#### **CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION**

Security

- On November 10, hours before a visit by Jan Pronk, Special Representative for the U.N. Secretary-General (SRSG), to the Algiers internally displaced persons (IDP) settlement in South Darfur, Government of Sudan (GOS) police fired tear gas, assaulted IDPs, and leveled temporary IDP shelters, according to international media sources. Sudanese local media sources erroneously reported that the IDP relocation was voluntary and conducted with prior consent of the non-governmental organizations (NGOs) operating in the area. The USAID/Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), U.N. agency staff, African Union (AU) peacekeepers, and a BBC news crew witnessed the incident, which marked the second GOS raid of the Algiers settlement in a week; the U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) confirmed that four children and two adults died in the first raid on November 2.
- Later on November 10, SRSG Pronk issued a statement expressing concern about the nature of the GOS movement of IDPs and emphasized that relocation should be conducted in accordance with international humanitarian and human rights laws and agreements with humanitarian partners.
- Due to increased GOS restrictions on U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) mobility in the region, UNHCR is relocating some South Darfur staff to West Darfur.
- OCHA reported that, on November 9, armed militias attacked Tawilah, North Darfur. According to the USAID/DART, NGO staff members temporarily evacuated to safe areas outside of the town and were unharmed; however, the Office of the U.N. Security Coordinator (UNSECOORD) closed the El Fasher-Tawilah road pending further developments.

According to WHO, the emergency threshold for crude mortality is 1 death per 10,000 people per day.

- UNSECOORD reported on November 7 that the U.N. had declared all major roads in South Darfur "no-go" routes for U.N. travel, except for the Nyala-El Fasher route. U.N. agencies also indicated that clashes between Arab tribesmen and opposition forces continued north of Labado between November 3 and 5, causing humanitarian agencies operating in the area to temporarily limit activities to Labado town.
- On November 11, the USAID/DART reported that, as a result of increased security incidents in the Kulbus and Zalengei corridors, UNSECOORD is increasing U.N. security restrictions around Geneina. The AU and UNSECOORD confirmed that the October 27 bus hijacking and seizure of 18 Arab hostages near Zalengei triggered an escalation of violence between the Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) and Arab tribes in Jebel Marra and around Zalingei.

#### Peace Talks

• On November 9, the GOS signed agreements with opposition groups the SLM/A and the Justice and Equality Movement (JEM) to observe humanitarian and security protocols. The GOS agreed to a ban on military flights over Darfur, signaling a breakthrough in the deadlocked peace talks, held in Abuja, Nigeria. The humanitarian protocol includes stipulations that aid workers be granted unimpeded access to affected populations across Darfur. In addition to establishing a no-fly zone over Darfur, the security protocol requires the GOS to disarm *Jingaweit* forces. No progress has been made to date, however, on a political accord to address long-term solutions to the conflict.

## USG Humanitarian Assistance

- On November 5, the S/V Atlantic Forest, containing 6,540 MT of P.L. 480 Title II Emergency Food Assistance for refugees in eastern Chad, arrived in the Libyan harbor of Benghazi, marking the first U.S. ship to dock in a Libyan port in two decades. The USAID/Food for Peace (USAID/FFP) shipment is scheduled for transport overland to eastern Chad to feed approximately 197,000 beneficiaries. Since the U.S. and Libya resumed diplomatic ties in June, Libya has authorized overland U.N. World Food Program (WFP) shipments through Libya to eastern Chad; prior to that agreement, commodities had to be transported through the port of Douala in Cameroon.
- On November 7, a flight of USAID/OFDA emergency relief supplies arrived in El Fasher, carrying 20,000 blankets for 5,000 families, valued at approximately \$100,000. Including transport costs, USAID/OFDA has provided more than \$10 million in emergency relief supplies to Darfur to date.

#### Protection

• International media sources report that the U.N. International Commission of Inquiry on Darfur is visiting Sudan between November 7 and 21 and will meet with the GOS, international organizations, and civil society groups. The Commission's mandate, as outlined in U.N. Security Council Resolution 1564, is to investigate reported violations of international humanitarian and human rights law, to determine if acts of genocide have occurred, and to identify violators.

#### Humanitarian Access

• The USAID/DART reports that the U.N. Joint Logistics Coordinator (UNJLC) has warned donors and relief agencies of the urgent need to construct bridges across four West Darfur wadis that will be impassable during the rainy season. During the 2004 rainy season, relief agencies' inability to move commodities by road resulted in the need for costly airlifts, and NGOs report that if bridges are not built in the coming months, some communities will once again be inaccessible during the upcoming rainy season.

## Water and Sanitation

Between October 20 and 28, the USAID/DART conducted a water and sanitation assessment in
West Darfur, where an estimated 654,000 IDPs reside. The USAID/DART visited the IDP
settlements of Sirba, Arowsharo, and Disa and reported that the water supply situation for IDPs was
desperate; enough water is available for cooking and drinking, but none is left over for personal
hygiene.
