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### IACP Sponsored Training

A cooperative effort by the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), D. C. Metro Transit Police, and several private companies has produced a 2-day course on counter- terrorism and responding to high threat events for law enforcement personnel. The course, which is being offered across the country, is aimed at preparing officers and officials of local police departments to prevent and/or respond to threats of explosives and other weapons of mass destruction, and is geared to local agencies, ranging from urban to rural.

This program addresses the needs of those expected to respond to high-threat incidents, from the beat cop to the chief of police, through prevention and mitigation. However, in instances where these goals are not met, it offers solid, reasonable methods and

tactics for detecting terrorist activities. It highlights vulnerability recognition, target hardening, disruptions, equipment procurement, interagency agreements, and establishing standard operating procedures for incident response to high threat events. It makes use of a proven mechanism whereby trainees study targets within their own areas of responsibility that are vulnerable to attack and plan appropriate responses.

The training discusses nuclear, chemical, and biological agents, their signs and symptoms, and the dangers they present. It provides the street cop and the commander with tools necessary to prevent or disrupt an attack, assess the situation rapidly and correctly in order to survive the incident, perform normal law enforcement responsibilities (i.e., effect an arrest, preserve the crime scene, collect evidence) in an abnormal environment, communicate internally and with other organizations (EMS, fire, etc.), and provide maximum aid to victims.

#### **Information Exchange**

Under Nunn-Lugar II, a bill to provide Federal money to train local and state first responders to weapons of mass destruction, the Department of Defense, FBI, and FEMA will provide training in 27 metropolitan areas. Training includes emergency response training, developing a rapid response team, preparedness testing and evaluation, developing and maintaining an inventory of equipment and assets, and procurement of equipment to interdict movement of weapons of mass destruction. The 27 areas are: Denver (this was the initial site and training was completed prior to the Summit of the Eight, June 20-22, 1997), Anchorage, Atlanta, Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Columbus (OH), Dallas, Honolulu, Houston, Indianapolis, Kansas City, Los Angeles, Memphis, Miami, Milwaukee, New York City, Phoenix, Philadelphia, San Antonio, San Diego, San Francisco, San Jose (CA), Seattle, and Washington, DC.
