to conduct a national study tracking the justice system's handling of domestic violence cases. For the first time, nationally representative data from the 75 largest counties would be gathered prospectively tracking domestic violence cases through the justice system: from arrest, through prosecution, to conviction and sentencing.</p>	1,000
<p>Victims of Child Abuse</p> <p>The budget proposes \$9,000,000 for the Court-Appointed Special Advocate Program in 2001, a decrease of \$1,000,000 from the 2000 appropriation of \$10,000,000.</p>	(1,000)
<p>Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Program.....</p> <p>This program provides formula grants to states for use by state and local government to develop and implement residential substance abuse programs within state and local correctional and detention facilities where inmates are incarcerated for a sufficient period of time to permit such treatment. This increase will support an additional 700 offenders, and 10 additional programs will be initiated.</p>	2,000
<p>Zero Tolerance and Drug Intervention Program.....</p> <p>This initiative would provide discretionary grants to states and units of local government and state and local courts for planning, implementation, and enhancement of comprehensive programs of drug testing, drug treatment, and graduated sanctions for individuals within the criminal justice system. Systematic drug testing – under the coercion of the criminal justice system – is an important tool for criminal justice agencies concerned with controlling drug abuse among the offender population. When compared to substance abusers who voluntarily enter treatment, those coerced into treatment through the criminal justice system are just as likely to succeed. Since the majority of drug users are processed through some part of the criminal justice system during their drug-use careers, it makes sense to consider that system as a location for intervention. Of the \$75,000,000 requested, \$25,000,000 will be devoted to the new \$60,000,000 Offender Re-entry Grant Program and \$10,000,000 will be targeted to Indian Country.</p>	75,000

Drug Courts.....	\$10,000

This program provides grants to plan, establish, or enhance state and local drug courts that provide specialized treatment, rehabilitation, and supervision of certain types of nonviolent substance abusing offenders. This additional funding will be used to establish 12 new drug courts and assist 8 additional communities in planning a drug court. Included in this total request is \$2,000,000 that will be used for a \$5,000,000 initiative concerning the dependency court system's response to child abuse and neglect.
