In 2000, a total of \$585,000,000 was appropriated for this program, including \$165,000,000 as part of the Prison Grant Program, so the actual increase proposed is \$15,000,000. The additional funding will be used to reimburse state and local governments for the cost of incarcerating illegal aliens.

The 2001 budget proposes eliminating the Violent offender/Truth-in-Sentencing Grant Program, although \$34,000,000 will remain for detention facilities in Indian Country, \$35,000,000 will be provided for the Cooperative Agreement Program, and \$6,000,000 will be provided for a new Mental Health of Offenders Program, which will address the problems related to the growing number of serious adult and juvenile mentally ill in the criminal justice system. This program will fund discretionary grants to state adult and juvenile correctional agencies and local jails for the assessment, diversion, and treatment of mentally ill inmates. Funds will also be used to develop a mental health court program that will provide a single point of contact for mentally ill defendants charged with misdemeanor offenses.	<b>l</b>

This increase will support an additional 700 offenders, and 10 additional programs will be initiated.			
Zero Tolerance and Drug Intervention Program			75,000
This initiative would provide discretionary grants to states and units of local government and state and local courts for planning, implementation, and enhancement of comprehensive programs of drug testing, drug treatment, and graduated sanctions for individuals within the criminal justice system. Systematic drug testing – under the coercion of the criminal justice system – is an important tool for criminal justice agencies concerned with controlling drug abuse among the offender population. When compared to substance abusers who voluntarily enter treatment, those coerced into treatment through the criminal justice system are just as likely to succeed. Since the majority of drug users are processed through some part of the criminal justice system during their drug-use careers, it makes sense to consider that system as a location for intervention. Of the \$75,000,000 requested, \$25,000,000 will be devoted to the new \$60,000,000 Offender Referent Program and \$10,000,000 will be targeted to Indian Country.
